The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (14th Oct., 2014) carried out by the Council Assessors in compliance of the Order dated 25.09.2014 in SLP (c) No. 24355/2014 of the Hon'ble Supreme Court and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 6.80 % (i.e. 4 out of 59) as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 46.70 % (i.e. 21 out of 45) as detailed in the report.
3. Bed occupancy was 35 % (i.e. 105 out of 300) on day of assessment as under:

5. Only 1 major & 1 minor operation was carried out on day of assessment.
6. Chairman & college authorities were knowing about the assessment and were waiting in the college corridor to receive assessors.
7. Dean has refused to sign the report after reading it.
8. There was no delivery either normal or Caesarean on day of assessment.
9. No special investigation was carried out in Radiodiagnosis department on day of assessment.
10. Histopathology & Cytology workload is grossly inadequate at 1 each.
11. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Modinagar, Ghaziabad, Uttar Pradesh by Jassar Dental Medical Education Health Foundation, Modinagar, Uttar Pradesh under Ch. Charan Singh University, Meerut to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2014-2015 and further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(a) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 which reads as under:-

“8(3)(1).....

(a) *Colleges in the stage upto II renewal (i.e. Admission of third batch)*

If it is observed during any regular inspection of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 30% and/or bed occupancy is <60%, such an institute will not be considered for renewal of permission in that Academic Year.”

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council further decided to return the new application dated 28.08.2014 of Jassar Dental Medical Education Health Foundation, Modinagar, Uttar Pradesh received through the Central Government vide letter dt. 19.09.2014 to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme for establishment of a new medical college at Modinagar, Ghaziabad, Uttar Pradesh by Jassar Dental Medical Education Health Foundation, Modinagar, Uttar Pradesh under Ch. Charan Singh University, Meerut u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

Read: the matter with regard to fresh assessment for grant of LOP(150) seats for establishment of new medical college at Gajraula, Distt. Amroha, Uttar Pradesh by Shri Venkateshwara University, Meerut (Trust Name: Shri Bankey Bihari Educational & Welfare Trust) u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016 on the file for the academic year 2014-2015 in pursuance of Hon'ble Supreme Court order dated 24.09.2014 in SLP © No. 25833/2014.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (13th & 14th Oct., 2014) carried out by the Council Assessors in compliance of the Order dated 24.09.2014 in SLP (c) No. 25833/2014 of the Hon'ble Supreme Court and noted the following:

1. (a) Deficiency of teaching faculty is 20 % as detailed in the report.
(b) Dr. Sharad Gupta, presented as Professor, Paediatrics did not produce original certificates on 13/10/2014 – i.e. first day of assessment. On the next day, he produced original experience certificate which appeared fake.

Dean of the institute Dr. R.K. Gupta was present during verification. On suspicion of its genuineness, Dr. Sharad Gupta was confronted after which he had confessed that he is a M.D. Paediatrics practicing in Agra and all his teaching experience certificates are fake. He told that Mr. Vivek Tyagi – Agent in Meerut (Mobile No. 8171568767) – was involved in his appointment. The matter was reported to Chairman of the institute Shri Sudhir Giri for further action. One of the relative of Dr. Sharad Gupta along with two other persons entered the room in the evening hours on 14/10/2014 where assessors were preparing the report. They started abusing us and threatened them & their families.

(c) The following faculty are not working in the hospital but appeared only for MCI assessment as confessed by them on their D.F.:

- (i) Dr. A. Anuragi, Asst. Prof. of Medicine;
- (ii) Dr. N. Goyal, Asst. Prof. of Medicine &
- (iii) Dr. P. Chaudhary, Asst. Prof. of Medicine.

2. Shortage of Residents is 11.11 % as detailed in the report.
3. Clinical material is inadequate with deficiency of:
 - (a) Indoor bed occupancy: Most of the patients did not require admission and cases are of poor quality for teaching purpose.
 - (b) Radiological investigations: Records are not maintained.
 - (c) Residents are not involved in patient care as most of them are not staying in the campus and coming from nearby town.
 - (d) Faculty are also not involved in IPD patient care as can be verified by case papers.
4. Data of clinical material provided by the institute is inflated. Fake OPD patients and investigations are written in the registers. In IPD most of the patients did not require admission. Case papers did not have patients' notes. Faculty and Sr & JR were unaware of the details of the patients. They were not involved in patient care.
5. Most of the patients in ICUs did not require admission. There was no patient in PICU / NICU on day of assessment.
6. AERB approval is not available for X-ray equipment.
7. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Gajraula Distt., Amroha, U.P. by Shri Venkateshwara University, Meerut, (Trust-Shri Bankey Bihari Educational & Welfare Trust) under Shri Venkateshwara University, Gajraula, Uttar Pradesh to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2014-15 and further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(d) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 which reads as under:-

“8(3)(1).....

- (d) Colleges which are found to have employed teachers with faked/forged documents:

If it is observed during any institute is found to have employed a teacher with faked/forged documents and have submitted the declaration form of such a teacher, such an institute will not be considered for renewal of permission/recognition for award of MBBS degree/processing the applications for postgraduate courses for two academic years i.e. that academic year and the next academic year also.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council further decided to return the new application dated 27.08.2014 of Shri Venkateshwara University, Meerut, (Trust-Shri Bankey Bihari Educational & Welfare Trust) received through the Central Government vide letter dt. 23.09.2014 to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme for establishment of a new medical college at Gajraula Distt., Amroha, U.P. by Shri Venkateshwara University, Meerut, (Trust-Shri Bankey Bihari Educational & Welfare Trust) under Shri Venkateshwara University, Gajraula, Uttar Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

6. Fresh Assessment for grant of LOP(150) seats for establishment of new medical college at Raipur, Chhattisgarh by Lord Buddha Educational Society, Raipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 on the file for the academic year 2014-2015 in pursuance of Hon'ble Supreme Court order dated 26.09.2014 in W.P.(C) No. 688/2014.

Read: the matter with regard to fresh assessment for grant of LOP(150) seats for establishment of new medical college at Raipur, Chhattisgarh by Lord Buddha Educational Society, Raipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 on the file for the academic year 2014-2015 in pursuance of Hon'ble Supreme Court order dated 26.09.2014 in W.P.(C) No. 688/2014.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (14th & 15th Oct., 2014) carried out by the Council Assessors in compliance of the Order dated 26.09.2014 in SLP (c) No. 688/2014 of the Hon'ble Supreme Court and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 15 % (i.e. 9 out of 60) as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 24.4 % (i.e. 11 out of 45) as detailed in the report.
3. Majority of staff offices in hospital and in the college were lying vacant, giving a deserted look with no evidence of their occupation any time. No individual name plates / boards were present.
4. Perusal of record and enquiry from staff revealed that OPD & IPD numbers seem significantly inflated. Average daily OPD attendance is 250 – 300 against requirement of 600 as per Regulations. On day of assessment it was 298.
5. Average bed occupancy of genuine patients was 29.6 % (i.e. 89 out of 300 beds). Rest of beds were occupied by dummy, fake individuals with nonsignificant or insignificant problems which did not require hospitalization at all. Such patients were shown admitted very recently. They were not carrying any utensils / personal belongings. The complaints for which they were admitted were mild hypertension, gastritis, UTI, mild anaemia, body ache, mild rash, five months normal pregnancy, vague pain in abdomen, joint pains, etc. Paediatric IPD had no neonates admitted. In Orthopaedics ward there was no case of fracture, plaster of Paris cast or traction. There was no mention of diagnosis in any of the registers. In some Surgical files, diagnosis of Piles / Internal haemorrhoids was written but patients talked of some other non-specific complaints.
6. There was only 1 normal delivery & NIL Caesarean section on day of assessment.
7. Operative workload is very less. Average number of major surgeries performed is 1-8. On scrutiny of O.T. registers, names of many senior faculty did not appear in any of the OT lists. E.g. the following senior Surgeons have not operated even once in September 2014:
 - (a) General Surgery: Dr. Lavekar (HOD), Dr. Anil, Dr. Ajit, Dr. Nusrat (All Asst. Prof.);
 - (b) Orthopaedics: Dr. Amit Agarwal (Asst. Prof.);
 - (c) O.G.: Dr. Sanjay Patil (HOD), Dr. Pratibha (Professor), Dr. Preeti, Dr. Namita, Dr. Manjusha (All Asst. Prof.) &
 - (d) Ophthalmology: Dr. Vinay, Dr. Deepak, Dr. Anil (All Asst. Prof.)

