Minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee held on 30th January, 2016 at 11:00 a.m. in the Council Office at Sector 8, Pocket 14, Dwarka, New Delhi.

Apology for absence was received from Dr. Anil Mahajan, Dr. K.K. Gupta, Dr. V.N. Jindal and Dr. B.S. Aulakh.

At the outset, the Executive Committee of the Council took the following decision:

- *In future all those applications which were deficient in terms of Essentiality Certificate/Consent of Affiliation/Fees/Form-5 regarding land be returned at the level of the Council Office itself and need not be brought before the Executive Committee.*
- *The Committee further resolved that once a degree of any university is recognized then for any college under the same university, the assessment to oversee the conduct of examination for that degree is not required; the assessment would be carried out only for verifying facilities available at the institute in terms of faculty, Residents, clinical material, infrastructure of college, hospital, hostels, residential*

quarters, library, etc. and other ancillary and miscellaneous facilities required as per regulations for the purpose of recognition of the degree awarded to the students of the particular college under section 11(2) of IMC Act, 1956. It was decided to place the same before the General Body of the Council for its approval.

1. **Minutes of the Executive Committee meeting held on 28th December, 2015 – Confirmation of.**

The Executive Committee of the Council confirmed the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting held on 28th December, 2015.

2. **Minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee – Action taken thereon.**

The Executive Committee of the Council noted the action taken on the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting held on 28th December, 2015 and further noted the following:

Item No.4: Minutes of TEQ Sub-Committee meeting dated 30.09.2015

Item No.9 Confirmation of eligibility for the post of Assistant Professor/Associate Professor in the department of Peadiatric Oncology in respect of Dr. Nitin C. Joshi in a Medical College.

The Committee noted the explanation submitted by Mrs. Seema Gupta, UDC conveying her apology vide her letter dated 19.01.2016 and directed to issue her warning to complete the task assigned to her in-time and be more careful in future.

Item No.95. Establishment of new medical college at Coimbatore, Tamilnadu by Govt. of Tamilnadu with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G.R Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee on 28.12.2015 while considering the above matter decided to seek explanation from the Law Officer as to under which provision the opinion had been provided when a valid MoU had not been submitted by the college authorities till date and whether in principal approval can be considered as deemed approval and secondly a 20% reservations had been sought for ESIC for admitting eligible wards of Insured Persons (IPs) in the DO Letter No. 34096/MC.2/2014-16, dated 5.5.2015.

The Committee noted the explanation submitted by the Law Officer vide letter dated 16.1.2016 and observed that the hospital belongs to ESIC which is under the Central Government whereas the applicant is the State of Tamil Nadu. Any in-principle approval between Central and State Government cannot be construed as formal approval. Therefore, the Committee decided to advise the Law Officer that in future any opinion

sought from him or given by him should be based on sound law position to avoid any further litigations or controversy.

3. Pending Items arising out of the decisions taken by the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted the pending items arising out of the decisions taken by the Executive Committee and decided to call for explanation from the section which had prepared the pending items as well as the undergraduate section with regard to item no.67 (JJM Medical College, Davengere) of the present meeting which had been placed before the Executive Committee after a gap of more than one year and had never been mentioned in the pending items since it was first deferred on 20th November, 2014.

4. Establishment of new medical college at Jupudi, Krishna Dist., Andhra Pradesh by Nimra Educational Society, Hyderabad with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Jupudi, Krishna Dist., Andhra Pradesh by Nimra Educational Society, Hyderabad with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (29th & 30th December, 2015) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 10.77 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 6.52 % as detailed in the report.
3. Bed occupancy was 51.67 % on day of assessment.
4. ICUs: There was NIL patient in NICU & only 2 in ICCU on day of assessment.
5. Hostels: Facilities in recreation Rooms are not adequate.
6. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of New Medical College at Jupudi, Krishna Dist., Andhra Pradesh by Nimra Educational Society, Hyderabad under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

5. Establishment of new medical college at Marikavalasa, Vishakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh by Gayatri Vidya Parishad Society, Andhra Pradesh with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Marikavalasa, Vishakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh by Gayatri Vidya Parishad Society, Andhra Pradesh with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (29th & 30th December, 2015) alongwith a letter/representation

dated 09/01/2016 from the Dean, Gayatri Vidya Parishad Institute of Health Care and Medical Technology, Vishakhapatnam, A.P. and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 9.23 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 23.91 % as detailed in the report.
3. Most of Senior Residents are aged and not staying in hostel except during emergency duty.
4. There is no separate ward for Skin & VD. The beds are accommodated in General medicine wards.
5. Wards: Procedure room in General Medicine ward is non-functional & not equipped with emergency drugs. Demonstration Room is not available in some wards. There is no Nursing station in female Surgical ward. Treatment room, Pantry, Demonstration room & Store room are not available in female Surgical ward. Examination room, Demonstration room, Duty room, Store room are not available in Male Orthopaedics ward. Treatment room & Store room are not available in female Orthopaedic ward. Ancillary facilities are not available in Eye & ENT wards.
6. Most of patients admitted in Orthopaedics & Eye wards are not genuine. E.g. patients of Pterygion, Preoperative patients of cataract are admitted in Eye ward. In General Medicine wards, tickets are not completed with diagnosis. Most of the case papers are without proper diagnosis.
7. Radiological & Laboratory investigations workload is inadequate.
8. No Histopathology sample was received till 12:30 p.m. on day of assessment.
9. Casualty: Central O₂ and Central Suction are not available. Crash Cart is not available.
10. ICUs: There were NIL patient in PICU & only 1 patient each in MICU & NICU and 2 patients each in ICCU & SICU on day of assessment.
11. Septic O.T. is not available.
12. PNDT certificate is issued in names of 3 doctors, of whom 2 have left the institute.
13. Speech Therapy is not available.
14. Nursing Staff: 168 Nurses are available against 175 required.
15. Pharmaco Vigilance Committee: No meeting has been held during the last year.
16. Lecture Theater: E class facility is not available.
17. Central Library: It is partly air-conditioned. Nurses' Hostel: There is overcrowding as 4 or more Nurses are accommodated in a room.
18. Anatomy department: Specimens available are 120.
19. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of New Medical College at Marikavalasa, Vishakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh by Gayatri Vidya Parishad Society, Andhra Pradesh under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

6. **Establishment of new medical college at Manamai – Nellur, Tamilnadu by Ponnaiyah Institute of Medical Sciences & Technology Trust, Tamilnadu with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.**

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Manamai – Nellur, Tamilnadu by Ponnaiyah Institute of Medical Sciences & Technology Trust, Tamilnadu with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under

The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (29th & 30th December, 2015) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 46.15 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 45.65 % on day of assessment.
3. OPD attendance is 467 on day of assessment against 600 required.
4. Bed occupancy was 30 % on day of assessment.
5. Space between 2 beds is < 1.5 m in some wards.
6. There was NIL Major operation on day of assessment.
7. There was NIL Normal Delivery & Nil Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
8. Histopathology workload is shown as 92 which is not feasible as NIL Major operation was performed on day of assessment.
9. Data of patients in ICCU & ICUs on day of assessment are not provided.
10. Blood Bank license is not available.
11. Students' Hostels: Study room is not air-conditioned.
12. Anatomy department: NIL cadavers are available.
13. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of New Medical College at Manamai – Nellur, Tamilnadu by Ponnaiyah Institute of Medical Sciences & Technology Trust, Tamilnadu under The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

7. **Establishment of new medical college at Pennalur, Kancheepuram Dist., Tamilnadu by Sri Devi Karumariamman Educational Trust, Tamilnadu with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.**

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Pennalur, Kancheepuram Dist., Tamilnadu by Sri Devi Karumariamman Educational Trust, Tamilnadu with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (29th & 30th December, 2015) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 40.00 % as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 71.73 % as detailed in report.
3. OPD attendance was 430 against requirement of 600 on day of assessment.
4. Bed occupancy was only 10 % on day of assessment.
5. There were only 2 Major & NIL Minor operations for the hospital on day of assessment.
6. There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
7. Radiological & Laboratory investigations workload was very low on day of assessment.
8. Casualty: Crash Cart & Ventilator are not available.

9. O.T.: Only 1 O.T. was open against requirement of 4. The rest were locked & reported fumigated.
10. ICUs: There was NIL patient in ICCU or any ICU on day of assessment.
11. One static X-ray machine of 500 mA was not functional on day of assessment.
12. There was no unit stored in Blood Bank on day of assessment. Blood units dispensed in a day are only 0 – 1.
13. Histopathology & Cytopathology investigations are outsourced & not done in the institute.
14. Students' Hostels: They are partially furnished. Hygiene is not satisfactory.
15. Residents' Hostels: They are partially furnished. Hygiene is not satisfactory.
16. Nurses' Hostels: They are partially furnished. Hygiene is not satisfactory.
17. Speech Therapy is not available.
18. Anatomy department: Only 80 specimens are available. NIL cadavers are available.
19. Pharmaco Vigilance Committee is not constituted.
20. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of New Medical College at Pennalur, Kancheepuram Dist., Tamilnadu by Sri Devi Karumariamman Educational Trust, Tamilnadu under The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

8. Establishment of new medical college at Patancheru, Medak Dist., Andhra Pradesh by Alleti Shrunitha Educational Society, Hyderabad with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Patancheru, Medak Dist., Andhra Pradesh by Alleti Shrunitha Educational Society, Hyderabad with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (29th & 30th December, 2015) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 10.76 % as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of residents is 26.08 % as detailed in the report.
3. Wards: Ancillary facilities are not available in wards of Tb & Chest, Psychiatry and Skin & VD as detailed in the report.
4. There was only 1 Major & NIL Minor operation on day of assessment.
5. There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
6. Radiological & Laboratory investigation workload is inadequate.
7. Workload of Histopathology & Cytopathology is NIL.
8. Casualty: Ventilator, Disaster Trolley are not available.
9. ICUs: There was NIL patient in MICU, NICU/PICU & only 2 patients each in ICCU & SICU on day of assessment.
10. Blood Bank is not functional.
11. Boys' Common Room does not have attached toilet.
12. Students' Hostels: Available accommodation is 63 against requirement of 113. Hostel for Girls' is not yet completed.

13. Residents' Hostel: Available accommodation is 38 against requirement of 46.
14. Residential Quarters are under construction.
15. Speech Therapy is not available.
16. Anatomy department: Available specimens are only 139. Band Saw is not available.
17. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of New Medical College at Patancheru, Medak Dist., Andhra Pradesh by Alleti Shrunitha Educational Society, Hyderabad under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

9. Establishment of new medical college at Datia, M.P. by Government of Madhya Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Madhya Pradesh Medical Science University, Jabalpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Datia, M.P. by Government of Madhya Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Madhya Pradesh Medical Science University, Jabalpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (5TH and 6TH January, 2016) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 100 % as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 100 % as detailed in report.
3. Dr. R.S. Gupta, shown as Medical Superintendent is working as CMHO of Dantia district & has been given additional charge as Medical Superintendent.
4. The staff of District Hospital are still under State Health Services & not under Dean.
5. Dr. Rajesh Gaur, designated as Dean, is also holding post of Professor of Pathology at Gwalior Medical College.
6. Dean's office is not available.
7. Teaching beds are deficient as under:

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8. Wards: Distance between 2 beds is < 1.5 m. Nursing Stations do not face the wards and all patients are not visible. Demonstration rooms are not available. Examination cum treatment room, Pantry, Duty room are not available.
9. There were NIL Minor operations in the hospital on day of assessment.
10. MEU, College Council, Pharmacovigilance Committee are not available.
11. Medical Superintendent's office is not available.
12. OPD: Waiting area for patients is not available. Many departments have only 2 consultation rooms each. Enquiry desk is not available. Teaching area is not available. Injection Rooms for males/females, ECG room, Dressing room for male/female, Minor O.T. are not available. There is no OPD for Psychiatry, Skin & VD and Tb & Chest departments.
13. Audiometry & Speech therapy are not available. Specialty clinics facilities are inadequate in Paediatric & O.G. OPD.
14. Radiological & Laboratory investigation workload is inadequate.
15. Histopathology & Cytopathology workload is NIL on day of assessment.
16. MRD is not available.
17. Casualty: Only 3 beds are available against requirement of 10. Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available. Central O₂ & Central Suction, Defibrillator, Ventilator are not available.
18. Central Clinical laboratory is not available.
19. O.T.s: Only 3 major O.T.s are available against requirement of 4. Only 1 Minor O.T. is available against requirement of 2. Preoperative & Postoperative beds are not available.
20. ICUs: ICCU, MICU, SICU are not available. In PICU/NICU, there are no Monitors, Ventilators, ABG Analyzer.
21. Labour Room: Eclampsia room & Septic room are not available.
22. Radiodiagnosis department: Only 1 mobile & 1 static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 2 each. AERB approval is not available.
23. CSSD, Intercom, Laundry, Canteen are not available.
24. Nursing Staff: Only 66 Nurses are available against 175 required.
25. Lecture Theaters, Central Library, Common Rooms for Boys & Girls, Central Photography Section are not available.
26. Students', Residents' & Nurses' Hostels are not available.
27. Residential Quarters for faculty & Non-teaching staff are not available.
28. Paramedical & Non-teaching staff: 84 paramedical & Non-teaching staff are available against 101 required.
29. Preclinical departments of Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry are not available.
30. Gender Harassment Committee is not constituted.
31. Website: It is not available.
32. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 pertaining to the person owning and managing a hospital of not less than 300 beds, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Datia, M.P. by Government of Madhya Pradesh under Madhya Pradesh Medical Science University, Jabalpur to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

10. **Establishment of new medical college at Peeplabandpur, Distt. Hapur (G.S Medical College & Hospital, Piplabnadpur) by Shri Jaipal Singh Sharma Trust, Ghaziabad, U.P. u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17.**

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Peeplabandpur, Distt. Hapur (G.S Medical College & Hospital, Piplabnadpur) by Shri Jaipal Singh Sharma Trust, Ghaziabad, U.P. u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dated 06/01/2016 received from the Central Govt., Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, New Delhi forwarding the representation/compliance dated 22/12/2015 submitted by the Secretary, Shri Jaipal Singh Sharma Trust, Ghaziabad for review.

