The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment reports (17th February, 2017 and 9th& 10th March, 2017) alongwith a letter dated 10.03.2017 received from the Dean of the Institute and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 17.14 % as detailed in the report.
2. There were only 02 Minor Operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment.
3. AERB approval is not available.
4. ETO Sterilizer is not available.
5. Intercom is not functional.
6. Central Library: Only Computer room & AV room are air-conditioned. Resident reading room is not available.
7. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Govt. Sivagangai Medical College & Hospital, Sivagangai for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

10. Recognition/approval of Govt. Medical College, Bhavnagar for the award of MBBS degree granted by Maharaja Krishnakumarsinghi Bhavnagar University, Bhavnagar against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

11. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 130 MBBS seats at Sri Siddhartha Medical College, Tumkur under Siddhartha University, Tumkur.

Read: the matter with regard to Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 130 MBBS seats at Sri Siddhartha Medical College, Tumkur under Siddhartha University, Tumkur.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (08.03.2017) along with previous assessment reports (04.08.2016 & 05.04.2016) and noted the following:-

1. In Surgery wards, many patients of Gastritis & Urinary Tract Infections were admitted.
2. Most of the USG reports with indoor patients in Surgical wards were without date of USG examination.
3. In Paediatrics ward, some patients did not have clinical findings of importance.
4. ICUs: There were only 1 patient in PICU & 2 patients in ICCU on day of assessment. PICU is not having adequate facilities like monitors, syringe pumps, infusion pumps, defibrillator, ABG machine, suction.
5. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Sri Siddhartha Medical College, Tumkur for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Siddhartha University, Tumkur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter.

The Executive Committee further decided to revoke notice issued under clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

12. **Recognition/approval of Sree Gokulam Medical College and Research Foundation, Trivandrum for the award of MBBS degree granted by Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur against the increased intake i.e. from 50 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Sree Gokulam Medical College and Research Foundation, Trivandrum for the award of MBBS degree granted by Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur against the increased intake i.e. from 50 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the compliance verification assessment report (17.03.2016) alongwith previous assessment report (4th & 5th November, 2015) was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 13.05.2016 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (17.03.2016) along with assessment report (4th & 5th November, 2015) as well as letter dated 22.03.2016 from the Principal of the college and noted the following:-

1. *On actual physical verification, it was found that bed occupancy was 54 % at 10 a.m. on day of assessment. (i.e. 369 out of 680 beds).*
2. *No emergency operation was performed during the period of 24 hours from 11 a.m. 16/02/2016 till 11 a.m. 17/02/2016.*
3. *Dean refused to sign the assessment report after reading the same.*
4. *Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.*

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 6th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 50-150 in respect of Sree Gokulam Medical College & Research Foundation, Trivandrum under Kerala University of Health & Allied Sciences, Thrissur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18th March, 2016, which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses."

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses."

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Government vide Council letter dated 15.05.2016.

The Council vide another letter dated 15.05.2016 had issued the Show Cause Notice to the college authorities to explain as to why the Council should not proceed to recommend to the Central Govt. for withdrawal of recognition of MBBS degree/Postgraduate course of the institute and stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate course.

On the recommendations of the Council, the Central Govt. vide its letter 10.06.2016 had conveyed its decision to the College authorities as well as other concerned authorities not to admit any students against increased intake from 50-150 in MBBS course for the academic year 2016-17.

Thereafter the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 26.09.2016 had granted approval to the said college for renewal of permission for admission of 6th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 50-150 for the academic year 2016-17, in light of the directive dated 13.06.2016 of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee (OC), subject to submission of bank guarantees, affidavit and some other conditions.

In continuation to the earlier letter dated 26.09.2016, the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 28.09.2016 had forwarded the following documents as submitted by the college to the Ministry on 27.09.2016:-

- i. *An affidavit dated 27.09.2016 from the Chairman of the Trust/Society and the Dean /Principal of the College concerned*
- ii. *A bank guarantee bearing No. IBG71538 dated 27.09.2016 Rs 2 Cr issued by Federal Bank of Ltd in favour of MCI, with a validity of 1 year.*

In reference to the Council's letter dated 26.09.2016, the Principal, Sree Gokulam Medical College and Research Foundation, Trivandrum had submitted the detailed compliance which was verified by the Council assessors by way of compliance verification assessment on 10.02.2017.

The Executive Committee further noted that in reference to conditional approval granted by the Central Govt. in the light of directive/approval of the Oversight Committee, an assessment for verifying the conditions stipulated in the Letter of Permission dated 26.09.2016 for renewal of permission for admission of

6th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 50-150 for the academic year 2016-17 was carried out by the Council Assessors on 10.02.2017 and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to revoke notice issued under clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016 and further confirm the conditional Letter of Permission for renewal of permission for admission of 6th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 50-150 for the academic year 2016-17 in respect of Sree Gokulam Medical College & Research Foundation, Trivandrum under Kerala University of Health & Allied Sciences, Thrissur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to recommend to the Central Government for recognition/approval of Sree Gokulam Medical College and Research Foundation, Trivandrum for the award of MBBS degree granted by Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur against the increased intake i.e. from 50 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

8 (3) ...

(2) The recognition so granted to an Undergraduate Course for award of MBBS degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

13. Increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-250 at VSS Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Burla u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to increase of seats in MBBS course from 150-250 at VSS Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Burla u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic session 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dated 02.03.2017 received from the Central Govt., Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, New Delhi forwarding therewith the representation/compliance dated 18.02.2017 submitted by the Dean & Principal, VSS Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Burla.

The Executive Committee noted that the Ministry under its Committee had given personal hearing to the authorized representatives of the medical colleges/applicants on 21.02.2017 and 22.02.2017 and forwarded observations/recommendations of the Committee constituted by the Ministry in the matter, which is as under:-

“The college contended that the satellite hospital was not considered by the assessors. 54 new faculty has been appointed on contractual basis. Medical College of 250 seats requires a unitary campus. In view of the compliance submitted, recommended for review by MCI.”

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance submitted by the Institute and noted the following:-

1. Regarding OPD attendance, the Institute is contending that figures of satellite hospital have not been considered. In this regard, Section 6.B(iv) of Part II of Opening of New or Higher Course Regulations, 2000, so far as increase to 250 intake is concerned, the hospital has to be unitary. These Regulations being Statutory Regulations are mandatory & binding in character and are required to be adhered to by all authorities. Hence OPD attendance at main hospital only can be considered which being 2,071 is less than minimum 3,000 required as per Regulations. Resultantly, Qualifying Criteria are not fulfilled.
2. As stated in compliance, faculty deficiency is 22.2 %.
3. As stated in compliance, shortage of Residents is 12.1 %.
4. With regard to teaching beds, O.T.s, as stated above, beds at Satellite Hospital cannot be considered. Resultantly deficiency remains as it is.
5. CT Scan is dual slice against minimum 16 slice required. Deficiency remains as it is.
6. Deficiency of inadequate area of Central Library remains as it is.
7. ICD X classification of diseases is not followed for indexing. Deficiency remains as it is.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council reiterated its earlier decision to return the application for increase in MBBS seats from 150 to 250 at VSS Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Burla under Sambalpur University, Burla for the academic year 2017-2018 recommending disapproval of the scheme to the Central Govt. as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the Regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

14. Recognition/Approval of GMERS Medical College, Dharpur, Patan, Gujarat for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Hemchandarya North Gujarat University, Patan u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of GMERS Medical College, Dharpur, Patan, Gujarat for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Hemchandarya North Gujarat University, Patan u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment reports (18th January, 2017 and 8th & 9th March, 2017) and decided to recommend to the Central Government for recognition/approval of GMERS Medical College, Dharpur, Patan, Gujarat for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Hemchandarya North Gujarat University, Patan u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

8 (3) ...

(2) The recognition so granted to an Undergraduate Course for award of MBBS degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.

(3) The procedure for 'Renewal' of recognition shall be same as applicable for the award of recognition.

(4) Failure to seek timely renewal of recognition as required in sub-clause (a) supra shall invariably result in stoppage of admissions to the concerned Undergraduate Course of MBBS at the said institute."

The Committee decided to place the matter before the General Body of the Council.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

15. Establishment of New Medical College at Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh (Government Institute of Medical Sciences, Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh) (Autonomous Body registered under Society Act and fully funded by Govt. of Uttar Pradesh) with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of New Medical College at Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh (Government Institute of Medical Sciences, Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh) (Autonomous Body registered under Society Act and fully funded by Govt. of Uttar Pradesh) with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that at its meeting dt. 22/12/2016, it was decided as under:

"The Executive Committee of the Council perused the letter dated 16/12/2016 from the appointed team of assessors stating therein as under:-

"We reached the institute for the inspection of Govt. Institute of Medical Sciences Greater Noida, Vill. Kasana, G.B. Nagar, Greater Noida on 16/12/2016 for the above said inspection and found that there were only few patients were present in the OPD. OT were nonfunctional and basic and para clinical departments are under construction. Lecture theaters were non functional. Equipment is not available in the departments. On enquiring from the Medical Superintendent the Faculty and other staff in the process of Requirement. Furniture is in the process of procurement for department and Hostels. Blood bank is not available. In the Library books and journals and other required equipment were not present. Even the regular director is not appointed by the government. The Chief Medical Superintendent of the Hospital in writing gave us undertaking for the request for deferring the inspection."

The Committee also perused the letter dated 16.12.2016 received from the Chief Medical Superintendent of the Institute.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh (Government Institute of Medical Sciences, Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh) (Autonomous Body registered under Society Act and fully funded by Govt. of Uttar Pradesh) recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the Regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year."

The Executive Committee further noted that subsequently, a hearing was granted to the Institute by the Central Govt. Pursuant to this hearing, a letter is sent by the Central Govt., operative part of which reads as under:

“Admittedly, the college is not yet ready. However, in view of the undertaking by ACS (ME), Govt. of Uttar Pradesh and that the State is under electoral process, Ministry may consider referring the matter to MCI for review.”

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon’ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-

“.....(A) Initial assessment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent of affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage....”

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon’ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in SLP.(C) No. 15043/2015-Padmashree Dr. D.Y. Patil Medical College Vs. Medical Council of India & Anr.:-

16. Establishment of new medical college at Paripally, Kollam, Kerala (Govt. Medical College, Paripally, Kollam) by Govt. of Kerala with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Paripally, Kollam, Kerala (Govt. Medical College, Paripally, Kollam) by Govt. of Kerala with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that at its meeting dt. 22/12/2016, it was decided as under:

“... ”

In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 pertaining to the person owning and managing a hospital of not less than 300 beds, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Paripally, Kollam, Kerala (Govt. Medical College, Paripally, Kollam) by Govt. of Kerala under Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.”

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dated 20.02.2017 received from the Central Govt., Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, New Delhi forwarding therewith the representation/compliance dated 09.02.2017 submitted by the Principal, Govt. Medical College, Kollam.

The Executive Committee noted that the Ministry under its Committee had given personal hearing to the authorized representatives of the medical colleges/applicants on 09.02.2017 and 10.02.2017 and forwarded observations/recommendations of the Committee constituted by the Ministry in the matter, which is as under:-

*“The hospital has been fully transferred by ESIC to the Govt. of Kerala on 22.10.2016. As per submission made by DME, Kerala, the shortage of faculty and residents is reduced to 1.7% and 4.4.% respectively. Other deficiencies are being rectified.
Recommended for review by MCI.”*

The Executive Committee further noted that the college authorities has also submitted an undertaking certificate dated 09.02.2017 of the Additional Chief Secretary, Health & Family Welfare Department, Govt. of Kerala, Secretariat, Thiruvananthapuram with regard to providing sufficient funds for this institution, under the Plan and Non-Plan heads to meet all the fixed and recurring expenditure.

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon^{ble} Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-

“.....(A) Initial assessment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent of affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. 17. Establishment of new medical college at Mandi (Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri Medical College, Mandi) by Govt. of Himachal Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Himachal Pradesh University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to Establishment of new medical college at Mandi (Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri Medical College, Mandi) by Govt. of Himachal Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Himachal Pradesh University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

The Executive Committee observed that at its meeting dt. 22/12/2016, it was decided as under:

“... ”

In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 pertaining to the person owning and managing a hospital of not less than 300 beds, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Mandi (Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri Medical College, Mandi) by Govt. of Himachal Pradesh under Himachal Pradesh University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.”

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dated 20.02.2017 received from the Central Govt., Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, New Delhi forwarding therewith the representation/compliance dated 09.02.2017 submitted by the Principal- cum-Dean Sri Lal Bahadur Shastri Govt. Medical College & Hospital, Mandi, H.P.

The Executive Committee noted that the Ministry under its Committee had given personal hearing to the authorized representatives of the medical colleges/applicants on 09.02.2017 and 10.02.2017 and forwarded observations/recommendations of the Committee constituted by the Ministry in the matter, which is as under:-

“The deficiency of faculty and residents is being rectified.

The Hospital has handed over by ESIC to the State Govt.

Recommend for review by MCI.”

The Committee further noted that the Central Govt. has requested the Council to review the schemes in light of the documents submitted by the colleges/applicants and the recommendations of the Committee and furnish its recommendations accordingly to the Ministry.