8. There was no patient in ICCU. No beds are available in SICU, PICU/NICU. Ventilator is not available.
9. Number of deliveries is grossly inadequate – 4-6 / month. Neonatal resuscitation facility is not available.
10. Total number of Paramedical and non-teaching staff is 70 which is 30 less than required 100 as per Regulations.
11. As informed by the Nursing Superintendent of the hospital, total Nursing staff is 93 which is inadequate against requirement of 175 as per Regulations as under:
 - (a) Nursing Superintendent: 1;
 - (b) Deputy Nursing Superintendent: 1;
 - (c) Assistant Nursing Superintendent: 4 &
 - (d) Staff Nurses: 87.
12. Number of immunizations per day is only 3-5 which is inadequate.
13. Radiological & laboratory investigations are inadequate.
14. Central clinical laboratory area is less than 225 sq.m. specified.
15. Histopathological workload is shown as 2-4 specimens every day which is inadequate. No specimens or slides were available in the laboratory during assessment. On asking Asst. Prof. discovered one specimen in jar which had not been grossed for 4 days. Faculty & technical staff were not aware of the system of numbering or filing of specimens in the laboratory. No requisition forms could be produced by the staff.
16. In Cytopathology, the staff was not aware of how the slides were filed. No requisition forms or reports could be produced by the staff. The reports entered in the registers were unauthorized as no signature was available. It appears that there are two different registers. On searching the details of two slides picked up at random, no matching names and numbers were found by the staff in the registers. After 15 minutes, PRO came with a third register where matching numbers and names were present. Professor did not seem to be aware of the relevance, significance or importance of exclusive identification of specimens.
17. In Anatomy department, no genuine bone set is available. Mounted specimens are only 15. There are no cadavers.
18. Library is not air-conditioned.
19. Quarters for non-teaching staff: 23 hostel type rooms with one bed & mattress and common toilets with bathroom facility have been shown as quarters for non-teaching staff which is not adequate.
20. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Raipur, Chhattisgarh by Lord Buddha Educational Society, Raipur, Chhattisgarh under Chhattisgarh Ayush and Health Sciences University, Raipur to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2014-2015 and further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(a) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 which reads as under:-

“8(3)(1).....

(a) Colleges in the stage upto II renewal (9.e. Admission of third batch)

If it is observed during any regular inspection of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 30% and/or bed occupancy is <60%, such an institute will not be considered for renewal of permission in that Academic Year.”

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council further decided to return the new application dated 28.08.2014 of Lord Buddha Educational Society, Raipur, Chhattisgarh received through the Central Government vide letter dt. 23.09.2014 to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme for establishment of a new medical college at Raipur, Chhattisgarh by Lord Buddha Educational Society, Raipur, Chhattisgarh under Chhattisgarh

Ayush and Health Sciences University, Raipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

7. Regarding Shifting of 1st batch of MBBS students of Chintpurni Medical College and Hospital, Village Bungal, Pathankot.

Read: the matter with regard to regarding Shifting of 1st batch of MBBS students of Chintpurni Medical College and Hospital, Village Bungal, Pathankot.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter regarding Shifting of 1st batch of MBBS students of Chintpurni Medical College and Hospital, Village Bungal, Pathankot and observed that subsequent to the order of Hon'ble High Court, the Hon'ble Supreme Court in WP (c) No. 469 of 2014 titled as Hind Charitable Trust Vs. Union of India & Ors. had passed the following orders on 18-09-2014 and 25-09-2014 :

The relevant portion of the order dated 18.09.2014 passed in W.P. (C) No. 469/2014 by the Hon'ble Supreme Court is reproduced hereunder:-

“ Heard the learned senior counsel appearing for both the sides.

Looking at the peculiar facts and circumstances of the case and, especially, when several seats for medical admission are likely to remain vacant for the academic year 2014-15, we are of the view that these matters require urgent consideration and we are giving these interim directions under the provisions of Article 142 of the Constitution of India.

There is one more reason for passing this interim order. We are conscious of the fact that number of physicians in our country is much less than what is required and because of non-renewal of recognition of several medical colleges, our citizens would be deprived of a good number of physicians and therefore, we are constrained to pass this order, whereby at least there would be some increase in the number of physicians after five years. We are running against time because the last date for giving admissions to MBBS Course for the academic year 2014-15 is 30th September, 2014.

We also desire to reconsider the directions given by this Court in the judgment of Priya Gupta v. State of Chhattisgarh [(2012) 7 SCC 433], but at this juncture, as we do not have sufficient time to decide all these petitions finally, we are passing this interim order and the matter with regard to reconsideration of the aforesaid judgment would be considered while finally disposing of this group of petitions.

It has been submitted on behalf of the learned senior counsel appearing for all the petitioners/ respondents, who are managing medical colleges, that the defects which had been recorded at the time of the last inspection by the representatives of the Medical Council of India have been duly rectified and at present, the defects pointed out in the reports do not exist. The said fact can be ascertained only by having a fresh Compliance Verification/Inspection. However, the stand taken by the Central Government and the Medical Council of India is to the effect that no such inspection can be undertaken in the present academic session because of paucity of time and it would violate the time schedule laid down by this Court in the case of Priya Gupta (supra).

The learned senior counsel appearing for the Medical Council of India has also submitted that the petitioners do not have any legal right for getting renewal of the recognition, especially in view of the fact that the Verification/Inspection Reports are not available for the period in question. The learned senior counsel has relied upon some of the Judgments to substantiate his case and according to him, it would not be just and proper to permit the said medical colleges to take fresh batch of students.

Looking at the peculiar facts of the case and the circumstances stated hereinabove, we direct the petitioners to file undertakings by President/Chairman and Secretary of the petitioners' institutions running medical colleges within 10 days from today, to the effect that there is no defect in the medical colleges run by them and they would also state that their deposit with the MCI, which is around Rs.10 crores, be forfeited by way of penalty if the statement made in the undertaking is found to be incorrect at the time of the next inspection. A draft undertaking has been given to this Court. A copy of the undertaking, which might be filed by the institutions, shall be served upon the office of the Medical Council of India as well as to the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India, New Delhi.

We also record the fact that in the recent past, the Medical Council of India has renewed recognition of Government Medical Colleges on the basis of undertakings and

therefore, we see no reason not to permit the private colleges to admit students on the basis of undertakings given by their office bearer as a special case.

Notwithstanding any direction given in the case of Priya Gupta (*supra*), if undertakings as stated hereinabove are filed by the institutions managing medical colleges for the academic year 2014-15, admissions shall be given to the students from the merit list prepared by the States and they shall be charged fees prescribed by the Government Medical Colleges of their respective States. The State Authorities, i.e., the Directorate of Medical Education & Research, of the respective States shall send students, in order of their merit, to the medical colleges run by the petitioners, which are situated within their States, within one week from the date of receipt of a copy of this order and the said students shall be admitted to the MBBS Course in accordance with the rules and regulations of the MCI and also regulations dated 16.04.2010 framed by the Medical Council of India, provided undertakings as mentioned above are filed on behalf of the concerned institutions.

It is also clarified that there would be no further counseling in respect of the students who are to be given admission, even if it might result into some heartburning among other students, but in the peculiar facts of the case, we give this direction.

In no case, the admission shall be given after 30th September, 2014. This order shall also apply to all the institutions which had filed their petitions earlier for renewal of their recognition for the academic year 2014-15, but their petitions were rejected or withdrawn for whatever reason, provided undertakings as stated hereinabove are filed by President/Chairman and the Secretary of those institutions. All those petitions shall be deemed to have been revived and this order shall be deemed to have been passed in those cases also. This order shall only be in respect of renewal of recognition and not for creation of additional seats or for new colleges.

We also record that the Union of India has supported the petitioners in the interest of students. We also direct the Union of India to give wide publicity to this order in print as well as electronic media in the interest of the concerned students.

It is directed that the list of students getting admission in pursuance of this order shall be placed on record of this Court by 1st October, 2014 by the concerned institutions and a copy thereof shall also be sent to the MCI.

These matters shall be treated as part-heard and shall be notified for further hearing in the month of December, 2014.”

The Hon'ble Supreme Court thereafter vide its order dated 25.09.2014 issued certain clarification in respect to the order dated 18.09.2014 in W.P. (C) No. 469/2014, which are reproduced hereunder:-

“After hearing the learned counsel for the parties we deem it appropriate to issue following clarifications with regard to our earlier order dated 18th September, 2014. These clarifications shall be read into the said order as if they were always part thereof:-

1. The order dated 18th September, 2014 shall also apply to cases where colleges or institutions were seeking increase in intake capacity and in the current year have been denied permission to admit students after first or second or third or forth renewal/inspection. In our view such institutions where Renewal/Inspection with respect to increase in capacity were conducted in the present academic year are also entitled to the benefit under the order dated 18th September, 2014.

2. We also clarify that fees chargeable from the students admitted pursuant to our order dated 18th September, 2014 shall be at the same rates as applicable to the students in Government medical colleges in respective States and such fees shall be at the same levels as that of the Government medical colleges till the students so admitted pass out from the private medical colleges or institutions.

3. Our order shall also apply to all similarly situated institutions irrespective of the fact whether any petitions were or are pending in this Court or in any of the High Courts or even if they had not approached any court at all. This order shall also apply even in cases where there were orders of stay in favour of the Medical Council of India restraining the colleges from admitting students for the current academic session.

4. The order shall not apply to colleges or institutions which have been disqualified by the Medical Council of India and/or the Central Government and

have been prohibited from making any admissions for the current academic year 2014-15.