The Executive Committee observed that the applicant did not possess Essentiality Certificate at the time of submitting the application to the Central Government. This has also been acknowledged by the Central Government in its letter dt. 06/01/2016. It was also observed by the Committee that the Consent of Affiliation was not available at the time of submitting the application as it was issued only on 30/09/2015.

The Committee noted the following relevant portion of the *Hon'ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-*

".....(A) Initial assessment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent of affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage...."

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the *Hon'ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in SLP.(C) No. 15043/2015-Padmashree Dr. D.Y. Patil Medical College Vs. Medical Council of India & Anr.:-*

16. *In W.P. (C) No.705/2014 – Royal Medical Trust (Regd.) and Anr. V. Union of India & Anr. decided on 20.8.2015, this Court has observed that the Schedule must take care of following aspects:*

"(A) Initial assesment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent for affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage.

(B) Inspection should then be conducted by the Inspectors of the MCI. By very nature such inspection must have an element of surprise. Therefore, sufficient time of about three to four months ought to be given to the MCI to cause inspection at any time and such inspection should normally be undertaken latest by January. Surprise inspection would ensure that the required facilities and infrastructure are always in place and not borrowed or put in temporarily.

(C) Intimation of the result or outcome of the inspection would then be communicated. If the infrastructure and facilities are in order, the concerned Medical College should be given requisite permission/renewal. However if there are any deficiencies or shortcomings, the MCI must, after pointing out the deficiencies, grant to the college concerned sufficient time to report compliance.

(D) If compliance is reported and the applicant states that the deficiencies stand removed, the MCI must cause compliance verification. It is possible that such compliance could be accepted even without actual physical verification but that assessment be left entirely to the discretion of the MCI and the Central Government. In cases where actual physical verification is required, the MCI and the Central Government must cause such verification before the deadline.

(E) The result of such verification if positive in favour of the Medical College concerned, the applicant ought to be given requisite permission/renewal. But if the deficiencies still persist or had not been removed, the applicant will stand disentitled so far as that academic year is concerned.”

It is apparent from the aforesaid decision and the regulations that the application at the first instance is required to be complete and incomplete applications are liable to be rejected. Thereafter, there has to be an inspection and other stages of decision-making process.”

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to approve the decision of the Council conveyed to the Central Government vide letter dated 19.10.2015 to return the application for establishment of new medical college at Peeplabandpur, Distt. Hapur (G.S. Medical College & Hospital, Piplabandpur, Distt. Hapur, U.P.) by Shri Jaipal Singh Sharma Trust, Ghazibad (U.P.) to the Central Govt. recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Muzzafarpur, Bihar (J.M. Medical College, Muzaffarpur, Bihar) by J.M. Institute of Speech & Hearing, Muzaffarpur, Bihar u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dated 06/01/2016 received from the Central Govt., Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, New Delhi forwarding the representation/compliance dated 19/12/2015 and 21/12/2015 submitted by President, J.M. Institute of Speech & Hearing, Muzaffarpur, Bihar for review.

The Executive Committee observed that the applicant did not possess Essentiality Certificate and Consent of Affiliation at the time of submitting the application to the Central Government. It was also observed that Consent of Affiliation in the required format is not available even now. This has also been acknowledged by the Central Government in its letter dt. 06/01/2016.

In view of above the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 2(3) & 2(4) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 which read as under:-

2(3) that Essentiality Certificate in Form 2 regarding No objection of the State Government/Union Territory Administration for the establishment of the proposed medical college at the proposed site and availability of adequate clinical material as per the council regulations, have been obtained by the person from the concerned State Government/ Union Territory Administration and

2(4) that Consent of affiliation in Form-3 for the proposed medical college has been obtained by the applicant from a University.

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon'ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-

".....(A) Initial assessment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent of affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage...."

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon'ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in SLP.(C) No. 15043/2015-Padmashree Dr. D.Y. Patil Medical College Vs. Medical Council of India & Anr.:-

16. In W.P. (C) No.705/2014 – Royal Medical Trust (Regd.) and Anr. V. Union of India & Anr. decided on 20.8.2015, this Court has observed that the Schedule must take care of following aspects:

"(A) Initial assesment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent for affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage.

(B) Inspection should then be conducted by the Inspectors of the MCI. By very nature such inspection must have an element of surprise. Therefore, sufficient time of about three to four months ought to be given to the MCI to cause inspection at any time and such inspection should normally be undertaken latest by January. Surprise inspection would ensure that the required facilities and infrastructure are always in place and not borrowed or put in temporarily.

(C) Intimation of the result or outcome of the inspection would then be communicated. If the infrastructure and facilities are in order, the concerned Medical College should be given requisite permission/renewal. However if there are any deficiencies or shortcomings, the MCI must, after pointing out the deficiencies, grant to the college concerned sufficient time to report compliance.

(D) If compliance is reported and the applicant states that the deficiencies stand removed, the MCI must cause compliance verification. It is possible that such compliance could be accepted even without actual

physical verification but that assessment be left entirely to the discretion of the MCI and the Central Government. In cases where actual physical verification is required, the MCI and the Central Government must cause such verification before the deadline.

(E) The result of such verification if positive in favour of the Medical College concerned, the applicant ought to be given requisite permission/renewal. But if the deficiencies still persist or had not been removed, the applicant will stand disentitled so far as that academic year is concerned."

It is apparent from the aforesaid decision and the regulations that the application at the first instance is required to be complete and incomplete applications are liable to be rejected. Thereafter, there has to be an inspection and other stages of decision-making process."

8. O.T.s: There are 2 tables in several O.T.s which is not as per norms.

10. Labour Room: No patients are admitted in septic & Eclampsia rooms.

15. Nursing staff: 158 Nurses are available against requirement of 175.
16. Students' Hostels: They are not yet furnished. Visitors' room, A.C. Study room with Computer & Internet & Recreation Room are not available.
17. Residents' Hostel: It is not yet furnished. Visitors' room, A.C. Study room with Computer & Internet & Recreation Room are not available.
18. Gender Harassment Committee as required as per order of Hon'ble Supreme Court is not yet constituted.
19. Anatomy department: Only 70 specimens are available. MRI & CT films are not available.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of new medical college at Banda, Uttar Pradesh by Government of Uttar Pradesh under King George's Medical University, Lucknow, U.P. u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

If it is observed during any regular inspection of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 20% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, such an institute will not be considered for renewal of permission in that Academic year.

The Committee also decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration to recognize Melmaruvathur Adhiprasakthi Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Melmaruvathur under the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956

The Executive Committee further considered the representation dated nil(received in the Council Office on 14/12/2015 & 19.01.2016) from the students of 2010-2011 batch of Melmaruvathur Adhiprasakthi Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Melmaruvathur alongwith copy of order dated 07.01.2016 passed by Hon'ble High Court of Madras in W.M.P. No. 334 of 2016 in W.P. No. 12686/2015, legal opinion of the Law Officer and decided to recognize the MBBS degree of the students who were admitted in academic year 2010-2011 batch only in accordance with the permissions issued by the Central Govt. and matter be placed before the General Body of the Council.

36. Approval of the proceedings of the Ethics Committee meeting dated 29th & 30th September, 2015.

Read: the matter with regard to approval of the proceedings of the Ethics Committee meeting dated 29th & 30th September, 2015.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the proceedings of the Ethics Committee meeting held on 29th & 30th September, 2015 and approved the proceedings of case nos. 4,5,6,10,12,13,14,17,18,20,21,22 & 31 and rest of the proceedings, the Committee observed as under pointwise:-

From the record it is not clear whether Dr. Nikhil Raheja has submitted any certificate of Additional Registration. Further, he possesses D.P.M. awarded by College of Physicians & Surgeons which is not a recognized qualification by MCI. He has not submitted any document of having acquired another qualification in Psychiatry. Under these circumstances whether he can work as a qualified Psychiatrist also remains to be decided. Referred back to Ethics Committee with above observations.

2. CASE # 20. APPEAL FILED BY SHRI R.M. DAS AGAINST ORDER OF W.B. MEDICAL COUNCIL & DR. A.K. GHOSH V/S UOI & ORS. W.P. # 5851(W)/2015 IN HON'BLE CALCUTTA HIGH COURT.

Approved. Further EC decided to direct Dr. Atul Kumar Ghosh not to practice as an Anaesthetist in future as he does not have any PG Qualification in the subject of Anaesthesia.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (09th & 10th December, 2015) and noted the following:

3. Equipment in Eclampsia room is not adequate.
4. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to grant Letter of Permission for increase of seats from 100 to 150 in respect of Saraswathi Institute of Medical Sciences, Hapur under Chaudhary Charan Singh University, Meerut u/s 10A of the IMC Act 1956 for the academic year 2016-17.

38. Pondicherry Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Pondicherry – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2016-17.

Read: the matter with regard to Pondicherry Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Pondicherry – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2016-17.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (4th and 5th January, 2016) alongwith the additional information submitted by the Assessors vide letter dated 26.01.2016 and noted the following:

1. OPD attendance is only 794 against 1,100 required. It is even less than 800 required for a recognized college with intake of 100.
2. Lecture theaters: Only 2 Lecture theaters of capacity 180 are available against requirement of 3.
3. Residential Quarters: NIL quarters are available for non-teaching staff.
4. OPD: There are only 2 examination cubicles in General Surgery department. Dressing room is common for males/females.
5. Wards: Ward # 9 contains patients of both General Surgery & ENT. All the Surgical beds are occupied by patients of Neurosurgery; Urology, Plastic Surgery, CVTS intermingling with patients of General Surgery. Surgical cases are few; that too like Cellulitis, Diabetic Ulcer, Bedsore, Sebaceous Cyst, etc. Only a few cases of hernia & 1 case of Cancer Colon was seen. Distance between 2 beds is < 1.5 m. All wards do not have Demonstration Rooms. Pantry is not available. (
6. Bed occupancy was 74 % on day of assessment.
7. Casualty: 19 beds are available against requirement of 25.
8. Operative workload is less.
9. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 in respect of Pondicherry Institute of Medical Sciences, Pondicherry under Pondicherry University for the academic year 2016-2017.

39. Kalinga Institute of Medical Sciences, Bhubaneswar – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2016-17, in pursuance of the Hon'ble Supreme Court order dated 16.12.2015 passed in SLP © No. 34856/2015 –MCI Vs. Kalinga Institute of Medical Sciences & Ors.

Read: the matter with regard to Kalinga Institute of Medical Sciences, Bhubaneswar – Renewal of Permission for admission of 3rd Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 for the academic session 2016-17, in pursuance of the Hon'ble High Court of Orissa order dated 03.12.2015 passed in W.P. - Number of Units available are less in subjects of General Medicine, Paediatrics, General Surgery, Orthopaedics, O.G.
- Bed occupancy was 66.70 % on actual physical verification (i.e. 397 out of 595 beds required)
- While there were 5 Caesarean Sections, there was NIL Normal Delivery; this is an abnormally high ratio.

- Workload of Special Investigations like Ba, IVP is NIL on day of assessment.
- MRD: It is partly computerized.
- ICUs: There was NIL patient in SICU on day of assessment.

10. Only 4 static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 5.
11. Examination Halls: Against requirement of 2 Examination Halls of 250 capacity, only 1 of 250 capacity is available. Another hall of 144 capacity is available; the capacity is less and also it is of gallery type and cannot be considered as Examination Hall.
12. Lecture Theaters: Capacity of 4 Lecture Theaters available is only 140 each against requirement of 180 each. College authorities insisted that 180 students can be accommodated in the theater but on verification it did not appear as if it can accommodate more than 140. It was verified during a lecture when 115 students were present there. Available vacant space was not enough to accommodate more than 25 students. Even these 115 students were sitting quite close to one another as it is.
13. Central Library: Available area is 1,700 sq.m. against requirement of 1,800 sq.m.
14. Students' Hostels: Entrance lobby is the Visitors' room which is not as per norms. Study room has no computer. Recreation room has no facility for any music or indoor games.
15. Interns' Hostel: Available accommodation is 82 against requirement of 100. Entrance lobby is the Visitors' room which is not as per norms. Study room has no computer. Recreation room has no facility for any music or indoor games.
16. Residents' Hostel: Entrance lobby is the Visitors' room which is not as per norms. Study room has no computer. Recreation room has no facility for any music or indoor games.
17. Playground shown is used as construction area.
18. Anatomy department: CT & MRI films are not available.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 3rd batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 in respect of Kalinga Institute of Medical Sciences, Bhubaneswar under KIIT University, Bhubaneswar for the academic year 2016-2017.