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon^{ble} Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-

18. Recognition/approval of Dhanalakshmi Srinivasan Medical College & Hospital, Perambalur, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Dhanalakshmi Srinivasan Medical College & Hospital, Perambalur, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that an assessments to assess the standard of examination held by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai and to assess the physical and the other teaching facilities available for recognition/approval of Dhanalakshmi Srinivasan Medical College & Hospital, Perambalur, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 were carried out by the Council assessors on 18th February, 2016 and 11th& 12th April 2016. The assessment report (18th February, 2016) and assessment report (11th& 12th April 2016) were considered by the Executive Committee of the Council at its meeting held on 13/05/2016 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment reports (18th February, 2016) and (11th and 12th April, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. *Deficiency of faculty is 57.78 % as detailed in the report.*
2. *Shortage of Residents is 74.12 % as detailed in the report.*
3. *During verification Faculty & Residents have produced photocopy of telephone bill which were found to be fake. Nobody produced original bill. They were not knowing their own number, confessed that Institute had given this to them today. Dean has not signed on these in most of the forms. These faculty and residents were not considered.*
4. *Resident hostel was visited by all assessors on 2nd day in the morning. No male residents except one (SR of Emergency Medicine) were staying in room. Only 19 ladies residents were found to be staying. However, this was also doubtful as no water cooler on any floor, no lift for a G+5 floors building, no mess (only small dining area).*
5. *Many faculty members and residents are commuting from villages/towns which are 35 km to 60 kms from institute. Their daily presence and work in institute is questionable.*
6. *OPD attendance as verified by assessors was 350 on day of assessment against requirement of 1,200. When assessors reached the institute, there were hardly 10-15 patients in the whole of OPD block. Afterwards, institute brought healthy people for inflating OPD statistics.*
7. *Bed occupancy was 46.6 % on day of assessment against 75 % required. There was unnecessarily prolonged admission in many cases.*
8. *There were only 6 Major & NIL Minor operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment. There was NIL operation in Orthopaedics, Ophthalmology.*
9. *There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.*
10. *Data of OPD attendance, Casualty attendance, Number of patients admitted, Laboratory investigations workload provided by institute are highly inflated.*
11. *Workload of Special investigations like Ba, IVP was NIL on day of assessment.*
12. *Workload of CT Scan was only 02 for the whole hospital on day of assessment.*
13. *Casualty: There is only 1 CMO available against 4 required. Disaster trolley is not available.*
14. *Central Clinical Laboratory is under control of Medical Superintendent & not under control of a department.*
15. *O.T.: Equipment like Defibrillators, Infusion Pumps are inadequate.*
16. *ICUs: There were only 2 patients in SICU. All healthy persons were kept in MICU & PICU. There was no admission after 06/04/2016, implying the patients were kept for prolonged period without need of ventilator.*
17. *Labour Room: One patient was kept in Eclampsia room without any indication.*
18. *Central Research Laboratory: Facilities & Equipment are inadequate.*
19. *Central Library: One of the Reading Room (Outside) is not air-conditioned. Capacity of Reading Room for Residents is only 16 against 50 required.*
20. *Common Rooms for Boys & Girls are empty without furniture. Toilet in Girls' Common Room needs repair.*
21. *Central Photography Section: There is no staff or equipment. 3 persons with video camera & still camera were present but they did not have photo ID of the institute. College did not provide videography or still photography during assessment.*

22. *Students' Hostels: Rooms are smaller than required. Triple seated rooms are 21-22 sq.m. against 27 sq.m. required @ 9 sq.m./student. Double seated rooms are 14.58 sq. m. against 18 sq.m. required.*
23. *Nurses' Hostel: Available accommodation is for 72 Nurses against 75 required.*
24. *Wards: Ancillary facilities are non-functional in many wards. Toilets are dirty & choked up.*
25. *Pathology Department: Service laboratories are not available.*
26. *Microbiology Department: Only 2 Service laboratories are available against requirement of 7.*
27. *RHTC: Posting register of students was not available. Mess is non-functional.*
28. *UHC: Posting register of students was not available. There is no proper registration for Specialty clinics.*
29. *Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.*

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Dhanalakshmi Srinivasan Medical College & Hospital, Perambalur, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree granted by Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

Further the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of fresh batch of 150 MBBS students at Dhanalakshmi Srinivasan Medical College & Hospital, Perambalur, Tamilnadu, under Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai, u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council also decided to refer the matter to the Ethics Committee for necessary action in the matter."

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Govt. vide this office letter dated 15.05.2016 and copy to the college authorities with the request to submit the compliance report.

The Central Government vide its letter dated 10.06.2016 had conveyed its decision to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities not to admit any students for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council further observed as under:

"The compliance verification assessment report(2nd August, 2016) alongwith previous assessment report(11th & 12th April, 2016) as well as representation/letter dated 03/08/2016 from the college authorities with regard to recognition/approval of Dhanalakshmi Srinivasan Medical College & Hospital, Perambalur, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 23.08.2016 and it was decided as under:

"The Executive Committee of the Council decided to defer the consideration of the matter to the next meeting."

In the meantime, the Central Govt., Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, New Delhi vide notification No.U.12012/33/2016-ME.I dated 12/09/2016 has notified the conditional recognition of this Institute for award of M.B;B.S. degree for 150 intake in light of directives of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee on MCI as communicated vide letter No. OC/Approvals for 2016-17/61 dated 29.08.2016.

The Executive Committee further noted that the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Dhanalakshmi Srinivasan Medical College & Hospital, Perambalur, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by

the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 alongwith notification issued by the Central Govt. in the light of the directive/approval of the Oversight Committee had also been placed before the General Body of the Council at its meeting held on 22.11.2016.

The Executive Committee further noted that in reference to conditional approval granted by the Central Govt. in the light of directive/approval of the Oversight Committee, an assessment for verifying the conditions stipulated in the Letter/Notification dated 08.09.2016 for recognition/approval of Dhanalakshmi Srinivasan Medical College & Hospital, Perambalur, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 was carried out by the Council Assessors on 17th March, 2017 and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to confirm the conditional Letter/Notification for recognition/approval of Dhanalakshmi Srinivasan Medical College & Hospital, Perambalur, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai

The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

8 (3) ...

(2) The recognition so granted to an Undergraduate Course for award of MBBS degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.

(3) The procedure for 'Renewal' of recognition shall be same as applicable for the award of recognition.

(4) Failure to seek timely renewal of recognition as required in sub-clause (a) supra shall invariably result in stoppage of admissions to the concerned Undergraduate Course of MBBS at the said institute.

The Committee decided to place the matter before the General Body of the Council.

The decision be conveyed to the Oversight Committee and Central Govt.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

19. Recognition/Approval of Major S.D. Singh Medical College and Hospital, Fatehgarh Farrukhabad, U.P. for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Chhatrapati Shahu Ji Maharaj University, Kanpur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/Approval of Major S.D. Singh Medical College and Hospital, Fatehgarh Farrukhabad, U.P. for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Chhatrapati Shahu Ji Maharaj University, Kanpur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the compliance verification assessment report(19th July, 2016) alongwith previous assessment report(6th & 7th April, 2016) with regard to recognition/approval of Major S.D. Singh Medical College and Hospital, Fatehgarh, Farrukhabad for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Chhatrapati Shahu Ji Maharaj University, Kanpur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 23/08/2016 and it was decided as under:-

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (19th July, 2016) along with previous assessment report (6th & 7th April, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. *Deficiency of faculty is 72.4 % as detailed in report.*
2. *Shortage of Residents is 88.05 % as detailed in the report.*
3. *Both Dean Dr. Suresh Prasad & Medical Superintendent Dr. C.S. Agarwal were not available on day of assessment.*
4. *OPD attendance on day of assessment was 318 against requirement of 800.*
5. *Hospital is practically non-functional since 11/07/2016.*
6. *Bed Occupancy was only 5 % on day of assessment. All the wards wore deserted look. There were no patients in many wards.*
7. *Occupancy in Intensive Care Units was NIL on day of assessment.*
8. *There was NIL Major & NIL Minor operation on day of assessment. Last operation was done on 11/07/2016.*
9. *There was NIL Normal Delivery & Nil Caesarean Section on day of assessment.*
10. *CT Scan was not functional on day of assessment.*
11. *Workload of Special Investigations like Ba, IVP was NIL on day of assessment.*
12. *Radiological investigation workload is grossly inadequate.*
13. *Laboratory investigation workload is NIL on day of assessment.*
14. *Histopathology & Cytopathology workload was NIL on day of assessment. No record was available regarding samples under process in Histopathology laboratory.*
15. *Available USG machines are 2 against requirement of 3.*
16. *OPD: Colposcope is not available.*
17. *Casualty: There was NIL patient in Casualty.*
18. *Central Library: It is not fully air-conditioned.*
19. *Canteen facilities are inadequate.*
20. *Anatomy department: Available specimens are only 56. Capacity of cold storage bodies is not adequate.*
21. *Pathology department: Available specimens are only 63.*
22. *Microbiology department: All service laboratories are non-functional.*
23. *RHTC: It is partially functional. There is no clinical, Survey, Immunization, family Welfare & National Health Programmes. No record is available.*
24. *There was no display of name of Dean outside his office.*
25. *Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.*

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Major S.D. Singh Medical College and Hospital, Fatehgarh Farrukhabad for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Chhatrapati Shahu Ji Maharaj University, Kanpur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter."

The Committee noted that before the decision could be conveyed, the Central Govt., Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, New Delhi vide notification No. U.12012/33/2016-MEI) dated 12/09/2016 has notified the conditional recognition of this Institute for award of M.B;B.S. degree for 100 intake in light of directives of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee on MCI as communicated vide letter No. OC/Approvals for 2016-17/61 dated 29.08.2016.

The Executive Committee further noted that the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Major S.D. Singh Medical College and Hospital, Fatehgarh Farrukhabad for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Chhatrapati Shahu Ji Maharaj University, Kanpur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 alongwith notification issued by the Central Govt. in the light of the directive/approval of the Oversight Committee had also been placed before the General Body of the Council at its meeting held on 22.11.2016.

The Executive Committee of the Council further noted that in reference to conditional approval granted by the Central Govt. in the light of directive/approval of the Oversight Committee, an assessment for verifying the conditions stipulated in the Letter/Notification dated 12.09.2016 for recognition/approval of Major S.D. Singh Medical College and Hospital, Fatehgarh Farrukhabad for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Chhatrapati Shahu Ji Maharaj University, Kanpur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 has been carried out by the Council

Assessors on 21st February, 2017. The Executive Committee considered the assessment report (21st February, 2017) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 72.4 % as detailed in the report.
2. Medical Superintendent has crossed age of 70 y; hence not eligible to hold the post.
3. Shortage of Residents is 88.05 % as detailed in the report.
4. Bed Occupancy at 10 a.m. on day of assessment is 20.85 %.
5. There was NIL Major & NIL Minor assessment on day of assessment. There was NIL Major Operation after 17/02/2017.
6. There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
7. Workload of plain X-rays for indoor patients is NIL on day of assessment.
8. Details of tests conducted in service laboratories of Microbiology were not provided.
9. There was NIL patient in Casualty on day of assessment.
10. CT Scan is not functional.
11. Wards of Tb & Chest, Psychiatry and Skin & VD are common for males/females. There were NIL patients in these wards on day of assessment. Deficiency remains as it is.
12. Central Library: It is not fully air-conditioned. Only 12 Internet Nodes are available. Deficiency remains as it is.
13. Students' Hostel: Computer in Study room is nonfunctional & does not have Internet.
14. Interns' Hostel: Computer in Study room is nonfunctional & does not have Internet. Recreation room is not available.
15. Residents' Hostel: Computer in Study room is nonfunctional & does not have Internet.
16. Canteen: Although infrastructure is available, presently canteen services are not available.
17. RHTC: Details not provided. Faculty from Community Medicine were not present at time of visit.
18. UHC: Details not provided. Faculty from Community Medicine were not present at time of visit.
19. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the college has failed to abide by the undertaking it had given to the Central Govt. that there are no deficiencies as per clause 3.2(i) of the directions passed by the Supreme Court mandated Oversight Committee vide communication dated 12/09/2016. The Executive Committee, after due deliberation and discussion decided that the college has failed to comply with the stipulation laid down by the Oversight Committee. Accordingly, the Executive Committee recommends that as per the directions passed by Oversight Committee in para 3.2(b) vide communication dated 12/09/2016 the college should be debarred from admitting students in the above course for a period of two academic years i.e. 2017-18 & 2018-19 as even after giving an undertaking that they have fulfilled the entire infrastructure for recognition/approval of Major S.D. Singh Medical College and Hospital, Fatehgarh Farrukhabad for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Chhatrapati Shahu Ji Maharaj University, Kanpur u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, the college was found to be grossly deficient. It has also been decided by the Executive Committee that the Bank Guarantee furnished by the college in pursuance of the directives passed by the Oversight Committee as well as GOI letter dated 12/09/2016 is liable to be encashed.