5. In cases where two separate lists are prepared and sent by the State agencies one relating to State quota and the other relating to management quota in private institutions, we clarify that for the current academic year there shall be only one list and that shall be the "State quota" alone. There shall not be any management quota list to be sent to the private colleges or institutions taking the benefit under our order dated 18th September, 2014. The Management quota shall also be filled through the State list and the fees chargeable for the management quota shall also be charged at the same levels and rates as applicable to State quota list.

6. We further clarify that private institutions taking benefit under our order dated 18th September, 2014 shall have to take students only from the State agencies and at fees chargeable for students in Government medical colleges as stated above, regardless of their status or claim as Minority Institutions or Deemed Universities."

In accordance with the above cited order, the institute has filed an undertaking with MCI on 27.09.2014 that it has complied with all deficiencies which stand rectified.

16. RHTC is under the control of Director of Public Health.
17. Details of UHC are not provided.
18. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided not to recommend continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University in respect of students being trained at Perundurai Medical College and Institute of Road Transport, Perundurai and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 3 months.

1. Lecture Theaters: 4 Lecture Theaters of capacity 300 are available against requirement of 6 of 300 and 1 of capacity 650 as per Regulations.
2. Central Library: Area is 2,155 sq.m. approximately against requirement of 4,000 sq.m. as per Regulations.

3. Details of available accommodation for Students, Interns & Residents are not provided.
4. Residential Quarters: No quarters for faculty or residents are available in the campus. Only 24 quarters are available at State Government quarters against requirement of 39 as per Regulations.
5. There are 22 tables in 11 O.T.s at Victoria Hospital indicating 2 tables in each O.T. which is not as per norms.
6. At Minto Hospital, OPD Registration Counters are not computerized. MRD is not computerized.
7. In Ophthalmology, there are 160 beds in 3 Units which is not as per norms.
8. In Microbiology department, capacity of Demonstration Rooms is inadequate.
9. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 of Bangalore Medical College & Research Institute, Bangalore under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

47. **Stanley Medical College, Chennai – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard Stanley Medical College, Chennai – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (15th & 16th October, 2014) and noted the following:-

1. Lecture Theatres: One lecture theatre of 350 capacity, 1 hall of 300 capacity, 2 halls of 200 capacity, 2 of 100 capacity and 1 Auditorium of 500 capacity are available against requirement of 6 of 300 capacity and 1 of 650 capacity. Thus lecture theatre of 650 capacity is not available and size of 4 lecture theatres is smaller than required. Facility for E class is available in only one theatre.
2. Central Library: Details of area, sitting capacity, etc. are not provided.
3. Common Room for Boys does not have attached toilets.
4. Capacity of some Demonstration rooms is less in various departments.
5. RHTC: Asst. Prof. i/c RHTC is not available.
6. UHC: Asst. Prof. i/c UHC is not available.
7. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 of Stanley Medical College, Chennai under The Tamil Nadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

48. **Increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16 at Sree Balaji Medical College & Hospital, Chennai in pursuance of Hon'ble Supreme Court order dated 17.10.2014 in CA No. 6564/2014-MCI Vs. Sree Balaji Medical College & Hospital, Chennai – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard Increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16 at Sree Balaji Medical College &

Hospital, Chennai in pursuance of Hon'ble Supreme Court order dated 17.10.2014 in CA No. 6564/2014-MCI Vs. Sree Balaji Medical College & Hospital, Chennai .

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to defer the consideration of the matter for the next meeting.

49. **Jawahar Lal Nehru Medical College, Belgaum – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Jawahar Lal Nehru Medical College, Belgaum – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (16th & 17th October, 2014) and noted the following:-

1. Lecture Theaters: Facility for E class is available in only 1 lecture theater.
2. Central library: Details of area, sitting capacity are not provided.
3. Accommodation is available for 118 Residents against requirement of 148 as required under Regulations.
4. Pathology Department: In museum, number of catalogues and labeling of specimens are deficient.
5. Microbiology Department: In museum, number of catalogues is deficient.
6. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 200 of Jawahar Lal Nehru Medical College, Belgaum under KLE University, (Deemed University), Belgaum u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

50. **S.C.B. Medical College, Cuttack – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to S.C.B. Medical College, Cuttack – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (27th & 28th October, 2014) and noted the following:-

1. No CME programmes have been held in the last year.
2. Lecture Theaters: Capacity of lecture theaters is as under:

The requirement is of 6 lecture theaters of 300 capacity & 1 of 650 capacity. Thus there is deficiency of 5 lecture theaters of 300 capacity & 1 of 650 capacity.

3. Central Library: Area is 1,800 sq.m. against requirement of 4,000 sq.m. Only 86 journals are available against requirement of 100. Staff is inadequate.
4. Students' Hostels: Rooms are congested and are 4 seater rooms.

5. OPD: Teaching area is not available in any department except ENT. Waiting area is inadequate.
6. Wards: They are congested. Because of floor beds, hygienic conditions are poor and patient care is difficult.
7. Special investigations like barium, IVP are less – daily average is only 3. On day of assessment, it was NIL.
8. There are 24 tables in 15 O.T.s indicating more than 1 table in several O.T.s which is not as per norms.
9. RICU is not available.
10. Shortage of Residents is 13.24 % as detailed in the report.
11. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 of S.C.B. Medical College, Cuttack under Utkal University, Odisha u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

51. **JSS Medical College, Mysore – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to JSS Medical College, Mysore – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (27th & 28th October, 2014) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 200 u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 in respect of JSS Medical College, Mysore under JSS University, Mysore for the academic year 2015-16.

52. **Narayana Medical College, Nellore – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Narayana Medical College, Nellore – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (27th & 28th October, 2014) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS

students against the increased intake i.e. from 165 to 250 u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 in respect of Madras Medical College, Chennai under The Tamil Nadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai for the academic year 2015-16.

54. **Ramachandra Medical College & Research Institute, Chennai – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (27th & 28th October, 2014) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 250 u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 in respect of Ramachandra Medical College & Research Institute, Chennai under Sri Ramachandra Deemed University, Chennai for the academic year 2015-16.

55. **SMS Medical College, Jaipur – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to SMS Medical College, Jaipur – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (27th & 28th October, 2014) and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 250 u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 in respect of SMS Medical College, Jaipur under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur for the academic year 2015-16.

56. **Govt. Medical College, Kolkata – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 155-250 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Govt. Medical College, Kolkata – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 155-250 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (28th & 29th October, 2014) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of teaching faculty is 14.03 % as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 10.1 % as detailed in report.
3. OPD: Capacity of teaching area in each department is 10 which is inadequate. In Orthopaedics OPD, Dressing Room is common for both males & females.
4. Wards: Distance between 2 beds is less than 1.5 m. Hygienic condition and toilet facilities are very poor. Pantry is not available in any ward.
5. Casualty: Pulse Oxymeter, Crash cart, Ventilator & Disaster trolley are not available. Minor OT is not available. General conditions in emergency are very poor.
6. O.T.s: Postoperative recovery room is not available.
7. Capacity of several Demonstration rooms in various departments is 50 each against requirement of 75 each. In Physiology, Pathology & Forensic

Medicine departments, only 2 Demonstration Rooms each & in Biochemistry, Pharmacology & Microbiology departments, only 3 Demonstration Rooms each are available against requirement of 4 in each department.

8. Lecture Theaters: There are only 3 lecture theaters of 300 capacity against requirement of 6 as per Regulations. There is no lecture hall of capacity 650. There are 2 lecture halls (not of gallery type) in hospital against requirement of 1 theater of gallery type of 300 capacity. There is no facility for E class.
9. Central Library: Available seating capacity is only 300 against requirement of 400 as per Regulations. Capacity of staff reading room is 40 against requirement of 50. Only 48 journals are available against requirement of 100.
10. Girls' common room is very small.
11. Students' Hostels: Available accommodation is 652 against requirement of 937. Rooms are 4 seaters which is not as per norms and are congested. Hygiene of hostel campus is very poor.
12. Interns' Hostel is not available.
13. Residents' Hostel: Rooms are 4 seaters which is not as per norms and are congested. Hygiene is very poor.
14. Nurses' Hostel: Hygienic condition is very poor.
15. Recreational facilities and Gymnasium are not available.
16. RHTC: It is under dual control of Principal & DHS which is not as per Regulations. Messing facilities are not available. Accommodation is inadequate. Specialists visits are not organized. Distance is 58 kms. and it takes 2 hours to reach there from medical college. There is no transport facility. Sanitation is poor.
17. UHC: It is under dual control of Principal & Kolkata Municipal Corporation which is not as per Regulations. Specialists' visits are not organized.
18. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 155-250 of Govt. Medical College, Kolkata under West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

57. **Recognition/Approval of T.D. Medical College, Alappuzha for the award of MBBS degree granted by Kerala University of Health & Allied Sciences, against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats.**

Read: the matter with regard to Recognition/Approval of T.D. Medical College, Alappuzha for the award of MBBS degree granted by Kerala University of Health & Allied Sciences, against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (04.09.2014) alongwith Council assessors report (7th, 8th & 9th August, 2012) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 22.15 % (i.e. 35 out of 158) as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 40.47 % as detailed in the report.
3. There is deficiency of 2 gallery type lecture theaters of 180 capacity & 1 lecture theater of 350 capacity in the college. Lecture halls in hospital are not gallery type. Deficiency remains as it is.
4. Central Library: It is status quo. Deficiency remains as it is.
5. Examination Hall: It is status quo. Deficiency remains as it is.
6. Deficiency of 2 mobile X-ray units still remains.
7. There is no Central casualty. Deficiency remains as it is.
8. Number of major surgical operations was only 12 on day of assessment.
9. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 3 months for further consideration of the matter.