40. **Recognition/approval of Pt. B.D. Sharma Postgraduate Institute of Medical Sciences, Rohtak for the award of MBBS degree granted by Pt. B.D. Sharma University of Health Sciences, Rohtak against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 200 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Pt. B.D. Sharma Postgraduate Institute of Medical Sciences, Rohtak for the award of MBBS degree granted by Pt. B.D. The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (02.12.2015) and (06.01.2016 & 07.01.2016) and decided to recommend to the Central Government for recognition/approval of Pt. B.D. Sharma Postgraduate Institute of Medical Sciences, Rohtak for the award of MBBS degree granted by Pt. B.D. Sharma University of Health Sciences, Rohtak against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 200 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

2. Teaching Beds: 21 Teaching beds are less in Tb & Chest as only 29 beds are available against requirement of 50.
3. Workload of Special investigations like Ba, IVP is NIL on day of assessment.
4. MRD is partially computerized.
5. Examination Hall: Examination halls in Orthopaedic block are not furnished.
6. Lecture Theaters: E class facility is not available.
7. Common Rooms for Boys & Girls do not have attached toilets.
8. Interns' Hostel: It is nearing completion.
9. Demonstration Rooms: Demonstration rooms of Biochemistry are shared with others. Capacity of 1 Demonstration room of Pathology is less than required.
10. RHTC: Cold chain equipment are not available.
11. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend not to recognize/approve Maulana Azad Medical College, New Delhi for the award of MBBS degree granted by Delhi University against the increased intake i.e. from 200 to 250 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

42. Recognition/approval of Christian Medical College, Ludhiana for the award of MBBS degree granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot against the increased intake i.e. from 50 to 75 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Christian Medical College, Ludhiana for the award of MBBS degree granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot against the increased intake i.e. from 50 to 75 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment report (09.12.2015) and (12.01.2016 & 13.01.2016) and decided to recommend to the Central Government for recognition/approval of Christian Medical College, Ludhiana for the award of MBBS degree granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot against the increased intake i.e. from 50 to 75 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Medical College, Sawangi (Meghe) Wardha for the award of MBBS degree granted by Datta Meghe Institute of Medical Sciences, (Deemed University) Wardha against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 200 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the compliance verification assessment report (16.12.2015) alongwith previous assessment report (01.07.2015, 8th May, 2015 and 10th & 11th March, 2015) was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 28.12.2015 and it was decided as under:-

"The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (16.12.2015) along with previous assessment reports (01.07.2015, 8th May, 2015 and 10th & 11th March, 2015) and noted the following:-

1. *Deficiency of faculty is 30.93 % as detailed in report.*
2. *Shortage of Residents is 46.83 % as detailed in the report.*
3. *Bed occupancy is 38.30 % on day of assessment.*
4. *Number of patients in OPD is 400 – 500 on day of assessment against requirement of 800.*
5. *Workload of Special investigations like Ba, IVP was NIL on day of assessment.*
6. *In Skin & VD ward, one male patient was without any case paper.*
7. *In USG register of Radiodiagnosis department, no entry of indoor patient was recorded.*
8. *In Histopathology register, there was no column/entry of patients, department, ward.*
9. *On enquiry, Registration counter clerks were not able to give clinical data.*
10. *Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.*

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to reiterate its earlier decision with regard to application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations (Amendment),2010(Part II),

dated 16th April, 2010 and to return the postgraduate applications of Dr. Somervell Memorial CSI Medical College & Hospital, Thiruvananthapuram recommending disapproval of the scheme.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided that since the gross deficiencies of teaching faculty, residents, & infrastructure are still persisting in spite of repeated opportunities being given to the institute to rectify the same over a period of time, why the recognition for the award of MBBS degree granted by Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur in respect of students being trained at Dr. Somervell Memorial CSI Medical College & Hospital, Thiruvananthapuram be not withdrawn u/s 19 of the IMC Act, 1956. It was further decided that the institute be directed not to make further admissions from the academic year 2016-17 onwards.

The Committee further decided to place the matter before the General Body of the Council.”

Therefore, in view of its earlier decision as quoted above, the Committee decided to return the application for increase in MBBS seats from 100 to 150 at Dr. Somervell Memorial CSI Medical College & Hospital, Thiruvananthapuram under Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur u/s 10A of the IMC Act 1956 for academic year 2016-17 recommending disapproval of the scheme to the Central Govt. as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the Regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

45. Increase of seats in MBBS course from 100-150 for the academic session 2016-17 at KMCT Medical College, Kozhikode u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to increase of seats in MBBS course from 100-150 for the academic session 2016-17 at KMCT Medical College, Kozhikode u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the compliance verification assessment report (16.12.2015) alongwith previous assessment report (01.07.2015, 18th April, 2015 and 12th & 13th January, 2015) was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 28.12.2015 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (16.12.2015) along with previous assessment reports (01.07.2015, 18th April, 2015 and 12th & 13th January, 2015) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 11.6 % as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 29.4 % as detailed in report.
3. Bed occupancy is 59.5 % on day of assessment.
4. There were only 4 Minor operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment.
5. Institute is maintaining double registers. Register in General Medicine OPD did not match with one of registers having inflated data.
6. OPD attendance was only 413 on day of assessment against 800 required.
7. Radiological investigation workload is inadequate.
8. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to reiterate its earlier decision with regard to application of clause 8(3)(1)(c)

of Establishment of Medical College Regulations (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and to return the postgraduate applications of KMCT Medical College, Kozhikode, Kerala recommending disapproval of the scheme.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided that since the gross deficiencies of teaching faculty, residents, & infrastructure are still persisting in spite of repeated opportunities being given to the institute to rectify the same over a period of time, why the recognition for the award of MBBS degree granted by Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur in respect of students being trained at KMCT Medical College, Kozhikode, Kerala be not withdrawn u/s 19 of the IMC Act, 1956. It was further decided that the institute be directed not to make further admissions from the academic year 2016-17 onwards.

The Committee further decided to place the matter before the General Body of the Council.”

Therefore, in view of its earlier decision as quoted above, the Committee decided to return the application for increase in MBBS seats from 100 to 150 at KMCT Medical College, Kozhikode under Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur u/s 10A of the IMC Act 1956 for academic year 2016-17 recommending disapproval of the scheme to the Central Govt. as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the Regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

46. Establishment of new medical college at Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh by Govt. of Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under King George's Medical University, Lucknow u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the letter of Director of the Institute dt. 12/01/2016 which reads as under:

In reference of your letter No. MCI/34(41)/2015-Med./92, dated 8.1.2016 your inspectors came to our university for inspection of medical college. But we are not prepared for inspection at present moment and the formalities for establishment of medical college as per MCI norms are in process of completion. Appointment of faculties and procurement of equipment etc. are in process. As soon as it is over we let you know and ask for inspection. Please defer this inspection for sometimes.

30. Thus, the need of the hour is that binding dicta be prescribed and statutory regulations be enforced, so that all concerned are mandatorily required to implement the time schedule in its true spirit and substance. It is difficult and not even advisable to keep some windows open to meet a particular situation of exception, as it may pose impediments to the smooth implementation of laws and defeat the very object of the scheme. These schedules have been prescribed upon serious consideration by all concerned. They are to be applied *stricto sensu* and cannot be moulded to suit the convenience of some economic or other interest of any institution, especially, in a manner that is bound to result in compromise of the above- stated principles. Keeping in view the contemptuous conduct of the relevant stakeholders, their cannonade on the rule of merit compels us to state, with precision and *esemplastically*, the action that is necessary to ameliorate the process of selection. Thus, we issue the following directions in *rem* for their strict compliance, without demur and default, by all concerned.

i) The commencement of new courses or increases in seats of existing courses of MBBS/BDS are to be approved/recognised by the Government of India by 15th July of each calendar year for the relevant academic sessions of that year.

ii) The Medical Council of India shall, immediately thereafter, issue appropriate directions and ensure the implementation and commencement of admission process within one week thereafter.

iii) After 15th July of each year, neither the Union of India nor the Medical or Dental Council of India shall issue any recognition or approval for the current academic year. If any such approval is granted after 15th July of any year, it shall only be operative for the next academic year and not in the current academic year. Once the sanction/approval is granted on or before 15th July of the relevant year, the name of that college and all seats shall be included in both the first and the second counseling, in accordance with the Rules.

iv) Any medical or dental college, or seats thereof, to which the recognition/approval is issued subsequent to 15th July of the respective year shall not be included in the counseling to be conducted by the concerned authority and that college would have no right to make admissions in the current academic year against such seats.

v) The admission to the medical or dental colleges shall be granted only through the respective entrance tests conducted by the competitive authority in the State or the body of the private colleges. These two are the methods of selection and grant of admission to these courses. However, where there is a single Board conducting the state examination and there is a single medical college, then in terms of clause 5.1 of the Medical Council of India Eligibility Certificate Regulations, 2002 the admission can be given on the basis of 10+2 exam marks, strictly in order of merit.

vi) All admissions through any of the stated selection processes have to be effected only after due publicity and in consonance with the directions issued by this Court. We vehemently deprecate the practice of giving admissions on 30th September of the academic year. In fact, that is the date by which, in exceptional circumstances, a candidate duly selected as per the prescribed selection process is to join the academic course of MBBS/BDS. Under the directions of this Court, second counseling should be the final counseling, as this Court has already held in the case of *Ms. Neelu Arora & Anr. v. UOI & Ors.* [(2003) 3 SCC 366] and third counseling is not contemplated or permitted under the entire process of selection/grant of admission to these professional courses.

vii) If any seats remain vacant or are surrendered from All India Quota, they should positively be allotted and admission granted strictly as per the merit by 15th September of the relevant year and not by holding an extended counseling. The remaining time will be limited to the filling up of the vacant seats resulting from exceptional circumstances or surrender of seats. All candidates should join the academic courses by 30th September of the academic year.

viii) No college may grant admissions without duly advertising the vacancies available and by publicizing the same through the internet, newspaper, on the notice board of the respective feeder schools and colleges, etc. Every effort has to be made by all concerned to ensure that the admissions are given on merit and after due publicity and not in a manner which is ex-facie arbitrary and casts the shadow of favouritism.

ix) The admissions to all government colleges have to be on merit obtained in the entrance examination conducted by the nominated authority, while in the case of private colleges, the colleges should choose their option by 30th April of the relevant year, as to whether they wish to grant admission on the basis of the merit obtained in the test conducted by the nominated State authority or they wish to follow the merit list/rank obtained by the candidates in the competitive examination collectively held by the nominated agency for the private colleges. The option exercised by 30th April shall not be subject to change. This choice should also be given by the colleges which are anticipating grant of recognition, in compliance with the date specified in these directions.

31. All these directions shall be complied with by all concerned, including Union of India, Medical Council of India, Dental Council of India, State Governments, Universities and medical and dental colleges and the management of the respective universities or dental and medical colleges. Any default in compliance with these conditions or attempt to overreach these directions shall, without fail, invite the following consequences and penal actions:-

a) Every body, officer or authority who disobeys or avoids or fails to strictly comply with these directions stricto sensu shall be liable for action under the provisions of the Contempt of Courts Act. Liberty is granted to any interested party to take out the contempt proceedings before the High Court having jurisdiction over such Institution/State, etc.

b) The person, member or authority found responsible for any violation shall be departmentally proceeded against and punished in accordance with the Rules. We make it clear that violation of these directions or overreaching them by any process shall tantamount to indiscipline, insubordination, misconduct and being unworthy of becoming a public servant.

c) Such defaulting authority, member or body shall also be liable for action by and personal liability to third parties who might have suffered losses as a result of such default.

d) *There shall be due channelization of selection and admission process with full cooperation and coordination between the Government of India, State Government, Universities, Medical Council of India or Dental Council of India and the colleges concerned. They shall act in tandem and strictly as per the prescribed schedule. In other words, there should be complete harmonisation with a view to form a uniform pattern for concerted action, according to the framed scheme, schedule for admission and regulations framed in this behalf.*

e) *The college which grants admission for the current academic year, where its recognition/approval is granted subsequent to 15th July of the current academic year, shall be liable for withdrawal of recognition/approval on this ground, in addition to being liable to indemnify such students who are denied admission or who are wrongfully given admission in the college.*

f) *Upon the expiry of one week after holding of the second counseling, the unfilled seats from all quotas shall be deemed to have been surrendered in favour of the respective States and shall be filled thereafter strictly on the basis of merit obtained in the competitive entrance test.*

g) *It shall be mandatory on the part of each college and University to inform the State and the Central Government/competent authority of the seats which are lying vacant after each counseling and they shall furnish the complete details, list of seats filled and vacant in the respective states, immediately after each counseling.*

h) *No college shall fill up its seats in any other manner.”*

In view of above the Executive Committee of the Council observed that the Regulations being Statutory Regulations are mandatory and binding in character and are required to be strictly adhered to by all the authorities and it was therefore decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh by Govt. of Uttar Pradesh under King George's Medical University, Lucknow to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

47. Establishment of new medical college at Durgapur, Dist. Burdwan, West Bengal by Durgapur Institute of Advance Technology and Management Society, Durgapur, West Bengal with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under the West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Durgapur, Dist. Burdwan, West Bengal by Durgapur Institute of Advance Technology and Management Society, Durgapur, West Bengal with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under the West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (12th and 13th January, 2016) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 89 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of residents is 100 % as detailed in the report.