The Committee further decided to apply of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016 which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

The decision be conveyed to the Oversight Committee and Central Govt.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

20. Recognition/Approval of Srinivas Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Srinivasnagar, Mangalore, Karnataka for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Srinivas Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Srinivasnagar, Mangalore, Karnataka for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the compliance verification assessment report (20th April, 2016) alongwith previous assessment report(24th & 25th February, 2016) as well as the letter dated 25/04/2016 received from the college authorities with regard to recognition/approval of Srinivas Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Mangalore for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 13/05/2016 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (20th April, 2016) alongwith previous assessment report(24th & 25th February, 2016) as well as the letter dated 25/04/2016 received from the college authorities and noted the following:-

1. *Deficiency of faculty is 33.33 % as detailed in the report.*
2. *Shortage of Residents is 60 % as detailed in the report.*
3. *Many of the Senior / Junior Residents do not know each other and they do not know their duty hours.*
4. *Discrepancy in salary --*

- (a) There is wide variation in the salaries of professors e.g. which do not commensurate with the years of experience in the same post or in the same college. These suggest some of the professors are not attending the institution on regular basis.
- (b) There is discrepancy in the salary offered at the time of appointment and the present pay which is less. These suggest some of the professors are not attending the institution on regular basis.
- (c) Tutors are paid Rs. 15000/- only whereas JR with same qualification are paid for Rs.40,000/-. There are many tutors who are MBBS only and above the age of 50 years. This implies that these Tutors have been kept for head count at the time of assessment.
5. Bed occupancy is 31.23 % at 10 a.m. on day of assessment.
6. Wards: Most of the Demonstration Rooms are small & cramped. Examination cum treatment room is not available in Ophthalmology and Tb & Chest wards. Tb & Chest ward has no Pantry, Store room, Duty room. Female Tb & Chest ward does not have Demonstration room. Dermatology ward does not have Pantry & Duty room. Deficiency remains as it is.
7. Data of Clinical material, OPD attendance, Major & Minor operations, Radiological & laboratory investigations provided by college are grossly inflated.
8. Majority of the patients in all the wards were not genuine, having been admitted for minor complaints like Cough, Backache, Abdominal Pain, etc. & did not merit admission.
9. There were only 08 major operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment.
10. Data of Histopathology workload as provided by institute are inflated and mismatched.
11. There was mismatch in the date of admission of patients and the entries in the ward register. In a male Medical ward, 16 patients were shown as being admitted a few days back, but actually there were no such patients in the ward at all.
12. In Orthopaedics ward, there were only 2 patients with POP or Back slab.
13. Patients admitted with insignificant complaints, 2 pairs of siblings admitted with different residential address of siblings, fake patients, etc. -
- (a) In many wards admitted patients were having insignificant (non specific) problems that not required admission. They were not carrying any personal belongings with them. In paediatric ward there were at least two pair of patients were siblings of same parents were admitted with different residential address, originals case sheet submitted.
- (b) Dean has signed the attendance sheet of the faculty members of various disciplines who had marked the attendance before 11 am and also the verification of the faculties members that was carried out. At the time of submission of report, when he found faculty deficiency was 33.33% and residents deficiency 60% he stated, that due to mahavir jayanti and vacation of children of the faculty there is less attendance. He suggested that attendance of faculty who were on leave should be considered. It may be noted that institution had not declared any holiday on 19th and 20th April, 2016 and were running all facilities on the mentioned date.
- (c) In some ward, there were no entries in the ward register of patients shown as having been admitted 3-4 days prior suggesting patients were kept on day of assessment with intentional manipulation in the date of admission (same things happen in medical wards and other wards.)
14. In many wards, Nursing students were shown as Staff Nurses.
15. Casualty: There were 12 patients in casualty but only 2 of them were genuine.
16. Students' Hostels: Ancillary facilities are inadequate as detailed in the report.
17. Residents' Hostel: Most of the rooms were locked and in spite of repeated calling, nobody turned up for verification.
18. Separate block of Residential quarters for Non-teaching staff are not available in the campus. Only a few blocks are available on 5th & 6th floor of faculty block; there is no lift upto VI floor.
19. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Srinivas Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Mangalore for the award of MBBS degree granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to

submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

Further the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of fresh batch of 150 MBBS students at Srinivas Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Mangalore under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore, u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.”

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Govt. vide this office letter dated 15.05.2016 and copy to the college authorities with the request to submit the compliance report. The Central Government vide its letter dated 10.06.2016 had conveyed its decision to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities not to admit any students for the academic year 2016-2017.

In the meantime, the Central Govt., Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, New Delhi vide notification No. U.12012/574/2015-ME.I dated 04/11/2016 has notified the conditional recognition of this Institute for award of M.B;B.S. degree in respect of students of 2011-12 batch in the light of directives of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee on MCI as communicated vide letter No. OC/Recognition/2016-17/173 dated 27.10.2016.

The Executive Committee further noted that the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Srinivas Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Srinivasnagar, Mangalore, Karnataka for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 alongwith notification issued by the Central Govt. in the light of the directive/approval of the Oversight Committee had also been placed before the General Body of the Council at its meeting held on 22.11.2016.

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to defer the matter for the next meeting.

22. Recognition/Approval of Annapoorna Medical College & Hospital, Salem, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Annapoorna Medical College & Hospital, Salem, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the compliance verification assessment report(29th July, 2016) alongwith previous assessment report(30th & 31st March, 2016) and the representation dated 29/07/2016 from the Dean, Annapoorna Medical College & Hospital, Tamilnadu with regard to recognition/approval of Annapoorna Medical College & Hospital, Salem, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 23.08.2016 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report(29th July, 2016) along with previous assessment report(30th & 31st March, 2016) and the representation dated 29/07/2016 from the Dean, Annapoorna Medical College & Hospital, Tamilnadu and noted the following:-

1. Shortage of Residents is 5.88 % as detailed in the report.
2. Bed Occupancy on day of assessment was 43.7 %.
3. There was not a single patient in Ophthalmology on day of assessment & it was locked.
4. There were no proper counters for Registration. The facility is run on temporary basis on tables & chairs located at different points across a big hall.
5. Many patients admitted in Casualty did not merit admission.
6. There was NIL Normal Delivery & only 1 Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
7. There was NIL patient in NICU/PICU & only 1 in ICCU on day of assessment. Some of the patients did not merit admission in ICUs.
8. Data of operative work seems to be inflated as although 20 operations are claimed to have been performed on day of assessment, there was request for only 1 unit of blood.
9. None of the faculty & Residents could produce Form 16 for Assessment Year 2016-2017 even though last date of submission of Income Tax Returns (i.e. 31/07/2016) with just one day away.

10. Appointment orders issued to faculty & employees does not mention salary in them.
11. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Annapoorna Medical College & Hospital, Salem, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.”

Thereafter, the Central Govt., Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, New Delhi vide notification No. U.12012/54/2016-ME.I dated 15.09.2016 has notified the conditional recognition of this Institute for award of M.B;B.S. degree for 150 intake in light of directives of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee on MCI as communicated vide letter No. OC/Approvals for 2016-17/61 dated 06.09.2016.

The Executive Committee further noted that the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Annapoorna Medical College & Hospital, Salem, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 alongwith notification issued by the Central Govt. in the light of the directive/approval of the Oversight Committee had also been placed before the General Body of the Council at its meeting held on 22.11.2016.

The Executive Committee of the Council further noted that in reference to conditional approval granted by the Central Govt. in the light of directive/approval of the Oversight Committee, an assessment for verifying the conditions stipulated in the Letter/Notification dated 15.09.2016 for recognition/approval of Annapoorna Medical College & Hospital, Salem, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 has been carried out by the Council Assessors on 21st February, 2017. The Executive Committee considered the assessment report(21st February, 2017) and noted the following:-

1. Bed Occupancy was 60 % as most patients did not warrant admission.
2. OPD attendance at 2 p.m. on day of assessment was 1,055 against requirement of 1,200.
3. Data of clinical material & investigations given by Institute are highly inflated.
4. About 100 women with woven baskets entered OPD after assessors went to OPD at 2 p.m.
5. Notes on case papers did not match with patients. Case papers mentioned IV fluids for many days but the patients said they had come in the morning only and had no IV fluid.
6. There was NIL Normal Delivery & 1 Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
7. There were only 3 Operations on day of assessment.
8. Total CT Scan workload was only 02 on day of assessment.
9. During visit to laboratory, it was observed that there were only approximately 100 samples and there was no Histopathology sample.
10. Wards: Most wards did not have facilities for needle & syringe disposal.
11. In an Ophthalmology ward, male & female patients were mixed.
12. Casualty: There were only 2 sick patients.
13. ICUs: Some of the patients did not warrant admission. There was only 1 patient in NICU.
14. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the college has failed to abide by the undertaking it had given to the Central Govt. that there are no deficiencies as per clause 3.2(i) of the directions passed by the Supreme Court mandated Oversight Committee

vide communication dated 15/09/2016. The Executive Committee, after due deliberation and discussion decided that the college has failed to comply with the stipulation laid down by the Oversight Committee. Accordingly, the Executive Committee recommends that as per the directions passed by Oversight Committee in para 3.2(b) vide communication dated 15/09/2016 the college should be debarred from admitting students in the above course for a period of two academic years i.e. 2017-18 & 2018-19 as even after giving an undertaking that they have fulfilled the entire infrastructure for recognition/approval of Annapoorna Medical College & Hospital, Salem, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, the college was found to be grossly deficient. It has also been decided by the Executive Committee that the Bank Guarantee furnished by the college in pursuance of the directives passed by the Oversight Committee as well as GOI letter dated 15/09/2016 is liable to be encashed.

The Committee further decided to apply of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016 which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956, alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate coursesand further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

The decision be conveyed to the Oversight Committee and Central Govt.

The minutes of this item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

23. Recognition/approval of Sapthagiri Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bangalore for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Sapthagiri Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bangalore for the award of MBBS

degree(150 seats) granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the compliance verification assessment report (01st April, 2016) alongwith previous assessment report (17^h& 18th February, 2016) with regard to Recognition/Approval of Sapthagiri Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bangalore for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 13.05.2016 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (01st April, 2016) alongwith previous assessment report (17^h& 18th February, 2016) and noted the following:-

1. Shortage of residents is 100 % as detailed in the report.
2. With regard to Residents, no bank account details or hostel possession letter were provided. On verification of hostel rooms, most of the Residents' belongings were not found in the rooms.
3. Bed occupancy on day of assessment is 62 % as observed on factual verification.
4. OPD attendance provided by institute is only computer generated data which do not match with different OPD registers. E.g. In Dentistry, 41 OPD was shown but register showed only 20. In Casualty, Central Registry showed 22 patients at 10 a.m. but on verification, it was found to be only 11.
5. Central Clinical laboratory: There is no central collection center and no central report distribution system.
6. Central Registry was unable to give Unitwise admission & discharge data.
7. There was NIL Normal Delivery & 1 Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
8. There were only 6 Major operations on day of assessment.
9. Students' Hostels: Boys' hostel computer room is not air-conditioned.
10. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Sapthagiri Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bangalore for the award of MBBS degree granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month for further consideration of the matter.

Further the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of fresh batch of 150 MBBS students at Sapthagiri Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bangalore under Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore, u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.”

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Govt. vide this office letter dated 15.05.2016 and copy to the College authorities with the request to submit the compliance report.

The Central Government vide its letter dated 10.06.2016 had conveyed its decision to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities not to admit any students for the academic year 2016-2017.

Thereafter, the Central Govt., Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, New Delhi vide notification No. U.12012/33/2016-ME.I dated 08/09/2016 has notified the conditional recognition of this Institute for award of M.B;B.S. degree for 150 intake in light of directives of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee on MCI as communicated vide letter No. OC/Approvals for 2016-17/61 dated 29.08.2016.

The Executive Committee further noted that the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Sapthagiri Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bangalore for the award of MBBS degree granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 alongwith notification issued by the Central Govt. in the light of the

directive/approval of the Oversight Committee had also been placed before the General Body of the Council at its meeting held on 22.11.2016.

The Executive Committee further noted that in reference to conditional approval granted by the Central Govt. in the light of directive/approval of the Oversight Committee, an assessment for verifying the conditions stipulated in the Letter/Notification dated 08.09.2016 for recognition/approval of Sapthagiri Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bangalore for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 was carried out by the Council Assessors on 10th February, 2017 and decided to recommend to the Central Govt. to confirm the conditional Letter/Notification for recognition/approval of Sapthagiri Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Bangalore for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Bangalore.

The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

8 (3) ...

(2) The recognition so granted to an Undergraduate Course for award of MBBS degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.

(3) The procedure for 'Renewal' of recognition shall be same as applicable for the award of recognition.

(4) Failure to seek timely renewal of recognition as required in sub-clause (a) supra shall invariably result in stoppage of admissions to the concerned Undergraduate Course of MBBS at the said institute.

The Committee decided to place the matter before the General Body of the Council.

The decision be conveyed to the Oversight Committee and Central Govt.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

24. Renewal of permission for MBBS course for 5th batch (100 seats) of Hi-Tech Medical College & Hospital, Rourkela, Orissa under Sambalpur University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017 – Compliance Verification Assessment with reference to conditional approval accorded by Oversight Committee.