58. **Increase of seats in MBBS course from 100 to 150 at Rama Medical College Hospital & Research Centre, Kanpur, UP for the academic session 2015-16 in pursuance of Hon'ble Supreme Court order dated 01.08.2014 in CA No. 7117/2014 – Rama Medical College Hospital Vs. UOI & Anr.**

Read: the matter with regard to Increase of seats in MBBS course from 100 to 150 at Rama Medical College Hospital & Research Centre, Kanpur, UP for the academic session 2015-16 in pursuance of Hon'ble Supreme Court order dated 01.08.2014 in CA No. 7117/2014 – Rama Medical College Hospital Vs. UOI & Anr.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessor report (19th & 20th September, 2014) in pursuance of the Hon'ble Supreme Court Order dated 01.08.2014 in CA No. 7117/2014 and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 17.77 % (i.e. 25 out of 141) as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 41.66 % (i.e. 40 out of 96) as detailed in report.
3. Bed occupancy was 50 % on day of assessment. About 80 % were admitted with insignificant vague symptoms like headache, pain in abdomen, generalized body ache, constipation, etc. In General Medicine & Pulmonary medicine wards, some patients with dyspnoea were admitted but evaluation was written as normal. Orthopaedics ward had only 8 post-operative patients out of 37 patients. Rest were with generalized aches & pain. In Paediatrics only 5-6 children warranted admission. In Surgery ward there was hardly any patient with significant finding.
4. The case sheets of the patients did not have any history or clinical finding or any progress notes written by Residents or by faculty.
5. The data of OPD patients given by the institute is not commensurate with number of patients who were observed in OPD. Registers maintained in OPD were found to have inflated figures.
6. O.T.: Total only 6 cases were operated for major operations on day of assessment. Fake patients were kept in preoperative ward. Patients with trousers, shirt, belt, underclothes without any proper OT dress were shown to be waiting for Surgery. Their case sheets except for a general consent did not have any clinical history, findings, investigations or diagnosis mentioned.
7. Labour Room: Septic labour room appeared to be unused as a layer of dust was seen everywhere inside. Top light in labour room was not functional. The number of Deliveries was found to be less than number of deliveries recorded. This fact was also verified and confirmed by staff on duty.
8. There are 11 tables in 9 O.T.s which is not as per norms.
9. In almost all wards there was no segregation of male & female patients.
10. Only 18 quarters are available for non-teaching staff against requirement of 36 as the college is recognized for 100.
11. RICU has only 2 beds. There were Burns' patients in RICU.
12. Anatomy Department: In museum, mounted specimens are only 146 which are inadequate.
13. RHTC: Facilities for cooking and dining are inadequate.
14. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the inspection report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to grant Letter of Permission for increase in MBBS seats from 100 to 150 at Rama Medical College Hospital & Research Centre, Kanpur, UP under Dr. B.R. Ambedkar University, Agra for the academic year 2015-16 and further decided to apply clauses 8(3)(1)(a) & 8(3)(1)(c) of

Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 which reads as under:-

“8(3)(1).....

(a) Colleges in the stage upto II renewal (i.e. Admission of third batch)

If it is observed during any regular inspection of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 30% and/or bed occupancy is <60%, such an institute will not be considered for renewal of permission in that Academic Year.”

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any regular inspection of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <80%, such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956 alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

59. **Increase of seats in MBBS course 125 to 200 at Rural Medical College, Loni, Ahmednagar, Maharashtra u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Increase of seats in MBBS course 125 to 200 at Rural Medical College, Loni, Ahmednagar, Maharashtra u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dated 18.11.2014 received from the Principal, Rural Medical College, Loni stating that for unavoidable reasons they want to withdraw the application for increase in MBBS seats from 125 to 200 at Rural Medical College, Loni, Ahmednagar, Maharashtra.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council accepted the request of the Institute.

60. **Increase of seats in MBBS course 60 to 150 at St. John’s Medical College, Johnnagar, Sarjapur Road, Bangalore u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Increase of seats in MBBS course 60 to 150 at St. John’s Medical College, Johnnagar, Sarjapur Road, Bangalore u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the Essentiality Certificate issued by the State Government of Karnataka is deficient and not as per the prescribed format in as much as it is a conditional certificate as under:

“Issuance of Essentiality Certificate and Feasibility Certificate subject to strictly adopt and adhere to the State policy on admission of students and charging of fee to medical colleges stipulated from time to time.

The issue of this essentiality and Feasibility Certificate is subject to decision of W.P. No. 40331/2014 W.P. No. 40777-40865/2014 of the Hon’ble Court of Karnataka.”

It was also observed by the Committee that year-wise Time Bound Programme is not enclosed with the application.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme for increase of seats in MBBS course from 60 to 150 at St. John's Medical College, Johnnagar, Sarjapur Road, Bangalore as the Qualifying criterion 3.2 of Opening of a New or Higher Course of Study and Increase of Admission capacity in any Course of Study Regulations, 2000 pertaining to having an Essentiality Certificate in the prescribed format is not fulfilled.

61. **Increase of seats in MBBS course 150 to 200 at People's College of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bhopal u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Increase of seats in MBBS course 150 to 200 at People's College of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bhopal u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the Essentiality Certificate issued by the State Government of Madhya Pradesh is deficient and not as per the prescribed format as under:

- (1) The College was established in 2005 and recognized by the Central Govt. vide Notification dated 07.09.2010 for 150 seats.
- (2) Hence the college hospital has not completed 10 years of standing as on date of application which was 26/08/2014 which is required as per Qualifying Criterion 3.6.(a)(i) of Opening of a New or Higher Course of Study and Increase of Admission capacity in any Course of Study Regulations, 2000.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme for increase of seats in MBBS course from 150 to 200 at People's College of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bhopal as Qualifying criterion 3.6(a)(i) of Opening of a New or Higher Course of Study and Increase of Admission capacity in any Course of Study Regulations, 2000 pertaining to having a hospital of not less than 10 years of standing is not fulfilled.

62. **Increase of seats in MBBS course 150 to 200 at Govt. Medical College, Amritsar u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Increase of seats in MBBS course 150 to 200 at Govt. Medical College, Amritsar u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the Essentiality Certificate issued by the State Government of Punjab is deficient and not as per the prescribed format in following respects:

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme for increase in MBBS seats from 150 to 200 at Govt. Medical College, Amritsar as Qualifying criterion 3(6)(A)(ii) pertaining to minimum OPD strength per day not less than 2000 is not fulfilled.

63. **Increase of seats in MBBS course 100 to 150 at Saraswati Institute of Medical Sciences, Hapur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Increase of seats in MBBS course 100 to 150 at Saraswati Institute of Medical Sciences, Hapur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the legal opinion of Shri Gaurav Sharma, Council Advocate obtained in the previous year, in the similar matter with regard to essentiality certificate, the operative part of which reads as under:

19. *'Under these circumstances and especially having regard to the order passed by the Id. Division Bench of the Hon'ble Orissa High Court dt. 09.04.14, my advice is as under:-*

- (i) *The MCI should process, forthwith, not only the case of Institute of Medical Sciences and SUM Hospital, Bhubaneswar but also the Saraswati Institute of Medical Sciences, Hapur on the premise that the requirement to furnish the Essentiality Certificate and consent of affiliation for increase of seats from 100 to 150 MBBS admissions annually stands fulfilled subject to verification by the MCI."*

It was also observed by the Committee that on the same Essentiality Certificate, the application of the institute was processed for grant of LOP last year also.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to process the application of the Institute further for grant of LOP for the current year also.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the legal opinion of Shri Gaurav Sharma, Council Advocate obtained in the previous year, in the similar matter with regard to essentiality certificate, the operative part of which reads as under:

19. *'Under these circumstances and especially having regard to the order passed by the Id. Division Bench of the Hon'ble Orissa High Court dt. 09.04.14, my advice is as under:-*

- (i) *The MCI should process, forthwith, not only the case of Institute of Medical Sciences and SUM Hospital, Bhubaneswar but also the Saraswati Institute of Medical Sciences, Hapur on the premise that the requirement to furnish the Essentiality Certificate and consent of affiliation for increase of seats from 100 to 150 MBBS admissions annually stands fulfilled subject to verification by the MCI. "*

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to process the application of the institute further for grant of LOP for the current year also.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (28th & 29th October, 2014) and decided to recommend to the Central Government to renew the permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 at Padmashree Dr. D.Y. Patil Medical College, Pune under Dr. D.Y. Patil University, Pune for the academic session 2015-16.