3. Hospital building is under construction. No OPD or IPD is yet started.
4. Blood Bank is not available.
5. No Nursing staff or paramedical & Non-teaching staff are available.
6. Only space is identified for Staff room & College Council room.
7. College Council & Pharmaco Vigilance Committee are not constituted.
8. Lecture Theaters are under construction.
9. Central Library is under construction.
10. Students', Residents' & Nurses' Hostels are under construction.
11. Residential Quarters are under construction.
12. Gender Harassment Committee as required by orders of Hon'ble Supreme Court is not constituted.
13. Website is not available.
14. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 pertaining to the person owning and managing a hospital of not less than 300 beds, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Durgapur, Dist. Burdwan, West Bengal by Durgapur Institute of Advance Technology and Management Society, Durgapur, West Bengal under the West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to seek an explanation from the Secretary (ME) of West Bengal as to how the Essentiality Certificate had been issued when the hospital is still under construction.

9. *Labour room is not as per specifications. Deficiency remains as it is.*

10. CSSD is not available. Deficiency remains as it is.

Medical College at Gondia is pending before the Hon'ble High Court of Bombay at Nagpur bench. The Hon'ble High Court was on 27.11.2015 pleased to passed the following order:

"In pursuance of the directions issued by this on 29.10.2015, Smt. Medha Gadgil, Additional Ph. Secretary, Medical Education and Drugs Department, Government of Maharashtra has filed an affidavit. In paragraph no.1 of the said affidavit, deficiencies which were noticed by the Medical Council of India so also the present status and the period by which the deficiencies will be removed have been specified. Perusal of the said chart would reveal that the respondent/State has undertaken to remove most of the deficiencies, except the one at Serial No.4, by the end of December, 2015. Insofar as the deficiency at Sr.No.4 in respect of Preclinical Department of Anatomy, Physiology and Biochemistry is concerned, it is stated in the affidavit that the building with necessary modification would be handed over by the Public Works Department in the midweek of December, 2015. It is further stated that necessary equipment and furniture is already procured. Time sought for compliance and rectification of said deficiencies is end of January, 2016. For the said purpose, funds have already been released to the Public Works Department.

Mr. A.A. Naik, learned Counsel for the petitioner submits that normally inspection by the Medical Council of India MCI is conducted in the month of December. He submits that there is great apprehension that if deficiencies at Sr. No. 4 are not complied with by the end of December, the M.C.I. may get adverse report.

Be that as it may, the State has given time program.

Insofar as apprehension regarding M.C.I. aforementioned is concerned, same can be considered at an appropriate stage,

We, therefore, treat the statement made in the affidavit as an undertaking on behalf of the State of Maharashtra.

We make it clear that all the deficiencies shall be removed prior to the period specified in the affidavit.

We further make it clear that if all the deficiencies are not removed prior to the period specified in the affidavit, we may be required to initiate such proceedings as are permissible in law.

Stand over to 4.2.2016."

Concerning the above order Sh. Rahul Bhangde, Standing Counsel of Medical Council of India in the Hon'ble High Court of Bombay at Nagpur has opined as under:

"The above mentioned case pertains to starting of Government Medical College at Gondia. The State of Maharashtra has filed an affidavit wherein it has submitted time bound programme for removing deficiency from Government Medical College, Gondia. The Hon'ble High Court has treated the statement made in affidavit filed by the State Government as an undertaking. A copy of order passed by the Hon'ble High Court is

enclosed herewith.

As the Hon'ble High Court is looking into the matter and has treated the statement made in affidavit filed by State of Maharashtra as an undertaking it will be advisable that Medical Council of India does not send negative recommendation in respect of Government Medical College, Gondia as I apprehend contempt of court proceedings will be initiated against M.C.I in case it sends negative recommendation.

This is for your information and record."

In view of the order passed by the Hon'ble High Court and the opinion received from Standing Counsel of Medical Council of India, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to communicate to the Central Government the details/findings of the assessment process on 3rd and 4th December 2015, alongwith the Assessment report, copy of the affidavit filed by the State Government before the Hon'ble High Court of Bombay, Nagpur Bench and the Order dated 27.11.15 in PIL No. 65 of 2015 for an appropriate decision at their end.

52. Establishment of new medical college at Jodhpur, Rajasthan(Jodhpur Medical College & Hospital) by Kushal Education Trust, Jaipur, Rajasthan u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Jodhpur, Rajasthan (Jodhpur Medical College & Hospital) by Kushal Education Trust, Jaipur, Rajasthan u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the legal opinion of the Law Officer of the Council. The Committee also noted that the Council Office vide its communication dated 20.11.2015 followed by reminders dated 02/12/2015, 10/12/2015, 17/12/2015 and 28/12/2015 requested the Principal Secretary, Department of Health & Family Welfare, Jaipur as well as the Secretary, UGC, New Delhi for clarifications. The Committee noted the following response dated 30.12.2015 received from the Jt. Secretary, Hr. Education, Government of Rajasthan, Jaipur-

"....In this connection, the status of JNU, Jodhpur and stand of the State Government in respect of proposal of the Kushal Education Trust for the establishment of a Medical College is as under:-

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In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Jodhpur, Rajasthan (Jodhpur Medical College & Hospital) by Kushal Education Trust, Jaipur, Rajasthan to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

53. Establishment of new medical college at Banthra, Shahjahanpur, Uttar Pradesh by Varunarjun Trust, Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, Bareilly u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Banthra, Shahjahanpur, Uttar Pradesh by Varunarjun Trust, Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, Bareilly u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (12th and 13th January, 2016) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 13.84 % as detailed in report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 10.86 % as detailed in the report.
3. Wards: Male & female wards are common for the departments of Tb & Chest, Psychiatry, ENT & Ophthalmology. General Medicine & General Surgery departments have one big ward instead of 3 wards with only 1 or 2 Nurses. Ancillary facilities like Examination room, Demonstration room, Pantry are common.
4. Bed occupancy was 46 % on day of assessment against 60 % required.
5. Most of indoor patients are not genuine.
6. The following were fake patients as observed by assessors:
 - (a) Patient by name Arun, 7 years, IP -175304 was admitted on 7.1.2016 for congenital hernia. He has just been kept waiting for the assessment day. He was brought to the OT at 11.45 am. But his name was not in the OT list submitted earlier.
 - (b) Patient by name Prempal s/o Bankylal, 18 years, IP 172972 was admitted on 2.1.2016. But his age was shown as 32 in the case sheet./ He had no complaints. He had not taken any drugs.
 - (c) Patient by name Ramamurthy, IP 173882, DOA 5.1.2016 was admitted for no apparent complaints. Treatment written in the case sheet was not administered.
 - (d) Patient by name Marzina, 10 Years IP 175297 DOA 7.1.2016 had no apparent complaints. She was simply admitted.

- (e) One patient by name Sagir s/o Sabbir 32 years, IP No. 173921 with DOA 4.1.2016. He said he was admitted 20 days before but record shows that he was admitted 8 days before. The address also did not match. He has no signs and symptoms of any disease. He is not a genuine patient He is a laborer in college campus. He was not aware of any treatment.
 - (f) Fake MRD data ; on the day of inspection at 12.44 p.m. in surgery OPD only 2 patients were admitted as IPD-1) Nandi Devi IP No. 177199&2) Mamta IP No. 177065. But the MRD report shows admissions as 10 in surgery till 12.52 pm.
 - (g) At about 1'o clock in Surgery OPD registre there were 12 OD entries, and another 10 patients were seated, while the MRD data showed 65 patients at that time in Surgery OPD.
7. OPD as observed by assessors was 300 – 400 on day of assessment which is inadequate. The figure of 732 given by institute is highly inflated.
 8. There were only 02 Major & 05 Minor operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment.
 9. There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
 10. Radiological workload is inadequate.
 11. Workload of Histopathology & Cytopathology is NIL.
 12. ICUs: There was NIL patient in MICU & SICU and 2 patients each in ICCU and NICU/PICU on day of assessment.
 13. Blood Bank: There was only 1 unit stored in blood bank. NIL unit was dispensed on day of assessment.
 14. Nursing staff: Only 113 Nurses are available against requirement of 175.
 15. Paramedical & Non-teaching staff: Only 47 Paramedical & Non-teaching staff are available against requirement of 101.
 16. MRD: It does not have data of any Major Surgery of the hospital.
 17. College Council & Pharmaco Vigilance Committee are not constituted.
 18. Students' Hostels: They are partially furnished.
 19. Residents' Hostel: It is partially furnished. Visitors' room, A.C. study room with computer & Internet & Recreation room are not available. Most of the Residents are not staying in the hostel. Drinking water facility is not available.
 20. Residential Quarters: Only 12 quarters are available for faculty against requirement of 14. NIL quarters are available for non-teaching staff. 30 rooms at top of Boys' hostel were shown as quarters for non-teaching staff which is not permissible. Similarly, 1 hostel building was shown as faculty quarters which is not permissible.
 21. Anatomy department: Only 120 specimens are available.
 22. Physiology department: Mammalian Laboratory is not available.
 23. Occupancy list of faculty & residence provided by Dean does not tally with the faculty staying after verification.
 24. Address proof of around 58 faculty was not proper. They had produced a letter from BSNL attested by Dean as address proof. Format and date was similar in all. Quarter number or Room number was not mentioned in any of the letters. On verification it was found that most of them were not staying there.
 25. The following has been observed with regard to faculty / Residents by the assessors:
 - (a) Dr. Anup Agarwal was supposed to have joined this institution on 30.10.2015 and was supposed to have worked in Medicine as JR. But his declaration form shows him as the JR in Surgery. He does not know any faculty in his unit. So he is only brought for head counting.
 - (b) Dr. Ravi Kumar, JR in Medicine does not know the details of any patient in the Medicine ward. So he is only brought for head counting.

- (c) In Teachers staff quarters no.3, family of Dr. Ravi Prakash Agarwal was residing. But as per Dean's record, medicine JR Dr. Ravikumar was residing.
- (d) Most of the Residents were not staying in the campus/hostel. On random verification resident hostel rooms, Dr. Rajanish found JR in Radiology, Dr. Vijay Shankar Sharma, JR Anaesthesia and Dr. Shiven Singh, JR in Surgery, Dr. Sarvendra, JR in Surgery, Dr. Brijendra Saxena, SR in Ortho., Dr. Mohd. Isaq, SR in Surgery, Siddhardh Rastigi, Sr.in Ortho and Dr. M.L. Gupta, JR in Ortho did not reside in the hostel.
26. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of New Medical College at Banthra, Shahjahanpur, Uttar Pradesh by Varunarjun Trust, Uttar Pradesh under Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, Bareilly u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Committee further decided to refer the matter to the Ethics Committee of the Council.

54. Establishment of new medical college at Kanpur, Uttar Pradesh by Shree Durga Maa Shiksha Seva Samiti, Kanpur with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Chatrapati Shahuji Maharaj University, Kanpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Kanpur, Uttar Pradesh by Shree Durga Maa Shiksha Seva Samiti, Kanpur with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Chatrapati Shahuji Maharaj University, Kanpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the letter of Authorized Signatory of the applicant trust dt. 12/01/2016 which reads as under:

"..... Faculty recruitment is under process. After completion of recruitment process, college will inform to MCI to conduct the inspection for the session 2016-2017".....

The Executive Committee also noted the operative part of the Order of Hon'ble Supreme Court in Mridul Dhar's and Priya Gupta's case which are as under:

Mridul Dhar's case

"1-13.

14. Time schedule for establishment of new college or to increase intake in existing college, shall be adhered to strictly by all concerned.

15. Time schedule provided in Regulations shall be strictly adhered to by all concerned failing which defaulting party would be liable to be personally proceeded with."