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 5th batch (100 seats) of Hi-Tech Medical College & Hospital, Rourkela, Orissa under Sambalpur University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017 – Compliance Verification Assessment with reference to conditional approval accorded by Oversight Committee.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the compliance verification assessment report (5th February 2016) alongwith previous assessment report (05th& 06th October,, 2015) with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 5th batch (100 seats) of Hi-Tech Medical College & Hospital, Rourkela, Orissa under Sambalpur University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017 was considered by the Executive Committee of the Council at its meeting held on 13.05.2016 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (5th February 2016) along with previous assessment report (05th & 06th October,, 2015) and noted the following:-

1. *Deficiency of teaching faculty is 13.33 % as detailed in the report.*
2. *Shortage of Residents is 17.91 % as detailed in the report.*
3. *O.T.s: Only 6 O.T.s are in working condition against requirement of 7.*
4. *ICUs: In ICCU, only 4 beds are available against requirement of 5. There was NIL patient in SICU on day of assessment. Only 3 beds are available in NICU & NIL beds are available in PICU against requirement of 5 beds each.*
5. *Only 3 static X-ray machines are available against requirement of 4.*
6. *Only 1 USG is available against requirement of 3.*
7. *Capacity of available Examination Hall is only 100 against requirement of 250.*
8. *Lecture Theaters: Only 3 Lecture Theaters are available against requirement of 4. Hospital Lecture Theater is not completed and is non-functional. E class facility is not available.*
9. *Central Library: Only Internet room is air-conditioned. Reading areas are still not air-conditioned. Staff Reading room is not available. Deficiency remains as it is.*
10. *Common Rooms for Boys & Girls are not separate. Deficiency remains as it is.*
11. *Central Photography Section: Staff & Equipment are not available.*
12. *Students’ Hostels: Ancillary facilities like furniture, tables, chairs are inadequate in many rooms.*
13. *Nurses’ Hostel: 6 Nurses are accommodated in a room which is impermissible. Atmosphere is clumsy.*
14. *Residential Quarters: 18 quarters for Non-teaching staff are available against requirement of 36.*
15. *No register of Speech Therapy is available.*
16. *Central Kitchen: It is only a small room of 200 sq.ft. area which is grossly inadequate. Deficiency remains as it is.*
17. *MRD is partly computerized.*
18. *Central Research Laboratory: Equipment are inadequate. Some old equipment, not in working order are placed under lock & key.*
19. *Anatomy department: Number of specimens are still inadequate at 74. A small room was designated as locker room but no locker was found on day of assessment. Half size Dissection tables are not available. Deficiency remains as it is.*
20. *Pathology Department: Only 59 mounted specimens are available which is inadequate. NIL catalogue is available. Deficiency remains as it is.*
21. *Microbiology Department: Service Laboratories are not available. Deficiency remains as it is.*
22. *Pharmacology Department: In Museum, NIL models are available. Catalogues are not available. Deficiency remains as it is.*
23. *RHTC: It functions only from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in rented premises which are also being used by private X-ray clinic & medicine shop. Students do not attend regularly. There is no documentation of attendance of Specialists’ visits. Cold chain equipment is not available. Deficiency remains as it is.*
24. *UHC: It is a polyclinic with advertisement of an Orthopaedic Surgeon. No facilities for Antenatal checkup are available. There is no documentation of attendance of Specialists’ visits.*
25. *Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.*

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of 100 MBBS students at Hi-Tech Medical College & Hospital, Rourkela, Orissa under Sambalpur University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.”

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Govt. vide this office letter dated 14/05/2016. The Central Government vide its letter dated 10.06.2016 had conveyed its decision to the college

authorities as well as other concerned authorities not to admit any students for the academic year 2016-2017.

Thereafter, the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 20.08.2016 had granted approval to the said college for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch (100 seats) u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017, in light of the directive of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee (OC) subject to submission of bank guarantees, affidavit and some other conditions.

In continuation to the letter dated 20.08.2016, the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 09.09.2016 had forwarded the following documents as submitted by the college to the Ministry on 01.09.2016:-

- i. An affidavit dated 29.08.2016 from the Chairman of the Trust concerned.
- ii. An affidavit dated 27.08.2016 from the Dean/Principal of the college concerned.
- iii. A bank guarantee bearing No. 00004IG160000007 dated 29.08.2016 Rs. 2 Cr issued by Indian Bank in favour of MCI, with a validity of 1 year.

The Executive Committee of the Council further noted that in reference to conditional approval granted by the Central Government in light of directives/approval of the Oversight Committee, an assessment to verify the compliance submitted by the college authorities on the deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report (5th February, 2016) for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of 100 MBBS students at Hi-Tech Medical College & Hospital, Rourkela under Sambalpur University, Sambalpur for the academic session 2016-17 with reference to the conditional approval accorded by Oversight Committee has been carried out by the Council Assessors on 6th March, 2017 and noted the following:

1. Deficiency of faculty is 67.92 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 85.07 % as detailed in the report.
3. Attendance registers were not available in the office of the Principal at 10 a.m.
4. OPD attendance at 2 p.m. was 676 against requirement of 800.
5. Bed Occupancy was 12 % at 10 a.m. on day of assessment.
6. There were only 2 Major Operations on day of assessment.
7. There was only 1 Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on the day of assessment.
8. CT Scan workload for the whole hospital was only 05 on day of assessment.
9. Data of investigations appear to be inflated.
10. New Principal's name is not updated on website.
11. O.T.s: Except 1 Gynaec O.T., all other O.T.s were empty at 11 a.m. at time of visit.
12. ICUs: There were Nil patient in SICU, PICU & NICU and only 2 in ICCU on day of assessment. PICU has 2 beds against requirement of 5 & NICU has 4 beds against requirement of 5. Both PICU & NICU are in 1 common room.
13. Only 1 USG machine is available against requirement of 3.
14. Examination Hall: It is congested; even so, capacity is 210 against requirement of 250.
15. Lecture Theaters: E class facility is not available.
16. Central Library: Only Internet room is air-conditioned. Staff room, Reading rooms are small with no furniture & facility at time of visit.
17. Nurses' Hostel: There are 8 rooms with each room accommodating 6 which is not permissible. There are no Toilet facilities.

18. Residential quarters for non-teaching staff available are 28 against 36 required.
19. Speech Therapy: No machines & no seating arrangements for Doctors & patients were available at time of visit. Last Speech Therapy was done on 12/02/2017 as per records.
20. MRD: It is partially computerized.
21. Central Research Laboratory: Equipment are inadequate. Some old equipment were non-functional.
22. Anatomy department: Museum does not have sitting arrangements. Students' Lockers are only 51 against requirement of 100.
23. Microbiology department: 7 service laboratories are not available.
24. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the college has failed to abide by the undertaking it had given to the Central Govt. that there are no deficiencies as per clause 3.2(i) of the directions passed by the Supreme Court mandated Oversight Committee vide communication dated 12/08/2016. The Executive Committee, after due deliberation and discussion, have decided that the college has failed to comply with the stipulation laid down by the Oversight Committee. Accordingly, the Executive Committee recommends that as per the directions passed by Oversight Committee in para 3.2(b) vide communication dated 12/08/2016 the college should be debarred from admitting students in the above course for a period of two academic years i.e. 2017-18 & 2018-19 as even after giving an undertaking that they have fulfilled the entire infrastructure for renewal of permission for MBBS course for 5th batch (100 seats) of Hi-Tech Medical College & Hospital, Rourkela, Orissa under Sambalpur University u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17, the college was found to be grossly deficient. It has also been decided by the Executive Committee that the Bank Guarantee furnished by the college in pursuance of the directives passed by the Oversight Committee as well as GOI letter dated 20/08/2016 is liable to be encashed.

The decision be conveyed to the Oversight Committee and Central Govt.

The minutes of this item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Melmaruvathur Adhiprasakthi Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Melmaruvathur for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by the Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to defer the matter for the next meeting.

26. **Recognition/approval of Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot u/s 11(2) of the I.M.C. Act, 1956.**

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot u/s 11(2) of the I.M.C. Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the matter was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 13/05/2016 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council observed that on receipt of the college authorities request u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, the assessments to assess the standard of examination held by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot and to assess the physical and the other teaching facilities available for Recognition/Approval of Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot u/s 11(2) of the I.M.C. Act, 1956 were carried out by the Council assessors on 16th December, 2015 , 25th& 26th February, 2016 and 16th March 2016. The assessment report (16th December, 2015) and assessment reports (25th& 26th February, 2016 & 16th March, 2016) were considered by the Executive Committee of the Council at its meeting held on 22/03/2016 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment reports (16th December, 2015 , 25th& 26th February, 2016 and 16th March, 2016) alongwith various complaints received from Sh. Ramesh Kumar through e-mail and noted the following :-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 100 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 100 % as detailed in the report.
3. Dr. N.S. Sharma, Principal & Dr. D.L. Jangral, Medical Superintendent were absent at time of assessment.
4. Till 11 a.m. no faculty & Residents appeared for assessment.
5. OPD attendance was NIL on day of assessment.
6. Bed Occupancy was NIL on day of assessment.
7. There was NIL admission & NIL discharge on day of assessment.
8. Casualty attendance was only 01 on day of assessment.
9. OPD: Only 2 staff were present at Registration Counters at 10 a.m. on day of assessment. Most of OPD rooms were closed during assessment. There is no Immunization after 26/02/2016.
10. There is no Speech Therapist. Speech Therapy room was locked.
11. No Doctors were present in OPD except 1 faculty from ENT.
12. Wards: Most of the wards were kept locked during assessment. Orthopaedics & O.G. wards are on top floor of hospital building with asbestos roof and without any light, fan.
13. There was NIL Major & NIL Minor operation on day of assessment.
14. There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
15. Radiological & laboratory investigations workload was NIL on day of assessment.
16. Casualty: Pulse Oxymeter, Crash Cart, Defibrillator are not available. At 12: 45 p.m., all the beds in casualty were occupied by non-genuine & healthy patients without any case papers and entry in Casualty register & treatment book.
17. O.T.s: Most of O.T.s are not equipped. Some O.T.s were locked and appear to be non-functional. No register was available. NIL patient was available on Preoperative & Postoperative beds.
18. ICUs: PICU is not available. There was NIL patient in ICCU or MICU, SICU, NICU.
19. Labour Room: No Birth register was available. Only 2 Nursing staff with civil dress were present.
20. AERB approval letter & PNDT Certificates were not provided.
21. Blood Bank: It is non-functional. No record was available.
22. CSSD: No record is available.
23. MEU: Details of work carried out by MEU are not provided.
24. CME: Details of CME programmes conducted by institute are not provided.
25. College Council: Details of meetings of College Council & their minutes are not provided.
26. Pharmaco Vigilance Committee: Details of meetings of Pharmaco Vigilance Committee & their minutes are not provided.

27. Examination Halls: They are light, temporary structures. There are no lights & fans. Tables & Chairs are stacked in one hall.
28. Lecture Theater: Capacity of 4th Lecture Theater is less than required. E class facility is not available. E class facility is available in only 2 Lecture Theaters.
29. Central Library: It is not air-conditioned. Capacity of Students' Reading room (Outside) & Students' Reading Room (Inside) is 50 & 140 respectively against requirement of 150 each. Residents' Reading room is not available. 32 Internet Nodes are available against requirement of 40.
30. Students' Hostels: Available accommodation is total 127 rooms of which a few are triple seated. Hence it is inadequate against requirement of 565. A few rooms are not furnished. Visitors' room, A.C. Study room with Computer & Internet & Recreation Room are not available.
31. Interns' Hostel: Available accommodation is 50 against requirement of 150. Rooms are not fully furnished. Visitors' room, A.C. Study room with Computer & Internet & Recreation Room are not available.
32. Residents' Hostel: Total 40 rooms are available against requirement of 85. Rooms are partially furnished. Visitors' room, A.C. Study room with Computer & Internet & Recreation Room are not available.
33. Nurses' Hostel: It is outside the campus.
34. Residential Quarters: Only 5 quarters are available for teaching faculty against requirement of 26. NIL quarters are available for Non-teaching staff in the campus.
35. Gender Harassment Committee is not constituted.
36. Central Kitchen was closed at time of taking round during assessment.
37. Nursing Staff: Very few Nurses were seen in wards & OPD.
38. Technicians are very poor in number in all the departments.
39. Anatomy Department: NIL Cadavers are available.
40. Physiology Department: Preparation rooms are not available.
41. Pathology Department: Museum facilities are inadequate.
42. Pharmacology Department: Audio Visual aids are not available.
43. Community Medicine Department: Practical laboratory is not equipped.
44. RHTC & UHC: No data were provided.
45. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend not to recognize/approve Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot u/s 11(2) of the I.M.C. Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 2(two) weeks for further consideration of the matter."

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Govt. vide this office letter dated 22/03/2016 and copy to the college authorities with the request to submit the compliance report.

In response to above, the Council Office had received a letter dated 05/04/2016 from the Authorized Signatory, Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot, Punjab stating therein as under:-

"That Chintpurni Medical college and Hospital after receiving the letter of permission No-MCI-34(41)/2011-Med/20706 dated 30.06.2011 admitted 150 students as its first batch in the session 2011-12 for the MBBS course. The students of the above said first batch have completed their MBBS course and are now undergoing their internship period since 1st January, 2016. The college as well as the students were awaiting the grant of recognition for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) to the Chintpurni Medical college & Hospital under section 11(2) of the Indian Medical council Act,1956.

However to our utter shock, the Executive Committee of the Medical council of India has recommended not to recognize / approve Chintpurni Medical college & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of health Sciences, Faridkot under section 11(2) of the Indian Medical Council Act,1956 and has asked for submission of compliance by showing unwanted deficiencies.

This is to bring to your kind notice that the Medical Council of India conducted 3 surprise inspections in the college to assess the standard of examination held by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot and to assess the physical and other teaching facilities available for Recognition / approval of Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot under Section 11 (2) of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 on 16.12.2015, 25 and 26.02.2016 and 16.03.2016. However, in the MCI letter No-**MCI-34(41)(Gen)(UG)/2015-Med/151905-152480 Dated – 30.11.2015** It was clearly mentioned by the MCI that the recognition was to be awarded to the college after inspection in 2 independent parts, i.e. the part (1) to evaluate the process of conduct of examination by the examining university. This first part inspection was carried out on 16.12.2015 by 2 MCI inspectors namely (1) Dr. R.N. Mandal (Co-ordinator), Director Professor Deptt. of Pediatrics, Maulana Azad Medical College New Delhi (2) Dr. Jibeswar Thakuria. Prof. Head Medicine, Fakhruddin Ali Ahmed Medical College Barpeta, Assam during the Practical exams of MBBS final year Part-II.

Part-II was related to the compliance to minimum standard requirements as prescribed by the Council for the award of recognition. The 2nd inspection was therefore conducted by a new set of three MCI inspectors namely (1) Dr. Brij Kumar Das (Co-ordinator) Deptt. Of ENT, Otorhinolaryngology Fakhruddin Ali Medical college Barpeta, Assam (2) Dr. Debasis Bhattacharya (Assessor) Principal & Professor, Deptt. Of Obstetrics & Gynecology, Nilratan Sircar Medical College, Kolkata, West Bengal(3) Dr. Surajit Kumar Mukhopadhyay(Assessors), Professor, Deptt. of Physiology, Medical College, Kolkata, West Bengal on 25th and 26th Feb 2016.