66. **Mahatma Gandhi Medical College & Research, Pondicherry – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16– regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Mahatma Gandhi Medical College & Research, Pondicherry – Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (29th & 30th October, 2014) and decided to recommend to the Central Government to renew the permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 at Mahatma Gandhi Medical College & Research, Pondicherry under Sri Balaji Vidyapeeth, Pondicherry (Deemed University) for the academic session 2015-16.

67. **R.G. Kar Medical College, Kolkata – Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to R.G. Kar Medical College, Kolkata – Renewal of Permission for admission of 4th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (28th & 29th October, 2014) and noted the following:-

1. Lecture Theaters: there are 2 lecture theaters of 260 capacity each and 2 of 180 each in the college against requirement of 5 of 240 capacity and 1 of 500 capacity as per Regulations. Facility for E class is not available.
2. Central Library: Area is 1,300 sq.m. against requirement of 3,200 sq.m. as per Regulations. Sitting capacity is 200 against requirement of 400. Outside reading room is not available. Post of Librarian & Dy. Librarian are vacant.
3. Residents' Hostel: Rooms are small and congested. Cleanliness is required.
4. OPD: Teaching areas except in ENT OPD are small.
5. Overall hospital cleanliness is not maintained. It requires improvement.
6. Wards: Distance between 2 beds is not 1.5 m in many wards.
7. Only 4 mobile X-ray units are available against requirement of 6 as per Regulations.

8. Only 4 static X-ray units are available against requirement of 6 as per Regulations.
9. CSSD is not available.
10. Anatomy Department: Demonstration rooms are small. There are only 150 mounted specimens. Microscopes are not well maintained. Cleanliness is not well maintained.
11. Biochemistry Department: Demonstration Rooms are small. Audiovisual aids in Demonstration room are not working.
12. Demonstration rooms of Physiology, Pathology are small. No details of Demonstration rooms for Community Medicine Department are provided.
13. RHTC: There are no visits of specialists in the month of October 2014.
14. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 4th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 of R.G. Kar Medical College, Kolkata under West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

68. **Krishna Institute of Medical Sciences, Karad – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Krishna Institute of Medical Sciences, Karad – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (31st October, 2014 and 1st November, 2014) and noted the following:-

1. OPD: There are 3 examination rooms in each department against requirement of 4 rooms as per Regulations. Separate injection room for males & females are not available.
2. Wards: Demonstration room is not available in any ward. Pantry & Store room are not available in any ward.
3. Casualty OPD attendance register was not produced before assessors.
4. Lecture Theatres: There is no facility for E class.
5. Special investigations like Barium, IVP are not performed.
6. Central suction is not available.
7. RICU is not available.
8. RHTC: Facilities for cooking & dining are not available.
9. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 of Krishna Institute of Medical Sciences, Karad under Krishna Institute of Medical Sciences University (Deemed), Karad u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

69. **Nilratan Sircar Medical College, Kolkata – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Nilratan Sircar Medical College, Kolkata – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (27th & 28th October, 2014) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 14.83 % (i.e. 35 out of 236) as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 13.82 % (i.e. 26 out of 138) as detailed in the report.
3. Lecture Theatre: One lecture theatre of 650 capacity is not available. Lecture theatre in hospital of capacity 100 which is smaller than required. Facility for E class is not available.
4. Central Library: Area is 3,000 sq.m. against requirement of 4,000 sq.m. required as per regulations. It is not organized. Only 83 journals are available against requirement of 100. Only 8 Internet nodes are available against requirement of 50.
5. Students' Hostels: Accommodation available is for 852 students against requirement of 937. Room is shared by 4 students which is not as per norms. There are 2 dormitories occupied by 20 boys. In Girls' hostel also there are dormitories shared by 15-20 girls. Dormitories are not permissible in students' hostels. There is absolutely no hygiene.
6. Interns' Hostel: Accommodation available is for only 148 interns against requirement of 250. There is absolutely no hygiene.
7. Residents' Hostel: Accommodation available is for only 94 Residents against requirement of 189. There is absolutely no hygiene.
8. Residential Quarters: Only 20 quarters are available for faculty against requirement of 47.
9. OPD: Waiting area for patients is not adequate. There are only 2 examination rooms in Surgery, Orthopaedics & ENT OPDs. Separate injection rooms for males & females are not available. Minor OT is available but not used.
10. Speech Therapy is not available. Audiometry room is available but there is no Audiologist.
11. In Paediatrics OPD, Child Welfare Clinic is not available.
12. Most of the wards do not have adjoining teaching rooms and doctors' duty room.
13. Teaching Units: In General Surgery, only 6 Units are functional against requirement of 8. In Orthopaedics, only 3 Units are functional against requirement of 5. Unitwise distribution of beds in different Units is not clear in Paediatrics & General Medicine.
14. MRD: ICD X classification of diseases is not used for indexing of diseases. Statistician is not available.
15. O.T.s: Preoperative beds are not available. Only 5 postoperative beds are available in one O.T. complex. Postoperative beds are not available in other O.T. complexes.
16. RICU is not available.
17. AERB approval is not available.
18. Nursing Staff: 682 nurses are available against requirement of 703.
19. Paramedical & Nonteaching Staff: 148 staff are available against requirement of 182.
20. Website: Details of CME programmes & academic activities are not updated.
21. Demonstration rooms in department of Anatomy, Physiology & Biochemistry are smaller than required.
22. Physiology Department: Only 2 Demonstration Rooms are available against requirement of 4. Clinical Physiology laboratory is not available.
23. Forensic Medicine Department: Only 1 Demonstration Room is available against requirement of 4.
24. RHTC: Facilities for cooking & dining are not available.
25. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 of Nilratan Sircar Medical College, Kolkata under West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

70. **Vydehi Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Bangalore – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Vydehi Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Bangalore – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (30th & 31st October, 2014) and decided to recommend to the Central Government to renew the permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-250 u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 at Vydehi Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Bangalore under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore for the academic session 2015-16.

71. **Report of the Sub-Committee regarding concerns raised by Parliamentary Standing Committee on SC/ST.**

Read: the matter with regard to report of the Sub-Committee regarding concerns raised by Parliamentary Standing Committee on SC/ST.

The Executive Committee of the Council accepted the report of the Sub-Committee regarding concerns raised by Parliamentary Standing Committee on SC/ST and directed the office to send the report of the Sub-Committee to the Parliamentary Standing Committee through the Central Government, Ministry of Health & FW.

72. **Govt. Medical College, Kozhikode – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 200 to 250 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to Govt. Medical College, Kozhikode – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 200 to 250 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to defer the consideration of the matter for the next meeting.

73. **S.V. Medical College, Tirupati – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to S.V. Medical College, Tirupati – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 150-200 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to defer the consideration of the matter for the next meeting.

74. **M.P. Shah Medical College, Jamnagar – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 175-200 for the academic session 2015-16 – regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to M.P. Shah Medical College, Jamnagar – Renewal of Permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 175-200 for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to defer the consideration of the matter for the next meeting.

75. **Renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at Institute of Medical Sciences & SUM Hospital, Bhubaneswar for the academic session 2015-16– regarding.**

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of Permission for admission of 2nd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 at Institute of Medical Sciences & SUM Hospital, Bhubaneswar for the academic session 2015-16.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the agenda note and legal opinion of the Council Advocate which is as under:-

“My opinion is sought as regards the situation arising out of the withdrawal of Essentiality Certificate dated 12/01/2004 granted by the Government of Orissa for 150 MBBS seats to the Institute of Medical Sciences & SUM Hospital, on 24/07/2014. On perusal of the noting sheet it appears that the application of the College for increase in intake from 100 to 150 MBBS seats was processed by the Council on the strength of the Essentiality Certificate dated 12/01/2004 and after inspection a positive recommendation was made to the Central Government. Accordingly, it is noted that the Central Government had on 08/07/14 granted conditional permission for increase in intake from 100 to 150 MBBS seats and vide letter dated 31.07.14 removed the condition in view of compliance and Bank Guarantee received by the Central Government.

Meanwhile, the Principal Secretary, to the Government of Odisha vide his letter dated 17.07.14 has addressed a letter to the President, MCI seeking an enquiry into the circumstances leading to recommendation for increase of MBBS seats to 150. This was duly enquired into and the reply by the Secretary, MCI was communicated to the Govt. of Odisha vide letter dated 18.07.14. Subsequently, the Govt. of Odisha vide its letter dated 24.07.14 had informed the College that it had withdrawn the Essentiality Certificate dated 12.01.2004. Further, it is stated in this withdrawal letter that the “concurrence of the State Government for MBBS seats in your institution is 100 and you are free to apply for Essentiality Certificate for the increase in seats in prescribed format.” The copy of this letter is endorsed to the Central Govt., MCI and DMET, Bhubaneswar.