Priya Gupta's case

30. Thus, the need of the hour is that binding dicta be prescribed and statutory regulations be enforced, so that all concerned are mandatorily required to implement the time schedule in its true spirit and substance. It is difficult and not even advisable to keep some windows open to meet a particular situation of exception, as it may pose impediments to the smooth implementation of laws and defeat the very object of the scheme. These schedules have been prescribed upon serious consideration by all concerned. They are to be applied *stricto sensu* and cannot be moulded to suit the convenience of some economic or other interest of any institution, especially, in a manner that is bound to result in compromise of the above- stated principles. Keeping in view the contemptuous conduct of the relevant stakeholders, their cannonade on the rule of merit compels us to state, with precision and *esemplastically*, the action that is necessary to ameliorate the process of selection. Thus, we issue the following directions in rem for their strict compliance, without demur and default, by all concerned.

i) The commencement of new courses or increases in seats of existing courses of MBBS/BDS are to be approved/recognised by the Government of India by 15th July of each calendar year for the relevant academic sessions of that year.

ii) The Medical Council of India shall, immediately thereafter, issue appropriate directions and ensure the implementation and commencement of admission process within one week thereafter.

iii) After 15th July of each year, neither the Union of India nor the Medical or Dental Council of India shall issue any recognition or approval for the current academic year. If any such approval is granted after 15th July of any year, it shall only be operative for the next academic year and not in the current academic year. Once the sanction/approval is granted on or before 15th July of the relevant year, the name of that college and all seats shall be included in both the first and the second counseling, in accordance with the Rules.

iv) Any medical or dental college, or seats thereof, to which the recognition/approval is issued subsequent to 15th July of the respective year shall not be included in the counseling to be conducted by the concerned authority and that college would have no right to make admissions in the current academic year against such seats.

v) The admission to the medical or dental colleges shall be granted only through the respective entrance tests conducted by the competitive authority in the State or the body of the private colleges. These two are the methods of selection and grant of admission to these courses. However, where there is a single Board conducting the state examination and there is a single medical college, then in terms of clause 5.1 of the Medical Council of India Eligibility Certificate Regulations, 2002 the admission can be given on the basis of 10+2 exam marks, strictly in order of merit.

vi) All admissions through any of the stated selection processes have to be effected only after due publicity and in consonance with the directions issued by this Court. We vehemently deprecate the practice of giving admissions on 30th September of the academic year. In fact, that is the date by which, in exceptional circumstances, a candidate duly selected as per the prescribed selection process is to join the academic course of MBBS/BDS. Under the directions of this Court, second counseling should be the final counseling, as this Court has already held in the case of Ms. Neelu Arora & Anr. v. UOI & Ors. [(2003) 3 SCC 366] and third

counseling is not contemplated or permitted under the entire process of selection/grant of admission to these professional courses.

vii) If any seats remain vacant or are surrendered from All India Quota, they should positively be allotted and admission granted strictly as per the merit by 15th September of the relevant year and not by holding an extended counseling. The remaining time will be limited to the filling up of the vacant seats resulting from exceptional circumstances or surrender of seats. All candidates should join the academic courses by 30th September of the academic year.

viii) No college may grant admissions without duly advertising the vacancies available and by publicizing the same through the internet, newspaper, on the notice board of the respective feeder schools and colleges, etc. Every effort has to be made by all concerned to ensure that the admissions are given on merit and after due publicity and not in a manner which is ex-facie arbitrary and casts the shadow of favouritism.

ix) The admissions to all government colleges have to be on merit obtained in the entrance examination conducted by the nominated authority, while in the case of private colleges, the colleges should choose their option by 30th April of the relevant year, as to whether they wish to grant admission on the basis of the merit obtained in the test conducted by the nominated State authority or they wish to follow the merit list/rank obtained by the candidates in the competitive examination collectively held by the nominated agency for the private colleges. The option exercised by 30th April shall not be subject to change. This choice should also be given by the colleges which are anticipating grant of recognition, in compliance with the date specified in these directions.

31. All these directions shall be complied with by all concerned, including Union of India, Medical Council of India, Dental Council of India, State Governments, Universities and medical and dental colleges and the management of the respective universities or dental and medical colleges. Any default in compliance with these conditions or attempt to overreach these directions shall, without fail, invite the following consequences and penal actions:-

a) Every body, officer or authority who disobeys or avoids or fails to strictly comply with these directions stricto sensu shall be liable for action under the provisions of the Contempt of Courts Act. Liberty is granted to any interested party to take out the contempt proceedings before the High Court having jurisdiction over such Institution/State, etc.

b) The person, member or authority found responsible for any violation shall be departmentally proceeded against and punished in accordance with the Rules. We make it clear that violation of these directions or overreaching them by any process shall tantamount to indiscipline, insubordination, misconduct and being unworthy of becoming a public servant.

c) Such defaulting authority, member or body shall also be liable for action by and personal liability to third parties who might have suffered losses as a result of such default.

d) There shall be due channelization of selection and admission process with full cooperation and coordination between the Government of India, State Government, Universities, Medical Council of India or Dental Council of India and the colleges concerned. They shall act in tandem and strictly as per the prescribed schedule. In other words, there should be complete harmonisation with a view to form a uniform pattern for concerted action, according to the framed scheme, schedule for admission and regulations framed in this behalf.

e) *The college which grants admission for the current academic year, where its recognition/approval is granted subsequent to 15th July of the current academic year, shall be liable for withdrawal of recognition/approval on this ground, in addition to being liable to indemnify such students who are denied admission or who are wrongfully given admission in the college.*

f) *Upon the expiry of one week after holding of the second counseling, the unfilled seats from all quotas shall be deemed to have been surrendered in favour of the respective States and shall be filled thereafter strictly on the basis of merit obtained in the competitive entrance test.*

g) *It shall be mandatory on the part of each college and University to inform the State and the Central Government/competent authority of the seats which are lying vacant after each counseling and they shall furnish the complete details, list of seats filled and vacant in the respective states, immediately after each counseling.*

h) *No college shall fill up its seats in any other manner."*

In view of above the Executive Committee of the Council observed that the Regulations being Statutory Regulations are mandatory and binding in character and are required to be strictly adhered to by all the authorities and it was therefore decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Kanpur, Uttar Pradesh by Shree Durga Maa Shiksha Seva Samiti, Kanpur under Chatrapati Shahuji Maharaj University, Kanpur to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

55. Establishment of new medical college at Myana, Guna, Madhya Pradesh by Muskan Samajik Evam Shiksha Prasar Evam Prachar Samiti, Guna M.P. with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Madhya Pradesh Medical Science University, Jabalpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Myana, Guna, Madhya Pradesh by Muskan Samajik Evam Shiksha Prasar Evam Prachar Samiti, Guna M.P. with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Madhya Pradesh Medical Science University, Jabalpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (12th and 13th January, 2016) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 16.92 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 26.08 % as detailed in the report.
3. OPD: Injection room for male/female, ECG room, Dressing room for male/female, Minor O.T. are not located in OPD. Plaster room & Plaster cutting room are non-functional. In Ophthalmology OPD, Dark Room & Dressing room are not available. Special clinic facilities are inadequate in Paediatrics & O.G. OPD. None of OPD registers has entry of diagnosis.
4. Wards: Beds are not proper hospital beds in the wards of Tb & Chest & Psychiatry.
5. Bed occupancy was 35.18 % (i.e. 114 out of 124 beds) on day of assessment.

6. Majority of admitted patients were such who do not require admission – viz. with vague complaints of headache, weakness, limb pain, etc. Others although admitted for symptoms like cough, abdominal pain have not been investigated for days. Some fresh case sheets show date of admission of a day prior to day of assessment – viz. 11/01/2016 seem to have been entered on day of assessment itself.
7. Obstetric ward did not have any Obstetric case.
8. NIL operations were posted on 12/01/2016. No patient of delivery or Caesarean Section was seen in the ward.
9. Radiological workload was inadequate on day of assessment.
10. Histopathology workload shows as 5 specimens received from IPD; however from where did the specimens come is not clear in view of the fact that NIL operations were posted.
11. All data of clinical material – OPD attendance, Casualty attendance, Major & Minor operations, Normal Delivery, Caesarean Section, X-ray & USG investigations, Laboratory workload – are highly inflated.
12. Institute has reported total USG investigation of 34 while Radiologist himself stated it to be average of -8 – 10/day.
13. Casualty: Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available. Central O₂ and Central Suction are not functional. Disaster Trolley is not available. Crash Cart was empty. Defibrillator & Ventilator are not available.
14. O.T.s: Only 1 out of 4 O.T.s is equipped. Central O₂ and Central Suction are not functional. O.T. register shows procedures like PCNL & Laparoscopic Cholecystectomy but equipment for these procedures is not available. Preoperative beds are not available.
15. ICUs: SICU is not available. There was NIL patient in ICCU & NICU/PICU and only 1 patient in MICU. Central O₂ and Central Suction are not functional.
16. Labour Room: Eclampsia & Septic rooms are not available.
17. Blood Bank is not available.
18. CSSD: Receiving & Distribution points are not separate. ETO Sterilizer is not available.
19. Audiometry is non-functional. Speech Therapy is not available.
20. Majority of Nursing staff are GNM & even students are posted in wards for clinical work.
21. There is no separate Residents' Hostel. 4 Staff quarters each having 4 rooms are used as Residents' Hostel. Total available accommodation is not shown. Visitors' room, A.C. study room with Computer & Internet & Recreation room are not available.
22. Anatomy department: Available specimens are 080.
23. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of New Medical College at Myana, Guna, Madhya Pradesh by Muskan Samajik Evam Shiksha Prasar Evam Prachar Samiti, Guna M.P. under Madhya Pradesh Medical Science University, Jabalpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

56. Continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by The Tamil Nadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University, Chennai in respect of students being trained at Madurai Medical College, Madurai.

Read: the matter with regard to continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by The Tamil Nadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University, Chennai in respect of students being trained at Madurai Medical College, Madurai.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report along with the previous assessment report (11th June, 2015) and decided to recommend that recognition of MBBS degree granted by The Tamil Nadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University, Chennai in respect of students being trained at Madurai Medical College, Madurai be continued restricting the number of admission to 150 (One Hundred Fifty) students.

57. Continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata in respect of students being trained at Midnapore Medical College, Midnapore.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (29th December, 2015) along with the previous assessment report (10th July, 2015) and noted the following:-

3. Wards: Distance between 2 beds in Gynaecology ward is < 1.5 m.
4. Histopathology (441 in 9 months – i.e. 49/month) & Cytopathology (697 in 9 months – i.e. 77/month) workload is inadequate.
5. O.T.s: Six Major O.T.s are available against requirement of 7.
6. Casualty: Central O₂ and Central Suction are not available. Crash Cart is not available.

14. Workload of CT Scan is NIL on day of assessment.
15. Hospital lecture Theater is not of Gallery type. Deficiency is partially rectified.
16. OPD: Three examination rooms are available in General Medicine & 2 in General Surgery against requirement of 4 in each department.
17. Intercom is not available.
18. RHTC & UHC are still under the control of Govt. of Chhatisgarh and not under Dean. Deficiency remains as it is.
19. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the compliance verification assessment report dt. 02/12/2015 along with previous assessment reports (24th September, 2014) with regard to continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore in respect of students being trained at Basaveshwara Medical College, Chitradurga for 100 seats was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 28.12.2015 and it was decided as under:-

9. Hospital building is in various stages of construction. No indoor facilities are available. There are no beds in any ward functional.
10. OPD: It is run Registration Counters are not separate for males/females. Separate counters are not available for OPD/IPD. They are not computerized. No staff for Registration is available. Waiting area is not available. Total 7 examination rooms are available against requirement of 4 rooms for each major department. No facility is available in any departmental OPD.
11. OPD attendance was 20-25 on first day of assessment; on 2nd day of assessment it was only 10.
12. No patient was admitted.
13. Data of clinical material of last 3 months as provided by institute are made up & grossly overstated and do not concur with facilities actually observed on day of assessment.
14. No Radiological or Laboratory facility is available.
15. Casualty: Neither staff nor equipment are available.
16. Central Clinical laboratory is not available.
17. O.T.s, ICCU & all ICUs, Labour Room are not available.
18. No static or mobile X-ray machines or USG are available.
19. Blood Bank is not available.
20. CSSD, Intercom, Laundry, Kitchen, Canteen are not available.
21. No arrangements have been made for disposal of Biomedical waste.
22. Nursing staff: Only 09 Nurses are available against 175 required.
23. Paramedical & Non-teaching staff: None available.
24. MRD is manual. ICD X classification of diseases is not followed for indexing.
25. College Council, Pharmaco Vigilance Committee are not constituted.
26. College building is initial stage of construction.
27. Central Library is under construction.
28. Students', Residents' & Nurses' Hostels are under construction.
29. Residential Quarters are under construction.
30. Gender Harassment Committee is not constituted.
31. Preclinical departments are not functional as the college building is under construction.
32. Connected load of electric supply is inadequate as detailed in report.
33. Website is not available.
34. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to seek an explanation from the Secretary (ME) of Telengana as to how the Essentiality Certificate had been issued when the hospital is still under construction.