These were surprising in nature. The dates were kept secret by the MCI and never conveyed to the college. It is pertinent to point out herein that the assessment reports dated 16.12.2015, 25 and 26.02.2016 of the Council assessors had not pointed out any deficiency in the college and clearly found the college as eligible with faculty, infrastructure and other necessary requirements to be recognized for the award of MBBS degree under Section 11(2) of the Indian Medical Council Act 1956 But these reports never placed before the executive committee of MCI till 15.03.2016 due to reason best known to them. However for the third time the Council Assessors came on Inspected the College for the few Minutes and submitted the assessors report written and prepared by them in the MCI office in there on ways and methods to the executive committee of the MEDICAL Council of India with the deficiencies pointed out in your letter.

Perusal of the deficiencies show that the deficiencies pointed out are Illusory as is states 100% deficiencies in Faculty and Residents which is inconceivable in a Medical College with an attached hospital. The college is taking appropriate legal action against the Medical Council of India regarding the same as the College has complete infrastructure, well equipped and fully functional and the same has been repeatedly confirmed by the MCI inspectors in their various reports. Hence in the Circumstances, I request your good self to rely on the earlier 2 inspection reports dated 16.12.2015 and 25 and 25.02.2016 and grant recognition / approval of Chintpurni Medical College and Hospital, Pathankot for the award and MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot under Section 11(2) of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956. "

In reply, the Council vide its letter dated 13/04/2016 requested the college authorities to submit the detailed point-wise compliance as sought by the Council vide letter dated 22/03/2016 alongwith the demand draft of Rs. 3.00 lakhs (softcopy-in editable word format with C.D. also) with the documentary evidence to the Council office **within one week** from the date of dispatch of the letter for further necessary action in the matter.

In response to above, the Dean Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot, Punjab vide his letter dated 16/04/2016 has submitted the same representation which has been submitted by the them vide letter dated 5/04/2016 as quoted above with the request to give a chance to explain whole gambit in person. It was observed that there is no detailed pointwise compliance incorporated in this letter.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to reiterate the earlier decision dt. 22/03/2016 to recommend not to recognize/approve Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot u/s 11(2) of the I.M.C. Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 2(two) weeks for further consideration of the matter.

Further the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of fresh batch of 150 MBBS students at Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot under Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkot, u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017."

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Govt. vide this office letter dated 15.05.2016 and copy to the college authorities with the request to submit the detailed point wise compliance (softcopy-in editable word format with C.D.) with the documentary evidence in respect of the rectification of deficiencies pointed in the assessment report to the Council within 2 (two) weeks positively.

The Central Government vide its letter dated 10.06.2016 had conveyed its decision to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities not to admit any students for the academic year 2016-2017.

Thereafter, the Central Govt., Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, New Delhi vide notification No. U.12012/33/2016-ME.I dated 26/09/2016 has notified the conditional recognition of this Institute for award of M.B;B.S. degree for 150 intake in light of directives of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee on MCI as communicated vide letter No. OC/Approvals for 2016-17/61 dated 29.08.2016.

The Executive Committee further noted that the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkotu/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 alongwith notification issued by the Central Govt. in the light of the directive/approval of the Oversight Committee had also been placed before the General Body of the Council at its meeting held on 22.11.2016.

The Executive Committee of the Council further noted that in reference to conditional approval granted by the Central Govt. in the light of directive/approval of the Oversight Committee, an assessment for verifying the conditions stipulated in the Letter/Notification dated 26.09.2016 for recognition/approval of Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkotu/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 has been carried out by the Council Assessors on 07th March, 2017. The Executive Committee considered the assessment report (07th March, 2017) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 87.12% as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 82.35% as detailed in the report.
3. OPD attendance was 401 at 2 p.m. on day of assessment against requirement of 1,200. Very few patients were seen in OPD at the time of visit.
4. Bed Occupancy was NIL on day of assessment. There was NIL admitted patient seen during the round.
5. There was only 1 Major & NIL Minor Operation on day of assessment.
6. There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
7. CT Scan workload is NIL on day of assessment.

8. Histopathology workload is NIL on day of assessment.
9. ICUs: Except 1 patient in SICU, there was NIL patient in ICCU, MICU, PICU, NICU.
10. Labor Room : There was no woman in Labour Room. It appears that data in the Register is falsified.
11. Data of Number of Admissions & Discharge, Radiological & Laboratory investigations as provided by institute are grossly inflated.
12. Casualty : There was NIL patient at time of round.
13. Speech Therapist is not available. Only space is provided for Speech Therapy.
14. Nursing Staff : Very few Nurses were seen in the hospital during the round.
15. Paramedical Staff : Very few paramedical staff were seen during the round.
16. Orthopaedics ward was locked during the round.
17. O.T.s : Some O.Ts were locked during the round. Some are not properly equipped.
18. Examination Halls : These are temporary structures without light & fan. Deficiency remains as it is.
19. Central Library : It is not air-conditioned. Capacity of Students' reading Room (Outside) is only 32 against requirement of 150. Available Internet Nodes are 32 against requirement of 40. Deficiency remains as it is.
20. Students' Hostels : Available accommodation is for 453 students against requirement of 565. Ancillary facilities are inadequate as detailed in the report.
21. Interns' Hostel : Available accommodation is for 42 Interns against requirement of 150.
22. Residents' Hostel : Total 40 rooms are available against requirement of 85. They are partially furnished. Deficiency remains as it is.
23. Residential Quarters : Only 5 quarters are available for faculty against requirement of 26. NIL quarters are available for Non-teaching staff.
24. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the college has failed to abide by the undertaking it had given to the Central Govt. that there are no deficiencies as per clause 3.2(i) of the directions passed by the Supreme Court mandated Oversight Committee vide communication dated 25/09/2016. The Executive Committee, after due deliberation and discussion decided that the college has failed to comply with the stipulation laid down by the Oversight Committee. Accordingly, the Executive Committee recommends that as per the directions passed by Oversight Committee in para 3.2(b) vide communication dated 25/09/2016 the college should be debarred from admitting students in the above course for a period of two academic years i.e. 2017-18 & 2018-19 as even after giving an undertaking that they have fulfilled the entire infrastructure for recognition/approval of Chintpurni Medical College & Hospital, Pathankot for the award of MBBS degree(150 seats) granted by Baba Farid University of Health Sciences, Faridkotu/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, the college was found to be grossly deficient. It has also been decided by the Executive Committee that the Bank Guarantee furnished by the college in pursuance of the directives passed by the Oversight Committee as well as GOI letter dated 26/09/2016 is liable to be encashed.

The Committee decided to apply of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016 which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

- (c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 01 month.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

The decision be conveyed to the Oversight Committee and Central Govt.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

27. Establishment of new medical college at Durgapur, Dist. Burdwan, West Bengal (Shri Ramkrishna Institute of Medical Sciences & Sanaka Hospitals, Durgapur) by Sanaka Educational Trust, Durgapur with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under The West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Durgapur, Dist. Burdwan, West Bengal (Shri Ramkrishna Institute of Medical Sciences & Sanaka Hospitals, Durgapur) by Sanaka Educational Trust, Durgapur with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under The West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that at its meeting dt. 13.01.2017, it was decided as under:

“...In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Durgapur, Dist. Burdwan, West Bengal (Shri Ramkrishna Institute of Medical Sciences & Sanaka Hospitals, Durgapur) by Sanaka Educational Trust, Durgapur under the West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year 2017-18 and further decided to apply clauses 8(3)(1)(a) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010”.

The Executive Committee further observed that the Ministry of Health & F.W., Govt. of India has forwarded the observations/recommendations of the Committee constituted by the Ministry in the matter, which is as under:-

“In view of the compliance submitted by the college, “recommended for review by MCI.”

The Executive Committee noted that the said compliance submitted by Shri Ramkrishna Institute of Medical Sciences and Sanaka Hospital, Durgapur was considered by the Sub-Committee at its meeting held on 07.03.2017. The recommendations/observation of the Sub-Committee is as under:-

“Not eligible for compliance u/s 8(3)(1)(a).”

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon’ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-

“.....(A) Initial assessment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent of affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage....”

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon’ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in SLP.(C) No. 15043/2015-Padmashree Dr. D.Y. Patil Medical College Vs. Medical Council of India & Anr.:-

16. *In W.P. (C) No.705/2014 – Royal Medical Trust (Regd.) and Anr. V. Union of India & Anr. decided on 20.8.2015, this Court has observed that the Schedule must take care of following aspects:*

“(A) Initial assesment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent for affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage.

(B) Inspection should then be conducted by the Inspectors of the MCI. By very nature such inspection must have an element of surprise. Therefore, sufficient time of about three to four months ought to be given to the MCI to cause inspection at any time and such inspection should normally be undertaken latest by January. Surprise inspection would ensure that the required facilities and infrastructure are always in place and not borrowed or put in temporarily.

(C) Intimation of the result or outcome of the inspection would then be communicated. If the infrastructure and facilities are in order, the concerned MedicalCollege should be given requisite permission/renewal. However if there are any deficiencies or shortcomings, the MCI must, after pointing out the deficiencies, grant to the college concerned sufficient time to report compliance.

(D) If compliance is reported and the applicant states that the deficiencies stand removed, the MCI must cause compliance verification. It is possible that such compliance could be accepted even without actual physical verification but that assessment be left entirely to the discretion of the MCI and the Central Government. In cases where actual physical verification is required, the MCI and the Central Government must cause such verification before the deadline.

(E) The result of such verification if positive in favour of the MedicalCollege concerned, the applicant ought to be given requisite permission/renewal. But if the deficiencies still persist or had not been removed, the applicant will stand disentitled so fare as that academic year is concerned.”

It is apparent from the aforesaid decision and the regulations that the application at the first instance is required to be complete and incomplete applications are liable to be rejected. Thereafter, there has to be an inspection and other stages of decision-making process.”

After due deliberations, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to reiterate the earlier decision to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Durgapur, Dist. Burdwan, West Bengal (Shri Ramkrishna Institute of Medical Sciences & Sanaka Hospitals, Durgapur) by Sanaka Educational Trust, Durgapur under the West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year 2017-18 and further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(a) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010.

28. Establishment of new medical college at Bhilwara, Rajasthan (Government Medical College, Bhilwara) by Govt. of Rajasthan with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Bhilwara, Rajasthan (Government Medical College, Bhilwara) by Govt. of Rajasthan with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that at its meeting dt. 13.01.2017, it was decided as under:

“In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria u/s 3(2)(5) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 pertaining to the person owning and managing a hospital of not less than 300 beds, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Bhilwara, Rajasthan (Government Medical College, Bhilwara) by Govt. of Rajasthan under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.”

The Executive Committee of the Council further observed that the Ministry of Health & F.W., Govt. of India has forwarded the observations/recommendations of the Committee constituted by the Ministry in the matter, which is as under:-

“Recommend for review by MCI.”

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon^{ble} Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-

“.....(A) Initial assessment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent of affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage....”

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon'ble Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in SLP.(C) No. 15043/2015- Padmashree Dr. D.Y. Patil Medical College Vs. Medical Council of India & Anr..:-

16. In W.P. (C) No.705/2014 – Royal Medical Trust (Regd.) and Anr. V. Union of India & Anr. decided on 20.8.2015, this Court has observed that the Schedule must take care of following aspects:

“(A) Initial assesment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent for affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage.

(E) The result of such verification if positive in favour of the MedicalCollege concerned, the applicant ought to be given requisite permission/renewal. But if the deficiencies still persist or had not been removed, the applicant will stand disentitled so far as that academic year is concerned.”

It is apparent from the aforesaid decision and the regulations that the application at the first instance is required to be complete and incomplete applications are liable to be rejected. Thereafter, there has to be an inspection and other stages of decision-making process.”

After due deliberations, as the Qualifying Criteria were not fulfilled at the time of making the application, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to reiterate the earlier decision to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Bhilwara, Rajasthan (Government Medical College, Bhilwara) by Govt. of Rajasthan under Rajasthan University of Health Sciences, Jaipur to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

After due deliberations, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to approve the recommendation of the Sub-Committee and decided to reiterate the earlier decision of recommending to the Central Government not to issue Letter of Permission for establishment of a new medical college at Mangalwara, Bhopal (Mahaveer Institute of Medical Sciences & Research, Bhopal) by Jan Sarvodaya Vidhya Gyanpith Samiti, Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh under Madhya Pradesh Medical Science University, Jabalpur (M.P.) u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 and further decided to apply clauses 8(3)(1)(a) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010.

34. Establishment of new medical college at Badaun (Govt. Medical College, Badaun), Uttar Pradesh by Govt. of Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, Bareilly, U.P u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Badaun (Govt. Medical College, Badaun), Uttar Pradesh by Govt. of Uttar Pradesh with an annual intake of 100 MBBS students under Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, Bareilly, U.P u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that at its meeting dt. 13.01.2017, it was decided as under:

“...The Executive Committee further noted the clause 2(2) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 amended vide Notification dated 04.06.2012 which reads as under:-

...”2. IN the “Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999”, as amended vide notification dated 14.10.2011, in clause 2)2 (under the heading “QUALIFYING CRITERIA” the following shall be added after the third paragraph:-
“Provided further for a period of five years in the states of Bihar, Chattisgarh, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Orissa, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal, establishment of medical college shall be allowed on two pieces of land comprising minimum of 20(twenty) acres of land. However, one plot of land shall not be less than 10 (ten) acres and the second plot of land shall also be not less than 5(five) acres. The distance between two pieces of land shall not be more than 10 (ten) kilometers with well connected road and free transportation facility for students and staff. The hospital should be on one piece of land and the building of the college including library and hostels for the students, intern Pgs/Residents, nurses may be housed on any of the two pieces of land. The said hospital should be functional for atleast 3 years. The above relaxation shall not be available to a person seeking permission to establish a medical college in a District in above states where two or more medical colleges are already in existence”.