It is apparent from above that the withdrawal of Essentiality Certificate had taken place on 24.07.14 and the grant of conditional letter of permission is on 08/07/14 and unconditional letter of permission by the Central Government is on 31.07.14. There is no correspondence on file with regard to the issue of withdrawal of Essentiality Certificate by the Govt. of Odisha from the Central Government, although the copy of the withdrawal letter by Govt. of Odisha was duly marked to the Central Government.

In view of the above factual matrix, it appears that:-

- (i) *The Govt. of Odisha has taken the categorical stand that once the permission of Central Govt., based upon its Essentiality Certificate for 150 MBBS seats has been granted for 100 MBBS seats, its concurrence automatically gets changed to 100 seats.*
- (ii) *The contention of MCI in its letter dated 18.07.14 addressed to the Principal Secretary, Govt. of Odisha is that the Essentiality Certificate remains valid for the number of seats for which it has been issued and in case, an applicant seeks increase, in absence of any communication from the State Government for such automatic concurrence, the application for increase in terms of Regulations is required to be processed.*
- (iii) *The State Government in its letter has made it clear that the concurrence of the State Government is for 100 MBBS seats only.*
- (iv) *The application for renewal of permission from the College for admission of 2nd batch against the increase in intake from 100 to 150 MBBS seats has been received.*

Concerning the processing of application for renewal of permission, I am of the view that in view of withdrawal of Essentiality Certificate by the State Government, an opportunity be granted to the College authorities to submit a valid Essentiality Certificate for renewal of permission and for admission 2nd batch of 150 MBBS students for the academic year 2015-16. The College authorities may be also informed that in case, it fails to submit the valid Essentiality Certificate for 150 MBBS seats from the State Govt. its application would be recommended to the Central Govt. for disapproval. A copy of this letter may be also marked to the Central Govt. and State Govt.”

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to accept the above legal opinion of the Council Advocate and directed the office to inform the college authorities to submit the valid Essentiality Certificate for 150 seats from the State Govt. for further action by the Council within 15 days. A copy of the letter may also be marked to the Central Govt.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (31st Oct. & 1st November, 2014) and decided to recommend to the Central Government to renew the permission for MBBS course for 3rd batch (100 seats) of Government Thiruvannamalai Medical College, Thiruvannamalai under the Tamilnadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

77. **Assessment of the physical and other teaching facilities available for renewal of permission for MBBS course for 3rd batch (100 seats) of ESIC Medical College, Chennai, Tamilnadu under The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.**

Read: the matter with regard to assessment of the physical and other teaching facilities available for renewal of permission for MBBS course for 3rd batch (100 seats) of ESIC Medical College, Chennai, Tamilnadu under The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (31st October & 1st November, 2014) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 27.86 % as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 28.43 % as detailed in report.
3. College building is still under construction. Dean's office and college office are presently located in hospital building.
4. Dr. M. Kanheswari, designated as Medical Superintendent, has not been assigned any administrative powers in running of the hospital. Dr. Uma Kulshreshtha is administrative Medical Superintendent but holds M.B;B.S. degree only and thus is not eligible to hold the post. Further such arrangement is not permitted under Regulations.
5. Office of Medical Superintendent is inadequate. There is no proper seating arrangement for Medical Superintendent. Other clerical staff have tables in the same office.
6. Teaching areas in OPD are small. Minor OPDs do not have teaching areas.
7. As the institute is also running PG courses which require 30 beds in each Unit, Teaching Beds are deficient as under:

8. Wards: Demonstration rooms are inadequate both in facility and capacity as detailed in report. No Demonstration rooms are available with Paediatrics, Psychiatry & Skin & VD and it is shared with General Medicine. Orthopaedics department shares it with General Surgery.
9. MRD is partly computerized.
10. Speech therapy is not available.
11. Central Library: There are no proper seating arrangements. Only plastic chairs and some tables are available without air-conditioning facility. Post of Librarian is still vacant.
12. Anatomy Department: Number of mounted specimens is only 100.
13. Departments of Pathology, Pharmacology & Forensic Medicine are nonfunctional as only space under construction is available.
14. Microbiology Department: 7 service laboratories are not available. Students' laboratory is shared with Community Medicine.
15. Community Medicine: There is no practical laboratory as it is under construction. Most of the areas are without fittings and fixtures.
16. RHTC: Cold chain equipment, and Survey/MCH/Immunization/FW registers are not available.
17. UHC is provided on 3rd floor of ESIC hospital which is not as per norms.
18. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for MBBS course for 3rd batch (100 seats) of ESIC Medical College, Chennai, Tamilnadu under The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2015-2016.

78. **Payment of pending bills of Shri Nidhesh Gupta, Senior Advocate and Shri Amit Kumar, former Standing Counsel of MCI in National Eligibility Entrance Test cases before the Hon'ble Supreme Court.**

81. **Minutes of the Academic Committee meetings held on 28th October, 2014-approval of.**

Read: the matter with regard to minutes of the Academic Committee meeting held on 28th October, 2014.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the minutes of the Academic Committee meeting held on 28th October, 2014 except item no.3. The members of E.C. observed that the minutes of Academic Committee contain several recommendations which have widespread ramifications and therefore require wide consultations; E.g.

Item 3 pertaining to E journals: While recommending that E journals be considered, it appears that the Academic Committee has not considered the issues and problems related with connectivity across the country, broadband availability throughout the country, difficulty of retrieval, particularly of full text articles with diagrams and charts, 24x7 availability of internet access, fluctuations in power supply widely prevalent in the country, recall value of print material v/s virtual medium, Nonavailability of full text journals & Articles through electronic medium, downtime of servers, etc. It was also observed that if eJournals were to be accepted, the present requirement of 50 nodes may not be sufficient and adequate as there would be not less than 700 users for a 100 seat college and 1000 users for a 150 seat college. It was also observed that frequently the speed is so slow that it takes 15 minutes or more to download a single article, thereby reducing practical utility of the same.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided that the minutes of above item no.3 be referred back to Academic Committee for further necessary action and to approve the minutes of the remaining items.

82. **Change the name of hospital from Welsh Mission Hospital to Dr. H. Gordon Roberts Hospitals, Shillong – req.**

Read: the matter with regard to change the name of hospital from Welsh Mission Hospital to Dr. H. Gordon Roberts Hospitals, Shillong.

The Executive Committee of the Council accepted the change of the name of hospital from Welsh Mission Hospital to Dr. H. Gordon Roberts Hospitals, Shillong since it is in the Council' s list of recognized non-teaching hospitals for compulsory internship.

83. **Approval of the minutes of the Migration Sub-Committee held on 08th October, 2014 – req.**

Read: the matter with regard to approval of the minutes of the Migration Sub-Committee held on 08th October, 2014.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the minutes of the Migration Sub-Committee held on 08th October, 2014 except item no. 3 & 4. In item no.3, the migration of Bhaveshgiri Surajgiri Gauswami from D.Y. Patil Medical College, Hospital & Research Centre, Pune to NHL Municipal Medical College, Gujarat has been allowed by the Migration Sub-Committee. However, NHL Municipal Medical College has not provided the vacancy position as requested vide Council letter dt. 12.09.2014, till date. It was noted by the Executive Committee of the Council that in the mean time the candidate has furnished another NOC from Pramukhswami Medical College, Karamsad. It was further noted that the candidate has passed Ist Prof. examination on 02.08.2014 whereas the Dean, Pramukhswami Medical College, Karamsad has issued No Objection Certificate dt. 10th Oct. 2014 i.e. after 2 months and 8 days which is not

permissible as per clause 6(3) & 6(4) of the Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997.

In item no.4, the candidate Ruth Ann Mathew Kalathil is studying at Indira Gandhi Medical College & Research Institute, Puducherry which is not recognized by the Council but permitted for renewal of permission for the academic year 2014-15 u/s 10(A) for 150 seats. As per Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997, clause 6(2) states that both the colleges, i.e. one at which the student is studying at present and one to which migration is sought, are recognized by the Medical Council of India.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to disapprove the item no.3&4 of the Migration Sub-Committee minutes dt. 8th Oct.2014.

84. Recognition of medical qualifications obtained from Crimea State Medical University – Consideration of.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition of medical qualifications obtained from Crimea State Medical University – Consideration of.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to recognition of medical qualifications obtained from Crimea State Medical University and accepted the legal opinion of the Law Officer which reads as under:-

"I have perused the representation dated 13.08.2014 and 02.09.2014 received from Ministry of Health & F.W. Vide these letters the Ministry had called upon the Council to find out solution for students who have taken admission in MBBS in Ukraine on or after 16.4.2010. The Ministry vide its letter dated 02.09.2014 has forwarded a copy of letter dated 25.08.2014 of the Indian Ambassador in Kyiv, Ukraine. Vide this letter the Indian Embassy has informed that Indian Medical Students numbering about 1000 are studying in Lungsk and Tontsk. The Embassy has stated that these students had to be evacuated by the Embassy of India Kyiv in 2014 on war like condition. The Embassy of India has further stated that:-

4. *"In view of the rapidly deteriorating security situation, the Ukrainian Minister of Education vide letter dated 4 August 2014 (Google transaction attached) had recommended to the Rectors of the Lugansk State Medical University and Donetsk State Medical University that the transfer of foreign students to other universities in other regions of Ukraine should be facilitated as continuation of education was not possible in view of the difficult socio-political situation in the Donetsk and Lugansk regions. The Ministry of Education and Science of Ukraine also advised that no foreign student should be admitted in the academic year 2014-15. The Ministry further advised through the Ukrainian Study Centre for International Education website on 6 August 2014 that international students studying in Donetsk and Lugansk should transfer to educational institutions in other regions of Ukraine.*

In view of the fact that the Ukrainian Government itself has recommended foreign students in educational institutions in Donetsk and Lugansk to shift to educational institutions in other regions, the Embassy has likewise urged Indian students in these regions to accordingly seek transfer as per the advice of the Ukrainian Ministry of Education and Science.