7. MRD: It is manual. ICD X classification of diseases is not followed for indexing.
8. Casualty: Only 10 beds are available in casualty against requirement of 20. Central O₂ and Central Suction are not functional. Disaster Trolley, Pulse Oxymeter are not available.
9. Central Clinical laboratory: Separate sections are not available.
10. O.T.s: There are 2 tables in Orthopaedics & O.G. O.T.s which is not as per norms.
11. ICUs: There is no separate ICCU. Patients are kept in MICU which has only 6 beds against combined total of 10 beds. SICU is not available.
12. Radiodiagnosis department: Only 2 mobile X-ray machines are available against requirement of 4 out of which 1 is non-functional. Only 3 static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 5 out of which 2 are non-functional. Only 2 USG are available against requirement of 3.

13. CSSD: There is no separate CSSD.
14. MEU is not functioning as per norms.
15. Examination Hall: Capacity of available examination hall is 150 against requirement of 250.
16. Lecture Theaters: Lecture Theaters of capacity 180 are not available. E class facility is not available.
17. Central Library: It is not air-conditioned. It is furnished with wooden benches.
18. Common Rooms for Boys & Girls are not available.
19. Central photography section is not available.
20. Central research Laboratory is not available.
21. Anatomy department: Only 80 specimens are available. Embalming room is not available. Band saw is not functional. Capacity of Demonstration rooms is less.
22. Only 1 Demonstration room is available against requirement of 2 in Physiology & Biochemistry departments.
23. UHC: Specialists' visits are not organized.
24. Website: Information provided is incomplete.
25. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for increase of seats in MBBS course from 100 to 150 u/s 10A of the IMC Act 1956 in respect of Midnapore Medical College, Midnapore under West Bengal University of Health Sciences for the academic year 2016-17.

71. Increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-250 for the academic session 2016-17 at RajaRajeswari Medical College & Hospital, Bangalore.

Read: the matter with regard to increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-250 for the academic session 2016-17 at RajaRajeswari Medical College & Hospital, Bangalore.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (19th and 20th January, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. OPD attendance was only 1,855 on day of assessment which is less than minimum required of 3,000. On verification, Central Registry OPD does not match with individual OPD register. OPD starts at 9:00 a.m. & on verification at 09:40 a.m., total OPD cases registered were 955. As there are 4 Registration counters, it means 240 registrations/counter in less than 1 hour which is not feasible. It appears that it is computer generated inflated data.
2. Bed occupancy was 50.09 % on day of assessment.
3. There is no record of cases in OPD & admissions in wards, particularly with reference to General Medicine Units 6, 7 & 8 and also General Surgery Units 6, 7 & 8.
4. One patient # 20160104448, Mr. Pasha, was patient of Urology but admitted in General Surgery Unit; case paper showed Urology admission. There was no treatment chart.
5. There were many non-genuine patients found in other major departments like General Medicine, Orthopaedics, ENT, O.G. wards, etc. Most of the patients were without proper treatment chart.
6. There was no signage of Unit wise bed distribution in Orthopaedics, General Surgery, General Medicine, Paediatrics and Skin & VD wards.
7. Shortage of Residents is 8.6 % as detailed in the report.

8. OPD: Records of Special clinics like Child Welfare clinic, Child Rehabilitation clinic are not available in the department.
9. Wards: In all wards there was no resuscitation cart. Demonstration rooms in wards have capacity of 20 which is less.
10. There were only 8 Major & 9 Minor operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment.
11. Radiological investigation workload is inadequate. Workload of Special investigations like Ba, IVP is NIL.
12. Workload of Histopathology & Cytopathology is NIL.
13. O.T.s: Only 8 O.T.s were functional on day of assessment against 11 required.
14. Labour Room: Eclampsia beds are not as per norms.
15. Blood Bank: There is discrepancy between number of units stored as shown in notice board (260) and in stock (141). NIL unit was dispensed on 19/01/2016 & 20/01/2016 upto noon.
16. There is no signage of OPD timings.
17. Number of tablets, E.g. Paracetamol, Ibuprofen, dispatched from pharmacy counter does not match with number of OPD & IPD patients.
18. All I year Residents are paid stipend in cash.
19. In CSSD, there is no record of total drums & trays dispatched per day / per month.
20. Nursing staff was inadequate in clinical wards.
21. CSSD: Record keeping is poor.
22. MRD: It is partially computerized. Data of past admitted patients could not be provided.
23. Central Library: Space between 2 tables is small.
24. Students' Hostels: Girls' Hostel is combined with Nurses' hostel.
25. Anatomy department: Available specimens are 222. Laboratory is small in size and cannot accommodate 150 students as claimed.
26. Laboratories in Physiology, Biochemistry, Microbiology, Forensic Medicine departments are small in size and cannot accommodate 150 students as claimed.
27. Pathology department: Mounted specimens are only 160.
28. RHTC: No documents are available to show that specialists' visits are carried out. As per attendance register, there are no Health Inspector, Public Health Nurse & Medical Social Worker.
29. UHC: No documents are available to show that specialists' visits are carried out.
30. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, as the applicant college does not meet the Qualifying Criteria 6(b)(ii) & 6(b)(iii) of Opening of New or Higher Courses of Study or Training (including Postgraduate Course of Study or Training) and increase of Admission Capacity in any course of Study or Training (including Postgraduate Course of Study or Training) (Amendment) Regulations, 2009 (Part-III) as OPD attendance and Bed occupancy are less than the required for eligibility, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for increase in MBBS seats from 150 to 250 at RajaRajeswari Medical College & Hospital, Bangalore under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 10A of the IMC Act 1956 for academic year 2016-17 recommending disapproval of the scheme to the Central Govt. as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the Regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

72. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 150 MBBS seats at NRI Medical College & General Hospital, Guntur under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada.

Read: the matter with regard to compliance verification assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 150 MBBS seats at NRI Medical College & General Hospital, Guntur under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (19.01.2016) along with assessment report (02.07.2015, 16th April, 2015 and 19th & 20th January, 2015) and decided to revoke notice issued under clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010.

73. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at MNR Medical College & Hospital, Medak, Telangana under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada.

Read: the matter with regard to compliance verification assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at MNR Medical College & Hospital, Medak, Telangana under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (19.01.2016) along with assessment report (22.04.2015 and 19th & 20th January, 2015) and noted the following:-

1. OPD attendance is 998 on day of assessment against 1,200 required.
2. Distance between a few beds is < 1.5 m.
3. There were only 12 Major operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment which is inadequate for an institute running several PG courses.
4. Histopathology workload is only 08 on day of assessment.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to revoke clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and to give an opportunity to the college authorities for submission of compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

74. Establishment of new medical college at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh by G.C.R.G Memorial Trust, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya Awadh University, Faizabad, Uttar Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh by G.C.R.G Memorial Trust, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya Awadh University, Faizabad, Uttar Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (20th and 21st January, 2016) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 73.84 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 78.26 % as detailed in the report.
3. Teaching beds are deficient as under:

4. OPD attendance was 461 on day of assessment which is inadequate.
5. Bed occupancy was 36 % on day of assessment.
6. OPD: There were very few patients in OPD at time of visit by assessors at 10:30 a.m. & again at 12:30 p.m. Most of the rooms were empty with no doctors or patients. Registers were not maintained or had inaccurate data.
7. Wards: All wards did not have Pantry. Paediatrics ward did not have facility for heating milk for babies.
8. There was only 1 Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
9. Radiological & Laboratory investigation workload is grossly inadequate.
10. Data of clinical material given by Dean are highly inflated.
11. Casualty: Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available.
12. ICUs: There was NIL patient in ICCU or any of ICUs on day of assessment. There is no Ventilator in PICU/NICU.
13. Labour Room: There was no woman at time of visit. There is no Parturition register.
14. Paramedical & Non-teaching staff: Only 39 Paramedical & Non-teaching staff are available against requirement of 100.
15. Pharmaco Vigilance Committee: No meeting is held till date.
16. Central Library: Reading rooms for students appear to be congested.
17. Central Photography Section is not available.
18. Residents' Hostel: All rooms are locked; no register is maintained for the inmates of the hostel. Not even a single off call or night duty Resident was found in the hostel.
19. Nurses' Hostel: All rooms were locked.
20. Anatomy department: Available specimens are 115.
21. Biochemistry department: In Practical laboratory, there is no water supply, no gas connections and distance between 2 tables is congested.
22. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 pertaining to the person owning and managing a hospital of not less than 300 beds, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh by G.C.R.G Memorial Trust, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh under Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya Awadh University, Faizabad, Uttar Pradesh to the Central Government

recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

75. Establishment of new medical college at Chittoor, Andhra Pradesh by Apollo Hospitals Educational & Research Foundation, Telangana with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Chittoor, Andhra Pradesh by Apollo Hospitals Educational & Research Foundation, Telangana with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (22nd and 23rd January, 2016) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 18.46 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 17.39 % as detailed in the report.
3. Hospital proposed to be affiliated to medical college is still under control of Government of Andhra Pradesh. It has not been handed over to the college as yet.
4. Units are not organized as per Regulations.
5. Teaching beds are deficient as under:

6. OPD: Registration counters are not computerized. Teaching areas are not available. Enquiry desk is not available. Dressing room is not available in Ophthalmology OPD. Special clinic facilities are inadequate in Paediatrics & O.G. OPD.
7. Casualty: Central O₂ & Central Suction are not available. Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available. There is no life saving equipment in Casualty.
8. Workload of Microbiology, Histopathology & Cytopathology is NIL.
9. MRD: It is partly computerized. ICD X classification of diseases is not followed for indexing.
10. Central Clinical laboratory is outsourced to Medall Healthcare Limited which is not permissible. Separate sections are not available.
11. O.T.s: Central O₂ & Central Suction are not available.
12. ICUs: Central O₂ & Central Suction are not available. Ventilator, ABG are not available.
13. ETO Sterilizer is not available.
14. Nursing Staff: List is not provided.
15. Paramedical & Non-teaching staff: List is not provided.
16. Audiometry & Speech therapy are not available.
17. AERB approval is not available.

18. Medical Education Unit, College Council, Pharmaco Vigilance Committee are not constituted.
19. Lecture Theaters: They are not functional. Audio Visual aids are not available. E class facility is not available.
20. Central Library is under construction.
21. College building is under construction.
22. Central Photography Section is not available.
23. Students' Hostels are under construction. Hired accommodation is provided 2.5 kms. away from campus which is not permissible.
24. Residents' Hostel is provided as 14 rooms, each being 4 bedded room which is not permissible.
25. Nurses' Hostel is not available.
26. Residential Quarters are under construction. Hired accommodation is provided 2.5 kms. away from campus which is not permissible.
27. Recreational facilities are not available.
28. Anatomy department: Dissection Hall, Embalming room are under construction. Cold storage for dead bodies, Storage tank are not available. Practical Laboratory is not furnished. Microscopes are not available. Audio Visual aids are not available. Seating arrangement is not made in museum. Available specimens are 125. MRI & CT films are not available. Band saw is not available. Lockers are not available.
29. Physiology department is under construction.
30. Biochemistry department: Demonstration rooms are not furnished. Audiovisual aids are not available. Only 1 Demonstration room is available against requirement of 2. Practical laboratory is not furnished & non-functional.
31. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 pertaining to the person owning and managing a hospital of not less than 300 beds, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Chittoor, Andhra Pradesh by Apollo Hospitals Educational & Research Foundation, Telangana under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

76. Establishment of new medical college at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh by Al-Millat Foundation Trust, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya Awadh University, Faizabad, Uttar Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh by Al-Millat Foundation Trust, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya Awadh University, Faizabad, Uttar Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dated 20/01/2016 from the appointed team of the Council assessors and noted the following:

“We, the undersigned assessed the Avadh Insitute of Medical Technologies and Hosptial, Lucknow, UP on 20/01/2016. We reached in the college at 9.45 AM but Principal and no faculties were present in the Institute.

We, the three assessors visited the college & hospital campus with help of few paramedical staffs, Photograph in our own mobile has been taken.

Only one patient was admitted in emergency ward, Bed occuoancy is 1 out of total existing bed strength 142.

No patient in OPD, no operation was going on, no patient in NICU, PICU & ICU, in a sentence the hospital is non-functioning –infrastructure is not as per MSR.

No blood bank is available in the hospital.

One Pharmacy with a pharmacist was available.

Regarding college side one museum of Anatomy without having any mounted specimen available for ANM & GNM courses (which is not as per MSR).

One library is available which is not as per MSR (No Journals & seating capacity only 50 chairs, not adequate books are available.

No faculty resident doctors are available except one Unani doctor, two optometrists.

One Girls hostel with 25 rooms (50 beds) are available at present occupied by ANM & GNM students.

At 12.45 PM the chairperson came to college and accepted our letter to Principal which was duly signed by him and informed us no Principal & Medical Superintendent are appointed till date.”

In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 pertaining to the person owning and managing a hospital of not less than 300 beds, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh by Al-Millat Foundation Trust, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh under Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya Awadh University, Faizabad, Uttar Pradesh to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to seek an explanation from the Secretary (ME) of Uttar Pradesh as to how the Essentiality Certificate had been issued when the hospital is non-functional.