As per the certificate provided by the Dean of the Institute dated 19.12.2016 College affiliated hospital is under construction which would become functional by 31.03.2017; meanwhile District Hospital & District Female hospital are attached to the college which have only 221 beds.

In view of above, the Executive Committee observed that the District Hospital & District Female hospital are two separate hospitals and on two different pieces of land and therefore this college as well as the attached hospitals are on three pieces of land which is not permissible as per the Regulations.

In view of above and as the applicant has failed to meet the qualifying criteria under Regulation 3(2)(2)as the proposed medical college and hospital are in three different pieces of land and 3(2)(5) requiring the person establishing a new medical college to own and manage a hospital of not less than 300 beds of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999, hence it is not entitled to established a new medical college at Badaun, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Badaun (Govt. Medical College, Badaun), Uttar Pradesh by Govt. of Uttar Pradesh under Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, Bareilly, U.P. to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.”

The Executive Committee further observed that presently the Ministry of Health & F.W., Govt. of India has forwarded the observations/recommendations of the Committee constituted by the Ministry in the matter, which is as under:-

*“A number of deficiencies have been pointed out. The college has submitted compliance for most of them. It is at establishment stage.”
Recommended for review by MCI.”*

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon^{ble} Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in W.P.(C) No. 705/2015-Royal Medical Trust(Regd.) and Another Vs. Union of India and Anrs.:-

“.....(A) Initial assessment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent of affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage....”

The Committee further noted the following relevant portion of the Hon^{ble} Supreme Court judgment dated 20/08/2015 in SLP.(C) No. 15043/2015-Padmashree Dr. D.Y. Patil Medical College Vs. Medical Council of India & Anr.:-

16. *In W.P. (C) No.705/2014 – Royal Medical Trust (Regd.) and Anr. V. Union of India & Anr. decided on 20.8.2015, this Court has observed that the Schedule must take care of following aspects:*

“(A) Initial assesment of the application at the first level should comprise of checking necessary requirements such as essentiality certificate, consent for affiliation and physical features like land and hospital requirement. If an applicant fails to fulfill these requirements, the application on the face of it, would be incomplete and be rejected. Those who fulfill the basic requirements would be considered at the next stage.

(B) Inspection should then be conducted by the Inspectors of the MCI. By very nature such inspection must have an element of surprise. Therefore, sufficient time of about three to four months ought to be given to the MCI to cause inspection at any time and such inspection should normally be undertaken latest by January. Surprise inspection would ensure that the required facilities and infrastructure are always in place and not borrowed or put in temporarily.

(C) Intimation of the result or outcome of the inspection would then be communicated. If the infrastructure and facilities are in order, the concerned MedicalCollege should be given requisite permission/renewal. However if there are any deficiencies or shortcomings, the MCI must, after pointing out the deficiencies, grant to the college concerned sufficient time to report compliance.

(D) If compliance is reported and the applicant states that the deficiencies stand removed, the MCI must cause compliance verification. It is possible that such compliance could be accepted even without actual physical verification but that assessment be left entirely to the discretion of the MCI and the Central Government. In cases where actual physical verification is required, the MCI and the Central Government must cause such verification before the deadline.

(E) The result of such verification if positive in favour of the MedicalCollege concerned, the applicant ought to be given requisite permission/renewal. But if the deficiencies still persist or had not been removed, the applicant will stand disentitled so fare as that academic year is concerned.”

It is apparent from the aforesaid decision and the regulations that the application at the first instance is required to be complete and incomplete applications are liable to be rejected. Thereafter, there has to be an inspection and other stages of decision-making process.”

After due deliberations, as the Qualifying Criteria were not fulfilled at the time of making the application, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to reiterate the earlier decision to return the application for establishment of a new medical college at Badaun (Govt. Medical College, Badaun), Uttar Pradesh by Govt. of Uttar Pradesh under Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University,

Bareilly, U.P. to the Central Government recommending disapproval of the scheme u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council office for the next academic year.

35. Recognition/Approval of Karpagam Faculty of medical Sciences & Research, Coimbatore, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G. R. Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and Compliance Verification Assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch(150 MBBS seats) u/s 10(A) of the IMC Act, 1956 for the Academic year 2016-17.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Karpagam Faculty of medical Sciences & Research, Coimbatore, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G. R. Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and Compliance Verification Assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch(150 MBBS seats) u/s 10(A) of the IMC Act, 1956 for the Academic year 2016-17.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the compliance verification assessment report (19th February 2016) along with previous assessment report (2nd& 3rd November, 2015) with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 5th batch (150 seats) of Karpagam Faculty of Medical Sciences & Research, Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu under The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G.R Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017 was considered by the Executive Committee of the Council at its meeting held on 13.05.2016 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (19th February 2016) along with previous assessment report (2nd& 3rd November, 2015) and noted the following:-

1. *As per O.T. & Ward records in Surgical & allied branches, Radiodiagnosis and Obstetrics & Gynaecology, full time working of many faculty members in the rank of Professors and Asso. Prof. could not be verified.*
2. *Many patients were admitted with minor ailments without any major problem. The occupancy was tailor made to suit assessment. E.g. One referred patient from Ophthalmology was lying in medical ward.*
3. *There were only 4 Major operations & 3 Minor operations on day of assessment.*
4. *Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report*

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of 150 MBBS students at Karpagam Faculty of Medical Sciences & Research, Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu under The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G.R Medical University, Chennai u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.”

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Govt. vide this office letter dated 14/05/2016. The Central Government vide its letter dated 10.06.2016 had conveyed its decision to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities not to admit any students for the academic year 2016-2017.

Thereafter, the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 20.08.2016 had granted approval to the said college for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch (150 seats) u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017, in

the light of the directive of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee (OC) subject to submission of bank guarantees, affidavit and some other conditions.

In continuation to the earlier letter dated 20.08.2016, the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 31.08.2016 had forwarded the following documents as submitted by the college to the Ministry on 24.08.2016:-

- i. An affidavit dated 22.08.2016 from the Chairman of the Trust/Society and the Dean/Principal of the college concerned.
- ii. A bank guarantee bearing No. 0507116BG0000170 dated 22.08.2016 Rs. 2 Cr issued by State Bank of India in favour of MCI, with a validity of 1 year.

The Executive Committee of the Council further noted that upon receipt of request through the Central Government u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, the assessments to assess the standard of examination held by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai and to assess the physical and the other teaching facilities available for Recognition/Approval of Karpagam Faculty of Medical Science & Research, Coimbatore, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 as well as Compliance Verification Assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch(150 MBBS seats) u/s 10(A) of the IMC Act, 1956 for the Academic year 2016-17 with reference to the conditional approval accorded by Oversight Committee have been carried out by the Council assessors on 17th February, 2017 and 15th & 16th March, 2017 and noted the following:-

1. OPD attendance of 1,343 on day of assessment as provided by Institute appear to be highly inflated. On physical verification at 11 a.m. & 11.30 a.m., total OPD statistics as recorded in registers of all the departments was only 286.
2. There were NIL Normal Delivery & 2 Caesarean Section on day of assessment.
3. Histopathology & Cytopathology workload for the whole Institute was only 05 each on day of assessment.
4. Data of radiological investigations as provided by Institute appear to be inflated.
5. Wards : Ancillary facilities are not properly used in the wards.
6. RHTC : No independent activity in National Health Programmes is carried out.
7. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the college has failed to abide by the undertaking it had given to the Central Govt. that there are no deficiencies as per clause 3.2(i) of the directions passed by the Supreme Court mandated Oversight Committee vide communication dated 12/08/2016. The Executive Committee, after due deliberation and discussion, has decided that the college has failed to comply with the stipulation laid down by the Oversight Committee. Accordingly, the Executive Committee recommends that as per the directions passed by Oversight Committee in para 3.2(b) vide communication dated 12/08/2016 the college should be debarred from admitting students in the above course for a period of two academic years i.e. 2017-18 & 2018-19 as even after giving an undertaking that they have fulfilled the entire infrastructure for recognition/approval of Karpagam Faculty of medical Sciences & Research, Coimbatore, Tamilnadu for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. M.G. R. Medical University, Chennai u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and Compliance Verification Assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch(150 MBBS seats) u/s 10(A) of the IMC Act, 1956 for the Academic year 2016-17.,the college was found to be grossly deficient. It has also

been decided by the Executive Committee that the Bank Guarantee furnished by the college in pursuance of the directives passed by the Oversight Committee as well as GOI letter dated 20/08/2016 is liable to be encashed.

The EC further decided to give 15 days time for submission of compliance for consideration of recognition/approval of the college.

The decision be conveyed to the Oversight Committee and Central Govt.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

36. Renewal of permission for MBBS course for 6th batch (150 seats) of Malla Reddy Institute of Medical Sciences, Hyderabad u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018 as well as Recognition/Approval for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Dr. N.T.R University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 6th batch (150 seats) of Malla Reddy Institute of Medical Sciences, Hyderabad u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018 as well as Recognition/Approval for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Dr. N.T.R University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that at its meeting dt. 13/01/2017, it was decided as under:

“.....In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 6th batch of 150 MBBS students at Malla Reddy Institute of Medical Sciences, Hyderabad u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018 and further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(b) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment) 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010.”

It was also observed by the Executive Committee that the Ministry has forwarded the observations/recommendations of the Committee constituted by the Ministry in the matter, which is as under:-

“Grave deficiencies have been pointed out in the inspection. The explanation offered by the college was not very satisfactory. Only since the college is at recognition stage, it may be recommended for review by MCI.”

The Executive Committee further observed that the compliance submitted by the institute was placed before Sub-Committee who has recommended as under:

“Not eligible for compliance u/s 8(3)(1)(b). However, with regard to contention of the Institute that 8(3)(1)(b) is not applicable to it as the assessment was for admission of VI batch while 8(3)(1)(b) is applicable for IV & V batches only, opinion of Law Officer be taken.”

The Executive Committee of the Council also perused the opinion of Law Officer, operative part of which reads as under:-

“....4. Therefore from the perusal of the above legislative scheme it is abundantly clear that failure to seek timely recognition disentitles the College from getting admission of fresh batch. After fourth renewal, until the grant of recognition the criteria that remains applicable is of the recognition requirement and the Medical College in such cases is covered by Regulation 8(3)(1)(b) of the Establishment of Medical Regulations, 1999 as amended on 18.03.16. The statutory scheme does not encompass fifth/sixth renewal. In view of the aforesaid, I am of the considered opinion that Regulation 8(3)(1)(b) is attracted

from III renewal onwards and is applicable until recognition of the MBBS qualification awarded by the Institute is granted. Therefore, the contention raised by the Institution is devoid of merit and ought to be rejected.”

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to approve the recommendation of Sub-Committee and opinion of Law Officer and it was decided to reiterate earlier decision *“to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 6th batch of 150 MBBS students at Malla Reddy Institute of Medical Sciences, Hyderabad U/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018 and further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(b) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010.”*

So far as request u/s 11(2) is concerned, as it pertains to recognition of batches admitted in past pursuant to permissions granted by Govt. of India, the Executive Committee decided to carry out assessment for facilities available at this Institute in accordance with Regulations as assessment at the time of examination has already been carried out.

37. Recognition/approval of Christian Medical College, Vellore for the award of MBBS degree granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai against the increased intake i.e. from 60 to 100 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Christian Medical College, Vellore for the award of MBBS degree granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai against the increased intake i.e. from 60 to 100 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment reports (21st February, 2017 and 15th and 16th March, 2017) and decided to recommend to the Central Government for recognition/approval of Christian Medical College, Vellore for the award of MBBS degree granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai against the increased intake i.e. from 60 to 100 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee further decided that the attention of the institute be drawn to Sections 8(3)(2), 8(3)(3) & 8(3)(4) of the Establishment of Medical Colleges Regulations (Amendment), 2010 (Part II) dated 16th April 2010 and act accordingly at appropriate time, which reads as under:-

8 (3) ...

(2) The recognition so granted to an Undergraduate Course for award of MBBS degree shall be for a maximum period of 5 years, upon which it shall have to be renewed.

(3) The procedure for 'Renewal' of recognition shall be same as applicable for the award of recognition.

(4) Failure to seek timely renewal of recognition as required in sub-clause (a) supra shall invariably result in stoppage of admissions to the concerned Undergraduate Course of MBBS at the said institute.

The Committee decided to place the matter before the General Body of the Council.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

38. Permission for pursuing compulsory rotating Internship training at University Medical Center in Las Vegas, USA in respect of Mr. Adarsh Thomas Anthony.

Read: the matter with regard to permission for pursuing compulsory rotating Internship training at University Medical Center in Las Vegas, USA in respect of Mr. Adarsh Thomas Anthony.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that the matter pertains to application from Mr. Adarsh Thomas Anthony requesting to grant NOC permission for compulsory rotator internship training at University Medical Center in Las Vegas, USA. He is a foreign National and has passed his MBBS examination from Sri Ramachandra Medical College and Research Institute, Chennai and provisionally registered with the Tamil Nadu Medical Council vide P.R. No. 15/2017 issued on 06.01.2017. He has attached NOC from Dean of Faculties, Sri Ramachandra University (Deemed University) & Executive Director (West Coast), Community Hospital Health Associates, USA.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to grant NOC to Mr. Adarsh Thomas Anthony for pursuing compulsory rotating internship training at University Medical Center, Las Vegas, USA provided that he does training in Community Medicine at the parent Institute where he has studied.