From the foregoing it is clear that the Indian students studying in Donetsk State Medical University and the Lugansk State Medical University have no option but to shift in view of the war like conditions obtaining in the regions of their study and seek a transfer to other regions of Ukraine. The Medical Council of India may please be asked to clarify that such Indian students

would be exempted from the requirement of completing the entire duration of the course from the same educational institute from where they obtain their medical degree.

I shall be grateful for an early reply as there are more than 1000 anxious Indian students who are seeking this clarification even as they are in the process of shifting to medical universities in other regions of Ukraine. The Embassy has approached the Ukrainian Ministry of Education and Science for a full list of accredited medical colleges/universities whose degrees are recognized by the Ukrainian Government for purposes of medical practice in Ukraine. This would be shared with the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare and Medical Council of India on receipt."

After perusal of these documents, I am of the view that in order to meet with exigencies as stated in the letter of Ambassador of India in Kyiv wherein the life of Indian citizens pursuing medical education is put in distress/peril on account of war like situation, in Ukraine certain exceptions are required to be carried out in Screening Test Regulations to meet with such exigencies.

Therefore, I am of the considered view that in Clause 4(3) of the Screening Test Regulation needs amendment and a proviso may be added to Clause 4(3) of Screening Test Regulation whereby an exception is created to deal with situations enumerated in the letter' of Embassy of India in Ukraine. The said amendment could be formulated as under:-

"Provided in cases where Central Government is informed of war like or any such situation wherein life of Indian citizen is in distress and such information has been received through the Indian Embassy in that country then the Council shall with prior approval of Central Government relax the requirement of obtaining medical education: from the same institute located abroad in respect of which communication has been received from the Indian Embassy in that country."

In view of above opinion, the Committee further decided that amendment may be made in clause 4(3) of the Screening Test Regulation and a proviso may be added to Clause 4(3) of Screening Test Regulation as suggested by Council Advocate.

85. **Approval of the Minutes of the Registration & Equivalence committee held on 16th Sept, 2014.**

Read: the matter with regard to approval of the Minutes of the Registration & Equivalence committee held on 16th Sept, 2014.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed as under:

Item 3: It was observed that Dr. Vani L.P. has enclosed only the license from Commonwealth of Pennsylvania but no Board certificate of having passed the Board examination seems to have been enclosed. Till such a Board certificate is also available, the request cannot be considered.

Item 5: The sub-committee has recommended for grant of additional registration of a qualification in Trauma & Orthopaedic Surgery which is not in the list of prescribed qualifications of the Council.

Item 7: It was observed that Dr. S. Chapyala has enclosed only the license from Texas Board but no Board certificate of having passed the Board examination seems to have been enclosed. Till such a Board certificate is also available, the request cannot be considered.

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to refer back the above items to Registration & Equivalence Committee and to approve the minutes of the remaining items.

86. **Minutes of the Ethics Committee meeting held on 1st September, 2014 and 30th September, 2014, for approval.**

Read: the matter with regard to minutes of the Ethics Committee meeting held on 1st September, 2014 and 30th September, 2014.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the minutes of the Ethics Committee dated 01.09.2014 and observed as under:

Item 4: (P. 34): The item pertains to R.C. 24(A)/2010 of CBI, ACB, Chennai for initiation of Regular departmental action for major penalty against 8 doctors nominated by MCI for inspection and such action as deemed fit against 70 teaching faculties of Sri Laxmi Narayana Institute of Medical Sciences, Pondicherry. It was observed that the whole discussion in the item is regarding action being taken against 70 faculty. (P. 34 – 60). Nothing is mentioned about the first part of the R.C. concerning action against inspectors.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to refer this item back to Ethics Committee and approved the minutes of the remaining items.

With regards to minutes of Meeting of Ethics Committee dt. 30/09/2014, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to approve the same.

87. **Status Report of RFID System and Faculty Identification, Tracking and Monitoring System constituted by the Executive Committee.**

Read: the matter with regard to Status Report of RFID System and Faculty Identification, Tracking and Monitoring System constituted by the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the revised model as proposed by M/s Rasilent Technologies and approved by sub-committee involves substantial changes in the design and architecture while implementing the project. It was also observed that the scope of work has also increased substantially. It was also observed that in the report of the sub-committee, there is no mention of financial implications in as much as (i) the proposed changes would be cheaper or costlier as compared with expenditure approved in tender & (ii) whether the proposed work would be finished within the approved tender cost or whether there would be cost escalation or in case the proposed changes result in cheaper costs, the same would be passed on to MCI / colleges or not.

In view of above, the committee decided to obtain legal opinion from Law Officer of the Council whether the same tender would still be valid or fresh tender would have to be called for.

88. **Constitution of Selection Committee for the post of Deputy Secretary (Medical).**

Read: the matter with regard to Constitution of Selection Committee for the post of Deputy Secretary (Medical).

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to constitution of Selection Committee for the post of Deputy Secretary (Medical) and decided to constitute the Selection Committee of the following members:-

Read: the matter with regard to Increase of seats in MBBS course from 150 to 250 at M.K.C.G. Medical College, Brahmapur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the agenda note was incomplete and decided to defer the consideration of the matter for the next meeting and further directed the Accounts Section of the Council to submit a detailed status note incorporating the following issues:

- (a) What is the fee received for application for increase for 2014-15 (i.e. last year)?
- (b) What is the fee received for application for increase for 2015-16 (i.e. current year)?
- (c) After the application for increase has been returned to Central Govt. recommending disapproval, has the college asked for refund of application fees ?
- (d) Can such a refund be granted as per existing Regulations ?

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the agenda note was incomplete and decided to defer the consideration of the matter for the next meeting and further directed the Accounts Section of the Council to submit a detailed status note incorporating the following issues:

92. Dr. Deshkar Atul Manoharrao, Reg. NO. 83511, Cancellation of Registration Certificate.

Read: the matter with regard to Dr. Deshkar Atul Manoharrao, Reg. NO. 83511, Cancellation of Registration Certificate.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to Dr. Deshkar Atul Manoharrao, Reg. NO. 83511, Cancellation of Registration Certificate and decided to approve the same.

93. Admission of 1st year MBBS student at Integral Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Lucknow in the Academic Year 2013-14.

Read: the matter with regard to Admission of 1st year MBBS student at Integral Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Lucknow in the Academic Year 2013-14.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the following students have been admitted with less than 50% marks in PMT examination which is less than the required percentage of marks as per Regulation 5.5 (ii) of the Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997:-

The Committee further perused the opinion of Law Officer, the operative part of which reads as under:

“... 3. The provisions of Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997 are loud and clear that the eligibility to sit in entrance examination is on the basis of marks obtained in the qualifying examination. These marks have no relevance in the drawing up of merit list of the Common Entrance Test. The aspirant for medical seats are required to obtain the prescribed percentage of marks in the CET to be eligible for consideration in the merit list that is drawn by the Examination Holding Authority. The marks of qualifying examination cannot be added in my opinion to the marks of CET to draw up a merit list, as has been done by the Institute. Accordingly, I endorse the fining of Monitoring Cell and am of the opinion that, a discharge notice for the students admitted in violation of the provisions of Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 1997 is required to be issued in the matter.”

In view of above, it was decided to accept the legal opinion and direct the institute to discharge all the students who have been admitted in violation of Regulations pertaining to minimum marks for eligibility for admission to M.B;B.S. course and submit the compliance within 2 weeks.

94. Award of Contract for Canteen and Catering Services in the Council Office.

Read: the matter with regard to award of Contract for Canteen and Catering Services in the Council Office.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to award of contract for Canteen and Catering Services in the Council Office and noted that only a single tender had been received and therefore directed the office to re-advertise the same. It was further decided to continue with the existing contractor with the same terms and conditions till then.

95. Award of Contract for providing Security Services to the Council Office.

Read: the matter with regard to award of Contract for providing Security Services to the Council Office.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to award of contract for providing Security Services to the Council Office and decided that the contract be awarded to L1 i.e. M/s. Well Protect Manpower Services Pvt. Ltd. (initially for a period of one year) as per the comparative statement since the EPF rules and minimum wages rules were also being followed by them.

96. Award of Contract for Travel Services to the Council Office.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to award of Contract for Travel Services to the Council Office and decided to refer back the item to the Sub-Committee for giving detailed observations. Till then the services of M/s. ANS Travels be continued.