77. Establishment of new medical college at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh by Society for the Advancement of Environmental Sciences, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya Awadh University, Faizabad, Uttar Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh by Society for the Advancement of Environmental Sciences, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya Awadh University, Faizabad, Uttar Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council perused the letter dated 20/01/2016 of the Dean of the Institute which reads as under-

“With reference to your visit 20.1.2016 on the subject cited above, please be informed that we have filed an IA no. 4/2015 in Medical Council of India SLP no. 28100 of 2015 which has been put up before the 3 judges bench of Hon’ble Supreme Court and date was fixed by the court on 19.1.2015 for hearing and matter was listed on item no.1 of the cause list. However, in supplementary list the item has been deleted and shall be put up on next possible date. It may be noted that we have sought clarification from the Hon’ble Supreme Court as to whether the application submitted to Ministry of Health & F.W., on dated 31.8.2015 shall be treated as renewal application after the High Court and Supreme Court order or as fresh application.

We have been instructed by our legal counsel not to allow any inspection and maintain status quo as on 29.9.2015 till any further order of Supreme Court. Hence, we would not like to disturb the status quo till we received any order from Supreme Court.”

The Executive Committee of the Council further noted that legal opinion of the Standing Counsel had been sought which reads as under:-

“ I have gone through the file of the querist along with the application and communications made by the applicant college. Before giving any specific opinion in the matter, it would be appropriate to consider the following facts:-

1. *The applicant Society vide letter dated 30.09.2013 had submitted their application/scheme for establishment of a new medical college for the academic session 2014-15. After the scrutiny of the said application/scheme, it was found that the Society has not submitted the letter of consent of affiliation along with their application for the academic year 2014-15 which is mandatory required as per the statutory Regulations of the querist.*
2. *Since, the application/scheme dated 30.09.2012 was incomplete, thus the Scrutiny Committee of the querist, in its meeting held on 10/11.02.2014 had decided to return the application of the Society for the establishment of new medical college for the academic year 2014-15. The aforesaid recommendations of the querist were forwarded to the Government of India vide letter dated 14.02.2014.*
3. *The Society being aggrieved by the recommendation of the querist dated 14.2.2014, had approached the Hon’ble High Court of Judicature at Allahabad, Lucknow Bench, by way of W.P.(C) No. 1605 of 2014(M/B), thereby praying for directions to the querist to consider the application/scheme of the Society and grant permission for establishing medical college for the academic year 2014-15.*
4. *The W.P. 1605 (M/B)/2014, came up for hearing before the Hon’ble High Court of Judicature at Allahabad, on 26.05.2015, whereupon, the Hon’ble High Court, after hearing the parties, had directed to consider the application of the Society for establishment of new medical college from academic year 2014-15.*
5. *The querist being aggrieved by the order dated 26.05.2014 passed in W.P. 1605 (M/B)/2014, by the Hon’ble High Court of Judicature at Allahabad, had*

approached the Hon'ble Supreme Court by way of SLP (C) No. 14759 of 2014, titled *MCI vs. Society For Advancement Of Environmental Science*. The Hon'ble Supreme Court vide its order dated 02.07.2014 passed in Civil Appeal No. 5933 of 2014 arising out of SLP (C) No. 14759 of 2014, was pleased to dispose of the Civil Appeal with direction to the querist to consider the application of Society for establishment of new medical college for the next academic year i.e. 2015-16 and inspect the respondent medical college on or before 31.10.2014, if, the medical college submits all relevant documents as per the existing practice.

6. Since, the Society was able to furnish all the requisite documents for consideration of their application for starting of a new medical college by 10th October, 2014, the querist had moved an application for direction being I.A. No. 2/2015, in the above mentioned C.A. No. 5933/2014, for extension of time to comply with order dated 02.07.2014 passed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court. The above application came for hearing before the Hon'ble Supreme Court on 17.11.2014, wherein, after hearing the parties, the Hon'ble Supreme Court was pleased to grant 4 weeks' time to the querist to comply with order dated 02.07.2014.
7. In compliance with the order dated 02.07.2014 and 17.11.2014 passed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court, the querist, after considering the application of the Society had carried out the inspection of the infrastructure, teaching faculty, clinical material and other physical facilities available with the medical college on 09/10.12.2014.
8. The assessment report dated 09th& 10th of December, 2014, was placed before the Executive Committee of the querist in its meeting held on 13.01.2015, wherein, apart from other gross deficiencies found in the medical college it was found that the medical college has failed to fulfill the qualifying criteria of having 300 bedded hospital. The inspection team found only 240 beds in the medical college. In view of the grave deficiencies pertaining to infrastructure, teaching faculty, residents, clinical material and other physical facilities in the medical college it was decided to return the application of the Society as the respondent medical college had failed to fulfil the eligibility criteria as per Regulation 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation, 1999 – own or manage 300 bedded hospital. The decision of the querist was communicated to the Central Government vide letter dated 21.1.2015.
9. The medical college had furnished a compliance to the Central Govt. vide their letter dated 10.02.2015 and the Central Govt. had granted a hearing to the Society on 12.02.2015. The Central Government vide its letter dated 20.02.2015, had requested the querist to review its recommendations in light of the documents submitted by the medical college. The case of the medical college was re-considered by the Executive Committee of the querist in its meeting held on 29.04.2015 wherein it was decided to reiterate its earlier decision to recommend to the Central Government to return the application of the Society for establishment of a new medical college for the academic year 2015-16 and the same was communicated to the Central Govt. vide letter dated 11.05.2015.
10. The Govt. of India, after considering the recommendations of the querist, vide its decision dated 15.06.2015, had disapproved the application of the Society for the establishment of new medical college from academic year 2015-16.
11. Aggrieved by the above-mentioned decision of the Govt. of India the Society had approached the Hon'ble High Court of Judicature at Allahabad, Lucknow Bench, Lucknow by way of W.P. No. 6703(M/B)/2015 inter-alia, praying for directions to the Govt. of India to reconsider the application of the Society for permission for establishment of new medical college from academic year 2015-16 and to quash the recommendation of the querist dated 11.05.2015 and Govt. of India decision dated 15.06.2015.
12. The Hon'ble High Court of Allahabad, Lucknow Bench, Lucknow, vide its interim order dated 29.07.2015, had directed the querist to carry out the inspection of the respondent medical college within a period of 4 weeks. The querist being aggrieved by the above-mentioned interim order passed by the Hon'ble High Court, approached the Hon'ble Supreme Court by way of SLP (C) No. 26006/2015 which is pending adjudication before the Hon'ble Supreme Court.
13. The writ petition being W.P. No. 6703(M/B)/2015 came up for hearing before the Hon'ble High Court of Judicature at Allahabad, Lucknow Bench, Lucknow on 24.09.2015, when the Hon'ble High Court after hearing the parties, vide interim order dated 24.09.2015 had allowed the medical college to make provisional

admission of 150 M.B.B.S students for academic year 2015-16, without there being any formal permission from the Central Govt., subject to the outcome of the writ petition.

14. The querist being aggrieved by the aforesaid interim order dated 24.09.2015 whereby the medical college had been granted permission to make provisional admission of 150 MBBS students for the academic year 2015-16, had approached the Hon'ble Supreme Court by way of SLP (C) No.28100 of 2015.
15. The Hon'ble Supreme Court after hearing the parties vide its order dated 29.09.2015 passed in SLP (C) No. 26006/2015 had directed the querist in view of the peculiar facts of the case to carry out an inspection of the medical college as directed by the Hon'ble High Court on or before 10.10.2015 and to keep the report of the inspection in a sealed cover.
16. The Hon'ble Supreme Court after hearing the parties vide its order dated 29.09.2015 passed in SLP (C) No. 28100/2015 had observed that in view of the interim order dated 24.09.2015 the medical college had granted admission to 150 MBBS students on 28.09.2015 but in view of the fact the medical college had only 240 beds against the statutory requirement of 300 beds, the Hon'ble Supreme Court had directed that status quo as on 24.09.2015 shall be maintained and admission granted to 150 MBBS students shall not be given effect to. The relevant portion of the order dated 29.09.2015 is reproduced as under:

"...It is an admitted fact that the respondent-institute had been given permission to start the college by the High Court by virtue of an order dated 24th September, 2015, an interim order. The respondent-institute was permitted to give admission to the students and in pursuance of the said order, an advertisement inviting students for admission had been published on 27th September, 2015 and on 28th September, 2015 admissions had been given to 150 students.

It has been submitted by the learned counsel for the petitioner that the requirement of beds in the Department of Surgery was 300 at the time when the initial inspection had taken place and application for commencement of a medical college was made but at the time of inspection, only 240 beds were found.

Though, the said submission of fact has been objected to by the learned counsel for the respondent institute. Looking at the peculiar facts of the case, we direct that status quo as on 24th September, 2015, shall be maintained. Admission of students, if any, shall not be given effect to...

17. The Hon'ble Supreme Court on 26.10.2015 was informed that in pursuance of the order dated 29.09.2015 an inspection of the medical college had been conducted and the inspection report has been placed before the Hon'ble Court in a sealed cover. The Hon'ble Supreme Court vide its order dated 26.10.2015 had directed that the inspection report shall be considered by the Executive Committee of the querist and its recommendations shall be placed before the Hon'ble Court before 20.11.2015. It was further directed that a copy of the inspection report shall be supplied to the advocate of the medical college so that the comments of the medical college could be furnished. The relevant portion of the order dated 26.10.2015 is reproduced as under:

"...It has been submitted by the learned counsel for the petitioners that in pursuance of the order passed by this Court on 29th September, 2015, inspection of the Medical College has taken place and the Report of the inspection has been kept in a sealed cover and the same has been placed before this Court.

We direct that the Report of the inspection be placed before the Executive Committee of the petitioner-MCI and the Committee shall consider the said report in accordance with law and forward its remarks to this Court on or before 20th November, 2015.

A copy of the Report shall be forwarded to the respondents-colleges through their counsel in two days and respondents-colleges to give their comments on the Report within one week from the receipt of the Report..."

18. The above SLPs filed by the querist are pending adjudication before the Hon'ble Supreme Court. In the above SLPs the college has also made an application for review / recall of order dated 29.09.2015 passed by the Hon'ble Apex Court and the same is also pending adjudication.

19. *In the meanwhile, the Society vide its letter dated 28.08.2015 had submitted to the Central Govt. a fresh application / scheme for the establishment of a new medical college for the academic session 2016-17. The aforesaid application / scheme dated 28.08.2015 has been forwarded to the querist by the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 15.09.2015.*
20. *The querist after the receipt of the application/scheme dated 28.08.2015 for the establishment of a new medical college for the academic session 2016-17, vide its letter dated 04/09.12.2015 had requested the Society to submit the CD/DVD of the Declaration Forms as well as the Standard Inspection Forms A & B within 7 days of the dispatch of the said letter.*
21. *Since the querist did not receive the information / documents as had been requested vide letter dated 04/09.12.2015, the querist vide its letter dated 17.12.2015 requested the Society to submit the desired documents on or before 22.12.2015 failing which the querist would proceed as per the provision of the Regulations.*
22. *The Society vide its letter dated 15.12.2015, received on 22.12.2015, had informed the querist that since SLP No.26006/2015 was pending before the Hon'ble Supreme Court thus it would be desirable to keep the action on your letter in abeyance.*
23. *The querist vide its letter dated 28.12.2015 yet again requested the society to submit the desired documents on or before 31.12.2015 since the cases pending before the Hon'ble Supreme Court were relating to the academic year 2015-16 and the same did not have any bearing on the fresh application dated 28.08.2015 submitted by the Society for the establishment of a new medical college for the academic session 2016-17.*
24. *The Society vide letter dated 29.12.2015 received on 01.01.2016 informed the querist that an application had been filed in SLP No.28100 / 2015 seeking a clarification in respect of the processing of the application for the academic session 2016-17 and thus in terms of the legal advice rendered to the Society, the querist was requested not to proceed with the fresh application dated 28.08.2015 submitted by the Society for the establishment of a new medical college for the academic session 2016-17.*
25. *The querist vide its letter dated 06.01.2016 had informed the Society that its letter dated 29.12.2015 had been considered by the Competent Authority and it had been decided to reiterate the earlier decision which had been communicated to the Society vide letter dated 28.12.2015.*
26. *In view of the binding time schedule as have been upheld by the Hon'ble Supreme Court, since the last date to send the 1st round of recommendations to the Central Govt. being 31st January 2016 was fast approaching and in order to avoid any delay in the matter, the inspection of the medical college was scheduled on 20th & 21st of January 2016 for assessing the physical and other teaching facilities available for the establishment of a new medical college for the academic year 2016-17. The assessors appointed by the querist reached the medical college on 20.01.2016 but were prevented by the Chairman and the Dean of the medical college from conducting an inspection of the medical college.*
27. *The assessors in their report dated 20.01.2016 have stated that the OPD of the hospital was empty, the few wards that they visited to assess the bed occupancy were also empty and no faculty or resident were seen in the hospital. Whereafter the Chairman of the medical college came and started shouting & abusing the assessors and had asked to stop the assessment.*
28. *The Dean had given a letter dated 20.01.2016 to the assessors stating that an application being IA No.4/2015 had been filed in SLP No.28100/2015 seeking a clarification on the application submitted to the Central Govt. for the academic year 2016-17 for the establishment of a new medical college to be treated as an application for renewal of permission or a fresh application. The letter states that in terms of the legal advice rendered to the Society no inspection of the medical college shall be allowed in order to maintain status quo as on 29.09.2015 till further order from the Hon'ble Supreme Court.*

In view of the above factual matrix, it is clear that even though the Hon'ble Supreme Court vide its order dated 29.09.2015 passed in SLP (C) No.28100/2015 had directed the Society to maintain status quo as on the date of the passing of the interim order for granting provisional admission i.e. 24.09.2015

and that the admissions granted on 28.09.2015 shall not be given effect to, the Society in blatant violation of the aforesaid order of the Hon'ble Supreme Court has not discharged the students admitted on 28.09.2015. The Society is illegally permitting the students admitted on 28.09.2015 to continue in the medical college.