Office Note: The Committee directed that henceforth all such application from students desirous of doing internship abroad may be dealt with by the office and NOC be granted if documents are complete in all respect.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

39. Recognition/Approval of Apollo Institute of Medical Sciences and Research, Hyderabad, Telangana for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, Andhra Pradesh u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and Compliance Verification Assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch(100 MBBS seats) u/s 10(A) of the IMC Act, 1956 for the Academic year 2016-17.

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Apollo Institute of Medical Sciences and Research, Hyderabad, Telangana for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, Andhra Pradesh u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and Compliance Verification Assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch(100 MBBS seats) u/s 10(A) of the IMC Act, 1956 for the Academic year 2016-17.

The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the compliance verification assessment report (11th March 2016) alongwith previous assessment report (10th& 11th September, 2015) as well as the letter dated 18/04/2016 received from the college authorities with regard to renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students at Apollo Institute of Medical Sciences and Research, Hyderabad, Telangana under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, Andhra Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017 was considered by the Executive Committee of the Council at its meeting held on 13.05.2016 at it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (11th March 2016) along with previous assessment report

(10th & 11th September, 2015) as well as the letter dated 18/04/2016 received from the college authorities and noted the following:-

1. Shortage of Residents is 64.1 % as detailed in the report.
2. Many Residents do not stay in campus. Some Residents stay in the city and come only on call.
3. Laboratory investigations still appear to be inadequate. Space for the collection center is inadequate. Transportation of samples to central laboratory is improper.
4. CT Scan is not functional.
5. There were only 4 Major operations on day of assessment.
6. Histopathology workload is only 7; out of these, 3 were of circumcision & 2 were Pap smear.
7. Cytopathological workload is inadequate.
8. Workload of Special investigations like Ba, IVP is NIL
9. Students' Hostels: Total accommodation available is 258 against requirement of 375. Even out of these, some rooms are 4 seaters which is not as per Regulations. Complex III is outside college campus.
10. Residential Quarters: NIL quarters are available for non-teaching staff.
11. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of 100 MBBS students at Apollo Institute of Medical Sciences and Research, Hyderabad, Telangana under Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, Andhra Pradesh u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017".

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Govt. vide this office letter dated 14.05.2016. The Central Government vide its letter dated 10.06.2016 had conveyed its decision to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities not to admit any students for the academic year 2016-2017.

Thereafter, the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 20.08.2016 had granted approval to the said college for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch (100 seats) u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017, in the light of the directive of the Supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee (OC) subject to submission of bank guarantees, affidavit and some other conditions.

- ii. A bank guarantee bearing No. 11650100010317 dated 31.08.2016 Rs. 2 Cr issued by Axis Bank Ltd. in favour of MCI, with a validity of 1 year.

The Executive Committee of the Council further noted that upon receipt of request through the Central Government u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, the assessment to assess the standard of examination held by Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, Andhra Pradesh and to assess the physical and the other teaching facilities available for Recognition/Approval of Apollo Institute of Medical Sciences and Research, Hyderabad, Telangana for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, Andhra Pradesh u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and compliance verification assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch(100 MBBS seats) u/s 10(A) of the IMC Act, 1956 for the Academic year 2016-17 with reference to the conditional approval accorded by Oversight Committee have

been carried out by the Council assessors on 11th February, 2017 and 16th & 17th March, 2017 and noted the following:-

1. Shortage of Residents is 7.46% as detailed in the report.
2. Bed Occupancy is 72.76% at 10 a.m. on day of assessment.
3. Wards
 - (a) Surgery Ward- In male ward, only 5 post operative patients, 8 patients admitted on 16.03.2017 with no diagnosis or treatment-blank sheets photo attached. In Female ward – 5 post operative patients, 10 patients with diagnosis of fissure and 10 patients with minor compliments not meriting admission.
 - (b) Orthopaedic Ward : 10 patients of Polyarthralgia with no evidence of any diagnosis and 5 patients of backache not meriting admission. No postoperative patients in Ortho female ward.
 - (c) Gynaecology Ward : 18 patients admitted for minor complaints which did not merit admission. Only 2 post operative patients.
 - (d) Paediatrics Ward : 25 children admitted, who did not have any complaints meriting admission. Sitting or playing in cots.
4. ICUs:ICCU & MICU are combined. PICU & NICU are not available. In SICU, none of 5 patients required intensive care; they were post-operative cases kept in SICU.
5. Casualty: 15 beds are available in Main Casualty against requirement of 20.
6. ETO Sterilizer is not available.
7. UHC : Specialists' visits are not organized.
8. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the college has failed to abide by the undertaking it had given to the Central Govt. that there are no deficiencies as per clause 3.2(i) of the directions passed by the Supreme Court mandated Oversight Committee vide communication dated 11/08/2016. The Executive Committee, after due deliberation and discussion, has decided that the college has failed to comply with the stipulation laid down by the Oversight Committee. Accordingly, the Executive Committee recommends that as per the directions passed by Oversight Committee in para 3.2(b) vide communication dated 11/08/2016 the college should be debarred from admitting students in the above course for a period of two academic years i.e. 2017-18 & 2018-19 as even after giving an undertaking that they have fulfilled the entire infrastructure for recognition/approval of Apollo Institute of Medical Sciences and Research, Hyderabad, Telangana for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada, Andhra Pradesh u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and Compliance Verification Assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch (100 MBBS seats) u/s 10(A) of the IMC Act, 1956 for the Academic year 2016-17, the college was found to be grossly deficient. It has also been decided by the Executive Committee that the Bank Guarantee furnished by the college in pursuance of the directives passed by the Oversight Committee as well as GOI letter dated 20/08/2016 is liable to be encashed.

The EC further decided to give 15 days time for submission of compliance for consideration of recognition/approval of the college.

The decision be conveyed to the Oversight Committee and Central Govt.

4. ICUs: There was NIL patient in ICCU, SICU, PICU/NICU & only 1 patient in MICU on day of assessment.
5. Casualty : Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available.
6. OPD : Injection room is common for males/females. Dressing room is common for males/females.
7. CSSD : Receiving & Distribution points are not separate. Record of distribution of sterilized is not properly maintained.
8. MRD : ICD X classification of diseases is not followed for indexing of diseases.
9. Central Research Laboratory is not available.
10. Examination Hall : Capacity is 120 against requirement of 250.
11. Central Library : Seating arrangement in Students' Reading Room (inside) is 10 against requirement of 100. Available Internet Nodes are 15 against requirement of 25.
12. Students' Hostels : Visitors' room, A.C. Study room with Computer & Internet and Recreation room are not available.
13. Interns' Hostel : Visitors' room, A.C. Study room with Computer & Internet and Recreation room are not available.
14. Residents' Hostels : Visitors' room, A.C. Study room with Computer & Internet and Recreation room are not available.
15. Audiovisual aids are not available in Demonstration rooms of Physiology, Biochemistry, Pathology, Microbiology, Forensic Medicine, Community Medicine departments. Chairs are inadequate in some Demonstration rooms as detailed in the report.
16. Microbiology department : Only 5 Service Laboratories are available against requirement of 7.
17. RHTC : It is not under the control of Dean. There are NIL beds provided in Residential accommodation. Specialists' visits are not organized. Survey registers are not available.
18. UHC : It is not under the control of Dean, Specialists' visits are not organized. Survey registers are not available.
19. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Govt. Medical College, Kannauj for the award of MBBS degree (100 seats) granted by King George's Medical University, Lucknow, U.P. u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

41. Recognition/Approval of NRI Institute of Medical Sciences, Visakhapatnam for the award of MBBS degree (150 seats) granted by Dr. NTR University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

10. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Andhra Medical College, Visakhapatnam for the award of MBBS degree granted by Dr. N.T.R. University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada against the increased intake i.e. from 150 to 200 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Chengalpattu Medical College, Chengalpattu for the award of MBBS degree granted by The Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, Chennai against the increased intake i.e. from 50 to 100 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

“The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (30.03.2016) along with previous assessment report (28th & 29th October, 2015) and noted the following:-

1. *Shortage of Residents is 9.30 % as detailed in the report.*
2. *On random verification, it was observed that at least 4 Senior Residents are not staying in the campus. Many other Senior Residents who are above 60 y of age are also not staying in the campus.*
3. *OPD data provided by institute are highly inflated. Assessors visited OPD at 10 a.m., 12 noon & 1 p.m. and very few patients were seen in OPD during all 3 visits. Actual OPD attendance on day of assessment was around 750 on day of assessment against requirement of 1,200.*
4. *Bed occupancy was 45 % on day of assessment.*
5. *Many patients were admitted on 28/03/2016 & 29/03/2016 as verified from case sheets. In many patients who were admitted day before assessment, complaints did not match with treatment mentioned on case paper. In General Surgery ward, 20 patients were admitted the day before with trivial complaints and had not received even oral drugs and post admission investigations were not carried out.*
6. *Total number of Major operations on day assessment is only 06 which is inadequate.*
7. *Total number of Minor Operations as verified by assessors was only 01; however, the register showed 05 Minor operations.*
8. *There was NIL Normal Delivery & NIL Caesarean Section on day of assessment.*
9. *Data of Clinical Material, Radiological & Laboratory investigations as provided by institute are inflated.*
10. *Emergency O.T. is non-functional.*
11. *Facilities in Central Research Laboratory are inadequate.*
12. *Patients in Paediatrics ward were of adult age and case sheets did not match with complaints & treatment.*

13. *Nursing stations are not in proper places in many wards.*
14. *Medical files of many admitted patients have similar wordings in the Nursing notes. One such file is of patient named Jyoti.*
15. *Workload of Special investigations like Ba, IVP was NIL on day of assessment.*
16. *Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.*

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 5th Batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100-150 in respect of Rohilkhand Medical College & Hospital, Bareilly under M.J.P Rohilkhand University, Bareilly u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-2017.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18th March, 2016, which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Government vide this office letter dated 15.05.2016.

The Council vide another letter dated 15.05.2016 issued the Show Cause Notice to the college authorities to explain as to why the Council should not proceed to recommend to the Central Govt. for withdrawal of recognition of MBBS degree/Postgraduate course of the institute and stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate course.

The Central Government vide its letter dated 10.06.2016 had conveyed its decision to the college authorities as well as other concerned authorities not to admit any students against increased intake from 100-150 in MBBS course for the academic year 2016-17.

The Executive Committee further noted that the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 20.08.2016 had granted approval to the said college for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch (100 to 150 seats) u/s 10A of IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17, in the light of the directive of the supreme Court Mandated Oversight Committee (OC), subject to submission of bank guarantees, affidavit and some other conditions.

In continuation to the earlier letter dated 20.08.2016, the Central Govt. vide its letter dated 31/08/2016 had forwarded the following documents as submitted by the college to the Ministry on 29.08.2016:-

- i. An affidavit dated 24.08.2016 from the Chairman of the Trust/Society concerned.
- ii. An affidavit dated 24.08.2016 from the Principal of the college concerned.
- iii. A bank guarantee bearing No. 52260000216 dated 26.08.2016 Rs 2 Cr issued by Oriental Bank of Commerce in favour of MCI, with a validity of 1 year.

The Executive Committee further noted that an assessment to verify the compliance submitted by the college authorities on the deficiencies pointed out in the assessment report (30th March, 2016) for 100 MBBS seats at Rohilkhand Medical College & Hospital, Bareilly under M J P Rohilkhand University, Bareilly was carried out by the Council assessors on 17.01.2017. The compliance verification assessment report (17.01.2017) alongwith previous assessment reports (30.03.2016 & 28th & 29th October, 2015) was considered by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 25.01.2017 and it was decided as under:-

“The Executive Committee of the Council noted that the compliance verification assessment report (17.01.2017) along with the previous assessment reports (30.03.2016 & 28th & 29th October, 2015) and decided to revoke the Notice issued under clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999.”

The above decision of the Executive Committee was communicated to the Central Government vide this office letter dated 15.02.2017 and copy to the College authorities.

The Executive Committee further noted that upon receipt of the request through the Central Govt. u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956, the assessments to assess the standard of examination held by Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, Bareilly and to assess the physical and the other teaching facilities available for recognition/approval of Rohilkhand Medical College & Hospital, Bareilly for the award of MBBS degree granted by Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, Bareilly against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and Compliance Verification Assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17 with reference to the conditional approval accorded by Oversight Committee have been carried out by the Council assessors on (23.02.2017) and (16th & 17th March, 2017) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 10.7% as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of residents is 6.97% as detailed in the report.
3. Bed Occupancy was 36.62% at 10 a.m. on day of assessment.
4. ICUs : There were only 1 patient in SICU, PICU & only 2 patients in ICCU. PICU is not well equipped.
5. There were only 12 Major Operations for the whole hospital on day of assessment.
6. There was NIL woman in the Labour room at time of taking round at 11.30 a.m.
7. Wards : Nursing stations are not properly placed and are non-functional in some wards. Teaching rooms are common for 203 wards in a few departments.
8. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the college has failed to abide by the undertaking it had given to the Central Govt. that there are no deficiencies as per clause 3.2(i) of the directions passed by the Supreme Court mandated Oversight Committee vide communication dated 13/08/2016. The Executive Committee, after due deliberation and discussion, has decided that the college has failed to comply

with the stipulation laid down by the Oversight Committee. Accordingly, the Executive Committee recommends that as per the directions passed by Oversight Committee in para 3.2(b) vide communication dated 13/08/2016 the college should be debarred from admitting students in the above course for a period of two academic years i.e. 2017-18 & 2018-19 as even after giving an undertaking that they have fulfilled the entire infrastructure for the award of MBBS degree granted by Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand University, Bareilly against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and Compliance Verification Assessment for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 10 A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2016-17.,the college was found to be grossly deficient. It has also been decided by the Executive Committee that the Bank Guarantee furnished by the college in pursuance of the directives passed by the Oversight Committee as well as GOI letter dated 20/08/2016 is liable to be encashed.