97. Segregation of Electives in the Rotating Internship Programme.

Read: the matter with regard to segregation of Electives in the Rotating Internship Programme.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to segregation of Electives in the Rotating Internship Programme and approved the following proposal of the office:

"It is proposed that the 8 electives as incorporated in the governing regulation be segregated as under:-

1. **Medicine & Allied Specialities**
 - i) *Dermatology and sexually Transmitted Diseases.*
 - ii) *Psychiatry*
 - iii) *Tuberculosis and Respiratory Diseases*
 - iv) *Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation*
 - v) *Forensic Medicine & Toxicology*
2. **Surgery & Allied Specialities**
 - i) *Anaesthesia*
 - ii) *Radio-Diagnosis*
 - iii) *Blood Bank & Transfusion Department*

It be clearly prescribed that every intern shall do two electives of 15 days each cumulatively of one month duration in one elective each from the first group including Medicine & Allied Specialities and the second group including Surgical & Allied Specialities respectively."

98. Inclusion of Recognized Medical Schools in the “World Directory of Medical Schools” maintained by World Federation of Medical Education.

Read: the matter with regard to inclusion of Recognized Medical Schools in the “World Directory of Medical Schools” maintained by World Federation of Medical Education.

The Executive Committee of the Council approved the recommendations of the Chairman, Academic Committee that the recognition accorded to a medical schools under the ambit of Medical Council of India in terms of Section 11(2) of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 should be construed as Accreditation of the concerned medical schools for the purposes of its inclusion in the World Directory of Medical Schools maintained by World Federation of Medical Education.

99. Minutes of meeting of the TEQ committee held on 2.5.2014, 7.7.2014 & 7.11.2014 - approval of.

Read: the matter with regard to Minutes of meeting of the TEQ committee held on 2.5.2014, 7.7.2014 & 7.11.2014.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed and decided as under:

(1) Minutes of 02/05/2014:

The following items are referred back:

Item 8: Command Hospital, Kolkata is an institute where various PG courses have been permitted by Govt. of India subsequent to recommendation from MCI. Hence it cannot be said that it is not a teaching institute. The letter of 2003 pertained to those institutes which were teaching institutes at that point of time. Institutes & Hospitals where Graduate or Postgraduate courses have been permitted subsequently by Govt. Of India / MCI cannot be denied status as a teaching institute merely on the basis that their names are not included in that letter.

Item 11: No decision has been taken by TEQ sub-committee. Hence a decision has to be taken by the sub-committee.

Item 12: MH(CTC) SC is an affiliated hospital to AFMC, Pune and therefore is a teaching hospital.

Additional Recommendations:

Point 2. Considering all authors of a publication: Present Regulations permit only first or second author to be considered in respect of publications. All authors cannot be considered as per present Regulations.

Point 4. Post Diploma 1 year experience for DNB candidates: This has to be considered in view of present Regulations.

Rest of items are approved.

Meeting Dt. 07/07/2014:

The following items be referred back:

Item 2: As the matter pertains to issuing false experience certificates, it is beyond purview of TEQ committee. It be referred to Ethics Committee.

Item 5A (4) The post of Lecturer in Statistics is a post in the cadre of Lecturer – i.e. Asst. Prof. for which the prescribed qualification is M.Sc. Only. Ph.D. As an academic qualification is required only for the higher posts which is not the case here. Hence Ph.D. is not required to be inserted as a qualification. The post of Pharmaceutical Chemist is already abolished by way amendment in 2008/2009. Hence no qualification is required to be prescribed.

Item 9 B: The provisions of PG Regulations amendment of March 2005 were applicable where PG courses under affiliation to a University with prior permission of Central Govt. were already running. This matter be reexamined in this view and resubmitted.

Rest of items are approved.

(2) Meeting Dt. 07/11/2014

The following items be referred back:

Item 1: Amendment to Clause 11 (1)(d)

Subcommittee has recommended that graduate training may also be included (Not only PG). It has also recommended institutions where training is “contemplated” be included. These recommendations of the sub-committee defeat very essence of 2005 amendment which was created for those institutes **where PG courses under affiliation to a University were already running**. An institute which is offering graduate training would automatically come within purview of MCI and does not require any amendment. The word “**Contemplated**” would virtually mean any institute and all of them would become eligible as any one can claim they are ‘contemplating: Postgraduate courses.

Amendment to TEQ Regulations:

By including 300 bedded hospital, any hospital would qualify and no purpose would be served by this amendment.

Item 2: For reconsideration in light of Gazette Notification dated 7th March, 2008 from Govt. of India, Ministry of Health & FW for grant of additional qualification registration.

Item 6: AFMC, Pune is a teaching institute. Names of hospitals in Lucknow & Delhi Cant. are not mentioned. However, Command Hospital Lucknow & R & R Hospital & Base Hospital in Delhi Cant. are teaching institutes.

Item 11: A teacher cannot be considered simultaneously in both general department and super speciality department. He has to choose either of them and once having chosen a particular stream, he necessarily foregoes his claim a teacher in another stream for that period.

Rest of items may be approved.

100. NOC for undergoing Compulsory rotating internship training for 10 months in Keck School of Medicine, University of Southern California United States of America in respect of Mr. Vinay Paul Goswamy- req.

Read: the matter with regard to NOC for undergoing Compulsory rotating internship training for 10 months in Keck School of Medicine, University of Southern California United States of America in respect of Mr. Vinay Paul Goswamy.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the matter with regard to NOC for undergoing Compulsory rotating internship training for 10 months in Keck School of Medicine, University of Southern California United States of America in respect of Mr. Vinay Paul Goswamy and decided to inform Mr. Vinay Paul Goswamy to re-schedule his postings as per MCI Regulations on Graduate Medical Education, 1997.

101. Disciplinary proceedings against Dr. A.R.N. Setalvad, the then Secretary, Dr. K.K. Arora, Dy. Secretary & Others – PE – 15(A)/2005-DLI registered by CBI – req.

Read: the matter with regard to Disciplinary proceedings against Dr. A.R.N. Setalvad, the then Secretary, Dr. K.K. Arora, Dy. Secretary & Others – PE – 15(A)/2005-DLI registered by CBI.

The Executive Committee of the Council took a note of office memorandum dated 30.10.2014 received from the Director, CVC informing as under:-

“It is observed that the charges against Dr. ARN Setalvad, Dr. K.K. Arora, Dr. V.P. Mishra, Smt. S. Savita and Sh. Manoj Kumar were mainly related to recruitment of one LDC, who was over-age and some irregularity in awarding the contract. MCI has constituted two high level Enquiry Committee and they observed that for the said irregularity in recruitment the dealing staffs had been warned and in the case of irregularity of building contract, the Enquiry Committee had found no merit in the charge sheet and recommended for exoneration of Dr. V.P. Mishra and D.K. Sharma and Dr. K.K. Arora.

As regards building contract, the Commission in agreement with the recommendation of CVO and DA would advise exoneration of Dr. K.K. Arora, Dr. V.P. Mishra, Smt. Savita and Sh. Manoj Kumar.

In view of above, Commission in agreement with the DA and CVO would advise the Department to close the matter.”

The Executive Committee of the Council further noted that the Chief Vigilance Officer of the Council vide his note dated 18.11.2014 has stated that “since the Central Vigilance Commission has agreed with the recommendation of the CVO and disciplinary authority and advised exoneration of Dr. K.K. Arora, Dr. V.P. Mishra, Smt. Savitha and Sh. Manoj Kumar, the matter may be closed and further it is recommended that the name of Smt Savitha may be deleted from the list of doubtful integrity 2014-15.”

The Executive Committee further observed that pursuant to the registration of enquiry, two enquiry committees were appointed as under:

(1) One committee comprising of Mr. Justice S.K. Mahajan, Dr. Bhanu Dubey & Dr. Manoj Singh to enquire into charges against Dr. ARN Setalvad Smt. S. Savita and Sh. Manoj Kumar were mainly related to recruitment of one LDC;

(2) One Committee comprising of Mr. Justice S.K. Mahajan, Dr. D.J. Borah & Dr. T.P. Dogra to enquire into the charges against Dr. V.P. Mishra, Dr. D.K. Sharma & Dr. K.K. Arora related to award of contract for the new building.

Both these enquiry committees have given separate reports recommending no further action and exonerating all the concerned members and employees. These reports have been accepted by the disciplinary authority at the relevant point of time and the Central Govt. has also been informed accordingly.

The Executive Committee of the Council further noted that when Central Vigilance Commission has advised the department to close the matter and therefore nothing survives in the matter, why have the names of Dr. A.R.N. Setalvad, the then Secretary & Dr. D.K. Sharma been left out in the note regarding those who have been exonerated.

It was further observed that as Central Vigilance Commission has advised that the matter be closed, nothing further survives in the matter.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to obtain legal opinion in the matter before taking a decision to exonerate Dr. A.R.N. Setalvad, the then Secretary, Dr. K.K. Arora, Dr. V.P. Mishra, Dr. D.K. Sharma, Smt. Savitha and Sh. Manoj Kumar.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.