It is also relevant to point out that the Society vide their application dated 28.08.2015 had submitted a fresh application for the establishment of a new medical college for the academic year 2016-17, the processing of which in terms of the time schedule of the querist did not have any bearing on the pending cases before the Hon'ble Supreme Court i.e. SLP (C) Nos. 26006/2015 & 28100/2015. The cases pending before the Hon'ble Supreme Court pertain to the application submitted by the Society for the establishment of a new medical college for the academic year 2015-16 whereas the Society vide their fresh application dated 28.08.2015 had now submitted an application for the establishment of a new medical college for the academic year 2016-17.

In any case no medical college can be allowed to prevent querist assessors from inspecting the medical college or disrupt any ongoing inspection. Thus I am of the opinion that the querist may place the inspection report dated 20.01.2016 before its Executive Committee which may take a decision on the fresh application dated 28.08.2015 submitted by the Society for the establishment of a new medical college for the academic year 2016-17..."

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh by Society for the Advancement of Environmental Sciences, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh under Dr. Ram Manohar Lohiya Awadh University, Faizabad, Uttar Pradesh to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

78. Increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-200 for the academic session 2016-17 at Deccan College of Medical Sciences, Hyderabad.

Read: the matter with regard to increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-200 for the academic session 2016-17 at Deccan College of Medical Sciences, Hyderabad.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (21st and 22nd January, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 26.34 %(i.e. 54 out of 205) as shown in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 59.29 %(i.e. 67 out of 113) as shown in the report.
3. Teaching Hospital is not Unitary. There are 2 Hospitals – Main campus & Princess Ezra Hospital. Main campus hospital has only 509 beds against 960 required.
4. OPD attendance was 1,205 in main hospital against 2,000 required.
5. Bed occupancy was 22.09 % on day of assessment.
6. OPD: Registration counters are inadequate. Examination rooms are less than required. Injection room is common for males/females. Minor O.T. is not available. Plaster room & Plaster cutting room are common. Dark room is not available in Ophthalmology OPD. Special clinic facilities are inadequate in Paediatrics OPD.
7. Audiometry & Speech Therapy are not available at main hospital.

8. Wards: Wards are not as per MSR Regulations. Many wards have 60-90 patients with 1 functional Nursing station. Demonstration rooms are common between wards. Pantry is not available in most wards.
9. There were only 6 Major & 5 Minor operations on day of assessment.
10. Workload of Radiological & Laboratory investigations is grossly inadequate.
11. Casualty: Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available. 26 beds are available against requirement of 30.
12. O.T.s: Only 7 Major O.T.s are available in Main Hospital against 10 required.
13. ICUs: SICU is not available in Main Hospital campus.
14. Available static X-ray machines are 3 against requirement of 6.
15. CSSD: Receiving & Distribution points are not separate. ETO Sterilizer is not available.
16. Lecture Theaters: Lecture Theater in the hospital is not of Gallery type.
17. Central Library: It is not air-conditioned. Total area & seating capacity are spread over 3 libraries.
18. Common Rooms for Boys & Girls are smaller than required.
19. Students' Hostels: Available accommodation is 218 against 750 required. Study room is not air-conditioned. There is no Recreation room in Girls' Hostel.
20. Interns' Hostel: It is not available.
21. Residents' Hostels: Available accommodation is 72 against 192 required. Study room is not air-conditioned.
22. Anatomy department: Cadavers available are only 5.
23. Microbiology department: Only 5 service laboratories are available against 7 required.
24. RHTC: Cold chain equipment is not provided by college.
25. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, as the applicant college does not meet the Qualifying Criteria 6(a)(ii), 6(a)(iii) & 6(a)(iv) of Opening of New or Higher Courses of Study or Training (including Postgraduate Course of Study or Training) and increase of Admission Capacity in any course of Study or Training (including Postgraduate Course of Study or Training) (Amendment) Regulations, 2009 (Part-III) OPD attendance, Bed occupancy and unitary campus are not as per the Regulations, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for increase in MBBS seats from 150 to 200 at Deccan College of Medical Sciences, Hyderabad under NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 10A of the IMC Act 1956 for academic year 2016-17 recommending disapproval of the scheme to the Central Govt. as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the Regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

The Committee further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any regular inspection of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <80%, such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be

made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956 alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2016-17) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by the institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956 alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

79. Increase of seats in MBBS course from 100-150 for the academic session 2016-17 at Aarupadai Veedu Medical College & Hospital, Puducherry.

Read: the matter with regard to increase of seats in MBBS course from 100-150 for the academic session 2016-17 at Aarupadai Veedu Medical College & Hospital, Puducherry.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (21st and 22nd January, 2016) alongwith the additional information dated 28/01/2016 submitted by the Assessors and noted the following:-

1. Child Rehabilitation clinic is not available in Paediatrics OPD.
2. Teaching beds are inadequate as under:

3. Wards: Distance between 2 beds is < 1.5 m in many wards. Pantry is not available in Tb & Chest and Skin & VD wards.
4. Bed occupancy is 71.85 % as observed by assessors.
5. There was only 1 Normal Delivery & only 1 Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
6. There were only 11 Major operations for the hospital on day of assessment upto 2 p.m.
7. Workload of Radiological & Laboratory investigations is grossly inadequate.
8. Casualty: Only 16 beds are available against 20 required. Only 2 Casualty Medical Officers are available. Crash Cart was not fitted with O₂ at the time of round of assessors.
9. O.T.s: No operation was going on in Ophthalmology & ENT O.T.s at time of round of assessors.
10. ICUs: There was NIL patient in NICU. There is no Ventilator.

11. Only 04 patients were available in Antenatal OPD at 10:05 a.m. on day of assessment.
12. PNDT certificate is issued in name of Dr. P.K. Jayanthi who is not officiating as Dean w.e.f. 06/02/2013.
13. Microbiology department: Water supply in Media preparation room is very poor. BOD Incubator in Mycology laboratory was non-functional.
14. Community medicine department: Museum facilities are inadequate.
15. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for increase of seats in MBBS course from 100 to 150 u/s 10A of the IMC Act 1956 in respect of Aarupadai Veedu Medical College & Hospital, Puducherry under Vinayaka Missions University, Salem for the academic year 2016-17.

80. Increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-250 for the academic session 2016-17 at Smt. NHL Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad.

Read: the matter with regard to increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-250 for the academic session 2016-17 at Smt. NHL Municipal Medical College, Ahmedabad.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (22nd and 23rd January, 2016) alongwith the additional information dated 29/01/2016 submitted by the Assessors and decided to seek clarification regarding department-wise and Unit-wise bed strength in affiliated teaching hospitals from the institute immediately and decided to defer the matter till then.

81. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats Maharashtra Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Talegaon, Pune.

Read: the matter with regard to compliance verification assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats Maharashtra Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Talegaon, Pune.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (22.01.2015) along with assessment report (20.08.2015, 15th April, 2015 & 6th & 7th January, 2015) and perusal of the report of Assessors, the operative part reads as under:

“As the Class III & IV employees are on strike from 12/01/2016 till date, the college and the hospital were closed and locked. As no water is available, all faculty & residents went out. Only Principal & Medical Superintendent are available. So for verification, nothing is available and compliance couldn't be verified...

...

All the patients were shifted out of the hospital. So clinical data is NIL.”

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to direct the Dean of Maharashtra Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Talegaon, Pune to submit when the strike would be called off and the office is directed to arrange for another assessment.

82. Continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Pravara Institute of Medical Sciences (Deemed University), Loni in respect of students being trained at Rural Medical College, Loni.

Read: the matter with regard to continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Pravara Institute of Medical Sciences (Deemed University), Loni in respect of students being trained at Rural Medical College, Loni.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (25th January, 2016) alongwith previous assessment report (9th & 10th July,2015) and noted the following:-

1. Bed occupancy was 64.50 % at 10 a.m. on day of assessment.
2. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to reiterate its earlier decision with regard to application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and to give final opportunity to the college authorities for submission of compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

83. Establishment of new medical college at Dist. Sangli, Maharashtra by Prakash Shikshan Mandal, Urun-Islamapur, Maharashtra with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Dist. Sangli, Maharashtra by Prakash Shikshan Mandal, Urun-Islamapur, Maharashtra with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (15th and 16th January, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Wards: Many Demonstration rooms are congested with inadequate Audio Visual aids.
2. Many of the admitted patients would have been treated on OPD basis and some of the patients did not require admissions at all.
3. The following was observed with regard to random checking of admitted & OPD patients:
 - (a) Mr. Prakash Wakle, ICU Bed # 5, was admitted since 12/01/2016 for fever; he really did not have fever on temperature charts attached in the case sheet.
 - (b) Mr. Jalinder Patil, admitted in General Surgery for Inguinal Hernia did not have any Inguinal Hernia on cross verification.
 - (c) On interview of waiting OPD patients, many had similar vague complaints for which generally people will not seek medical advice.
 - (d) Number of investigations is less.
 - (e) In view of above, clinical material is inadequate.
4. At time of round, there were no patients in Casualty.
5. There were only 5 Major & 2 Minor operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment.

6. MRD: One computer is available but no data have been entered as yet as no qualified person is available. ICD X classification of diseases is not followed for indexing.
7. Casualty: Central O₂ and Central Suction are not available.
8. O.T.s: Although 5 O.T.s are provided, only 3 are functional against requirement of 4.
9. ICUs: There were only 2 patients in PICU/NICU on day of assessment.
10. Labour Room: Eclampsia room is not equipped to manage Eclampsia patients.
11. Anatomy department: There is no wash basin & drainage facility in Embalming room. There are no cross sectional specimens or gross models. Catalogue is incomplete.
12. Physiology department: Office of Professor & HOD is very small & congested.
13. Faculty offices are incompletely partitioned.
14. Overall cleanliness of Residents' Hostel is extremely poor.
15. No meeting of Pharmaco Vigilance Committee has been held during the year.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of new medical college at Dist. Sangli, Maharashtra by Prakash Shikshan Mandal, Urun-Islamapur, Maharashtra under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

84. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at Maharajah's Institute of Medical Sciences, Vizianagaram under NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada.

Read: the matter with regard to compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at Maharajah's Institute of Medical Sciences, Vizianagaram under NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (20.01.2016) along with assessment report (20.08.2015, 20th May, 2015 & 5th & 6th December, 2014) conducted for verification of available facilities of faculty, Residents, infrastructure and other requirements for recognized intake of 100 students and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 16.03 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 13.43 % as detailed in the report.
3. Bed occupancy is 33 % on day of assessment.
4. There were NIL patient in SICU & only 2 patients in ICCU on day of assessment.
5. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to reiterate its earlier decision with regard to application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and to give final opportunity to the college authorities for submission of compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

85. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at Al-Ameen Medical College & Hospital, Bijapur under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore.

Read: the matter with regard to compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at Al-Ameen Medical College & Hospital, Bijapur under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (20.01.2016) along with assessment report (21.08.2015, 20th May, 2015 & 8th & 9th December, 2014) and decided to revoke notice issued under clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010.

The Executive Committee also noted that in the meeting of the General Body of the Council held on 01.10.2015, the General Body had withheld the recommendation of the continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore in respect of students being trained at Al Ameen Medical College, Bijapur for 100 admissions due to the application of Clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 on the renewal application for increase of seats for the academic year 2015-16.

Therefore, in view of the above decision of the Committee of revoking the Clause 8(3)(1)(c), the Executive Committee of the Council decided that the continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore in respect of students being trained at Al Ameen Medical College, Bijapur for 100 admissions be continued restricting the number of admissions to 100 (One hundred) students per year and the same be placed before the General Body of the Council.

86. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at Rama Medical College, Hospital & Research, Kanpur.

Read: the matter with regard to compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at Rama Medical College, Hospital & Research, Kanpur.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (22.01.2016) along with assessment report (21.08.2015, 7th May, 2015 & 19th & 20th September, 2014) and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 5.71 % on day of assessment.
2. Some of patients were admitted with vague complaints like headache, pain in abdomen, generalized body ache, etc.
3. Workload of Histopathology was only 09 & Cytopathology only 11 on day of assessment.
4. Investigation workload of Plain X-rays is inadequate (94 on day of assessment)
5. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.