The Committee decided to apply of clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment),2010(Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18.03.2016 which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.”

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18) and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956, alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses and further decided that the institute be asked to submit the compliance of rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

The EC further decided to give 15 days time for submission of compliance for consideration of recognition/approval of the college.

The decision be conveyed to the Oversight Committee and Central Govt.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

50. Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at Medicit Institute of Medical Sciences, Ghanpur.

Read: the matter with regard to Compliance Verification Assessment of the physical and the other teaching facilities available for 100 MBBS seats at Medicity Institute of Medical Sciences, Ghanpur.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification assessment report (16.03.2017 & 17.03.2017) along with previous assessment report (03.08.2016&02.03.2016) and noted the following:-

1. In respect of Dr. Krishna, Senior Resident, Orthopaedics, signature in morning & afternoon differed. He did signature in afternoon in front of assessor over the morning signature to hide this fact.
2. In respect of Dr. N. Reddy, Senior resident, Orthopaedics, signature in morning & afternoon are not matching.
3. In Paediatrics ward few of the patients were not appear to be within Pediatric age group. Most of the children did not appear sick to fit in the criteria for admission. In PICU mothers were sleeping with children with casual dress which is unhygienic for intensive cares. In dermatology case sheets of two patients were empty during time of inspection (IP 005569/17 & IP 005575/17). In Orthopaedics patients requiring physiotherapy were admitted as Indoor patient. In Male Psychiatry ward two females were lying on the cot (Photograph taken by assessors mobile). In medicine ward patients were admitted due to abdominal pain, neck pain, knee pain etc. Cataract patient admitted in Medicine ward.
4. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

The Committee decided to issue a show cause notice as to why the recommendations for invoking clause 8(3)(1)(d) of *Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010* be not made in view of the fake information provided by the college authorities to the Council Assessors. The said clause reads as under:-

8(3)(1)(d):

(d) Colleges which are found to have employed teachers with faked / forged documents:

If it is observed that any institute is found to have employed a teacher with faked / forged documents and have submitted the Declaration Form of such a teacher, such an institute will not be considered for renewal of permission / recognition for award of M.B.B.S. degree / processing the applications for postgraduate courses for two Academic Years – i.e. that Academic Year and the next Academic Year also.....”

In view of above, the Committee further decided that the Institute be directed not to admit fresh batch of students for the academic year 2017-18 and 2018-19 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to refer the matter to the Ethics Committee of the Council.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

51. **Recognition/approval of Medicity Institute of Medical Sciences, Ghanpur for the award of MBBS degree granted by Dr. N.T.R. University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.**

Read: the matter with regard to recognition/approval of Medicity Institute of Medical Sciences, Ghanpur for the award of MBBS degree granted by Dr. N.T.R. University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the assessment reports (17th February, 2017 and 16th & 17th March, 2017) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 5.59% as detailed in the report.
2. Pay-scales are different for different faculty in the same designation.
3. Traces Form 16 is not available for any Doctor.
4. In respect of Dr. Krishna, Senior Resident, Orthopaedics, signature in morning & afternoon differed. He did signature in afternoon in front of assessor over the morning signature to hide this fact.
5. In respect of Dr. N. Reddy, Senior Resident, Orthopaedics, signature in morning & afternoon are not matching.
6. Bed occupancy is 60.13% at 10 a.m. on day of assessment.
7. In Paediatrics ward few of the patients were not appear to be within Paediatric age group. Most of the children did not appear sick to fit in the criteria for admission. In dermatology case sheets of two patients were empty during time of inspection (IP 005569/17 & IP 005575/17 Photograph taken). In Orthopaedics patients requiring physiotherapy were admitted as Indoor patient. In Male Psychiatry ward two females were lying on the cot (Photograph taken by assessors on mobile). In medicine ward patients were admitted due to abdominal pain, neck pain, knee pain etc. Cataract patient admitted in Medicine ward.
8. Cytopathology workload was only 04 on day of assessment.
9. Casualty : Separate Casualty for O.G. is not available.
10. Wards : In Psychiatry, Nursing Station is outside the wards & is common for males/females.
11. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to recognise/approve Medicity Institute of Medical Sciences, Ghanpur for the award of MBBS degree granted by Dr. N.T.R. University of Health Sciences, Vijayawada against the increased intake i.e. from 100 to 150 seats u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter and apply clause 8(3)(1)(c) of Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 and amended on 18th March, 2016, which reads as under:-

8(3)(1).....

(c) Colleges which are already recognized for award of MBBS degree and/or running postgraduate courses

If it is observed during any inspection/assessment of the institute that the deficiency of teaching faculty and/or Residents is more than 10% and/or bed occupancy is <70%, compliance of rectification of deficiency from such an institute will not be considered for issue of renewal of permission in that Academic year and further such an institute will not be considered for processing applications for postgraduate courses in that Academic year and will be issued show cause notices as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act, 1956 along with direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.

In view of above, it was decided not to consider the Institute for processing applications for postgraduate courses in the current Academic year (2017-18)

and to issue show cause notice as to why the recommendation for withdrawal of recognition of the courses run by that institute should not be made for undergraduate and postgraduate courses which are recognized u/s 11(2) of the IMC Act,1956 alongwith direction of stoppage of admissions in permitted postgraduate courses.

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to intimate the Postgraduate Section of application of clause 8(3)(1)(c) for this Institute for information and further necessary action.

The Committee further decided to issue a show cause notice as to why the recommendations for invoking clause 8(3)(1)(d) of *Establishment of Medical College Regulation (Amendment), 2010 (Part II), dated 16th April, 2010 be not made in view of the fake information provided by the college authorities to the Council Assessors*. The said clause reads as under:-

8(3)(1)(d):

(d) Colleges which are found to have employed teachers with faked / forged documents:

If it is observed that any institute is found to have employed a teacher with faked / forged documents and have submitted the Declaration Form of such a teacher, such an institute will not be considered for renewal of permission / recognition for award of M.B.B.S. degree / processing the applications for postgraduate courses for two Academic Years – i.e. that Academic Year and the next Academic Year also.....”

The Executive Committee of the Council further decided to refer the matter to the Ethics Committee of the Council.

The Committee decided that the Institute be directed not to admit fresh batch of students for the academic year 2017-18 and 2018-19 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

52. Appointment on various posts in the Council office.

Read: the matter with regard to appointment on various posts in the Council office.

The Executive Committee of the Council observed that at its meeting held on 22.03.2016, it was decided to approve the proposal to advertise the following posts:-

The Executive Committee noted that the posts mentioned above i.e. Stenographer, Grade-III/II, Telephone Operator-cum-Receptionist, Computer Operator, Lower Division Clerk, Staff Car Driver (Ordinary Grade), Electrician, Messenger and Peon, the applications received for the said posts have been scrutinized. As per scrutinized applications Council has to take written test and typing/shorthand test of the candidates for the respective posts.

The Committee further noted that the Council office contacted various schools in Dwarka for holding the tests in their schools. One such School has agreed to conduct the written examination and for approximately 16,111 candidates they will charge @ Rs.130/- per candidate. As such there will be an expenditure of Rs. 20,94,430/- besides expenditure of setting of papers for written examination and evaluation thereof.

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to approve the proposal of the office for conducting written examination for the posts that have been advertised.

53. Establishment of new medical college at Raigad, Maharashtra (Dr. N.Y. Tasgaonkar Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Raigad) by Saraswati Education Society, Mumbai, Maharashtra with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

Read: the matter with regard to establishment of new medical college at Raigad, Maharashtra (Dr. N.Y. Tasgaonkar Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Raigad) by Saraswati Education Society, Mumbai, Maharashtra with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18.

The Executive Committee perused the letter from Assessors, operative part of which reads as under:

“With reference to the above cited subject we are here with would like to bring your kind notice that as Institute was not ready for assessment and has given letter seeking 15 days time to prepare for the assessment. This is for your kind information and the needful”.

The Executive Committee further perused the letter from Dean of the Institute which reads as under:

“This has reference to MCI assessment in our institute on 17th and 18th March, 2017. Due to Holi holiday and as we are in tribal area which is very remote and some of the staff has not yet reported back on the duties after holidays and expected to join on Monday 20.3.2017, we were in process of arranging our new furniture and equipment’s in college building. Hence I humbly request to grant me 15 days time to prepare for the assessment.”

In this regard, it was observed by the Executive Committee that earlier the scheme was returned to Central Govt. due to non-submission of various documents like Form 5, Balance Sheet, etc. After giving a hearing to the Institute u/s 10A(4), the Ministry has forwarded the observations/recommendations of the Committee constituted by the Ministry in the matter, which is as under:-

“The documents relating to Form -5 and Balance sheet could have been directly sought by MCI.

The college has submitted the same.

MCI may conduct an early inspection.”

In view of above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to return the application for establishment of new medical college at Raigad, Maharashtra (Dr. N.Y. Tasgaonkar Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Raigad) by Saraswati Education Society, Mumbai, Maharashtra with an annual intake of 150 MBBS students under Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-18 as there is no provision u/s 10A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 or the regulations framed therein to keep the application pending in the Council Office for the next academic year.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

54. Renewal of permission for MBBS course for 2nd batch (150 seats) of Maheshwara Medical College & Hospital, Telangana u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 2nd batch (150 seats) of Maheshwara Medical College & Hospital, Telangana u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (17th & 18th March, 2017) and noted the following:-

1. Deficiency of faculty is 6.38 % as detailed in the report.
2. Shortage of Residents is 6.38 % as detailed in the report.
3. Some of the patients were admitted for minor complaints. And do not merit admission especially in General Surgery, General medicine & Ophthalmology.
4. Patient named Anwar was admitted without having any problem as stated by him.
5. Pathology department: Laboratories are not fully functional. Museum does not have adequate specimens.
6. Forensic Medicine department: Mortuary & Museum are yet to be fully functional.
7. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2nd batch (150 seats) of Maheshwara Medical College & Hospital, Telangana u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

55. Renewal of permission for MBBS course for 2nd batch (150 seats) of Amaltas Institute of Medical Sciences, Dewas, M.P. under Madhya

Pradesh Medical Sciences University, Jabalpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

Read: the matter with regard to renewal of permission for MBBS course for 2nd batch (150 seats) of Amaltas Institute of Medical Sciences, Dewas, M.P. under Madhya Pradesh Medical Sciences University, Jabalpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018.

The Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Assessors report (17th & 18th March, 2017) alongwith a letter dated 20.03.2017 from the Dean of the Institute and noted the following:-

1. Shortage of Residents is 17.02 % as detailed in the report.
2. Bed Occupancy was 55.6 % at 10 a.m. on day of assessment.
3. Data of Operations submitted by the Institute do not match.
4. No register is maintained for scheduling Speech Therapy appointments. It is available only once a week.
5. No register for Child Rehabilitation clinic was available in Paediatrics OPD.
6. No registers for Specialty clinics in OG OPD were available for verification.
7. Civil work and electrification in laboratories of Pathology, Microbiology, Pharmacology and Community Medicine is not complete; hence furniture & equipment in these laboratories is yet to be placed & installed.
8. Although Permission was for 150 students, 174 students were admitted in Academic Year 2016-2017.
9. OPD: Facilities in Minor O.T. are inadequate as detailed in the report.
10. Casualty: Disaster Trolley, Crash Cart, Resuscitation equipment are not available.
11. O.T.s: 3 Major O.T.s are available against requirement of 4. Both Minor O.T.s are non-functional.
12. ICUs: There was NIL patient in ICCU & only 2 patients each in MICU, SICU on day of assessment.
13. Examination Hall: Space available but it is yet to be furnished.
14. Lecture Theaters: Audiovisual aids are not available.
15. Central Library: it is not air-conditioned. Internet Nodes are not properly functioning.
16. Central Photography Section: No equipment are available.
17. Residents' Hostel: It is not available. It is shared with Students' Hostel. However, accommodation in Students' Hostels is available for 248 which is inadequate for 226 Students + 47 Residents = 273 total accommodation required for Students & Residents.
18. Nurses' Hostel: It is not available. Accommodation is shared in sparsely furnished Non-teaching quarters.
19. Residential Quarters: NIL Residential Quarters are available for Non-teaching staff.
20. Head of College Council is not Dean.
21. CME Programmes: Details are not provided.
22. Other deficiencies as pointed out in the assessment report.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2nd batch (150 seats) of Amaltas Institute of Medical Sciences, Dewas, M.P. under Madhya Pradesh Medical Sciences University, Jabalpur u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956 for the academic year 2017-2018 and further decided that the Institute be asked to submit the compliance for rectification of the above deficiencies within 15 days for further consideration of the matter.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

56. **Extension of services of Dr. Seema Madan, Consultant (PG Section).**

Read: the matter with regard to extension of services of Dr. Seema Madan, Consultant (PG Section).

The Executive Committee of the Council decided to extend the contractual services of Dr. Seema Madan, Consultant (PG Section) for a further period of six months.

The minutes of the above item were read out, approved and confirmed in the meeting itself.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.
